## COLORADO E. MADE TWO RECORDS AT READVILLE

Lowered Three-Year-Old Trotting Record to 2.06 1-2 and Won Horse Breeders' Futurity in 2.07 3-4--Weather Conditions Were Unfavorable.

Readville, Mass., Aug. 31--Colorado E., the bay stallion owned by Geo. H. Estabrook, of Denver, Col., smashed the world's record for three-year-old trotters at the Grand Circuit meeting here today by lowering the time of 2.06½, made by Gen. Watts, at Lexington, Ky., in 1907, to 2.06½, and by winning the second heat of the American Horse Breeders' Futurity in 2.07½, he also made a new world's record for two consecutive heats.

### STIFF BREEZE

It was a most remarkable achievement, as nobody present considered it possible for anything remarkable to be made in point of time, the wind blowing almost a gale in the face of the horses when finishing their heats. Then just before the start of the Futurity, Starter Newton announced that the New York filly, Native Belle, who was counted to give Colorado E. a hot race for the honors, had been withdrawn. With the main opposition in the stable the interest in the race flagged right away, it being known that there was none left capable of beating the son of The Bondsman. Hence the surprise when in the opening heat of the Futurity Colorado E. going away in third position took the pole before reaching the first turn and was to the quarter in 32 seconds, four lengths in front of his field. The half was reached in 1.03½ and the three-quarters in 1.33½, but the spectators well knew the strong wind to face in the last couple of furlongs, and even then looked for merely an ordinary mile. However, nothing daunted, the grand colt swept onward to the wire, flashing under it by ten open lengths in 2.06½.

With the pole, Colorado E. led from start to finish in the second heat, making the remarkable time of 2.07½. This could have been material ly faster had he not been pulled back to a jog in the last 100 yards.

### HIS HISTORY

The new champion was bred by R. C. Estill, Lexington, Ky., and has been in the hands of Gus Macey, the veteran Kentucky trainer, now in the employ of Mr. Estabrook, since a yearling. He was raced last season but a curb bothered him and he failed to show the high class he has developed this year. The record of 1.06½ is remarkable for August, as it was not until October that Gen. Watts made the previous mark. Experts figure that by the time of the Lexington, Ky., meeting in October, Colorado E. would be up to trotting a mile in 2.04.

Last Monday William G. Bradley of New York, made an offer of \$30,000 for the three-year-old, which was refused. This offer was today raised to \$75,000 by Mr. Bradley's agent, but the only consideration under which Mr. Estabrook would consider the proposition was that Colorado E. should not be driven by any man other than Macey. Mr. Bradley did not think well of paying so much money for a horse with a string attached and the deal was again off.

### PACING DIVISION

In the pacing division of the Futurity the winner was Directum Regent, bred by J. M. Johnson, Ponkapoag, Mass., and owned by A. Jameson, Somerville, Mass. He was driven by Hugh Milam. It was a stiff race, the filly, Nell Gentry, taking the first heat by a neck. In the second the filly made a break at the half leaving Directum Regent to make his own time from there to the wire, but the last heat both contenders raced lapped to twenty yards from the wire when Nell Gentry went to a break. Bervado, the New York trotter, driven by Tommy Murphy, had easy work taking the 2.12 trot, Murphy laying in the ruck until the home stretch and rushing into the lead just before reaching the wire.

Asa Wilkes captured the 2.08 pace, finishing on the bit. "Longshot" Cox never had to hurry the chestnut stallion, but kept in a good position to go to the front when he wished.

## TOMMY QUILL FOUGHT DRAW WITH LOUGHREY

Boston, Aug. 31.--Not for a long time have the members of the Armory A. A. witnessed such a fast and strenuous bout as the 12-round one between Tommy Quill of Brockton, and Young Loughrey, of Philadelphia, last night. It was called a draw and the decision appears to please most of the fans.

From the first tap of the gong the men boxed at a terrific pace and while at times they were forced to slow down, the instant they felt their strength returning they would speed up again, so that all through the 12 rounds there was plenty of action of the kind that creates excitement.

At times in some of the rounds it looked as if one of the men would run up a big score of points, but suddenly the other would reverse matters and put a different look on the affair.

Both showed by their appearance that they had worked hard for the contest and Loughrey appeared to be the most rugged of the pair. It was the sixth time they had met and there is still a doubt in the minds of the fans as to who is the better boxer. A bout of a larger number of rounds is the only way to settle the question.

In the first bout of the evening, Young Lamdon of Northboro, in one round. Tom Flanagan of Cambridge, got the decision over Tony Lorenzo in their 6-round bout. Young Rodman of Webster, was given the award over Pat Rocco, of Boston, in their 6-round contest.

No club in any other league has equalled the record of the Phillies for consecutive failures, which is a performance that stands unique in the history of baseball.

## CAMERON MADE NEW MARK FOR FIVE MILES

Amherst, N. S., Aug. 31. -- Fred Cameron defeated H. S. Perkins, the English-Canadian runner, in a five mile race on the Ramblers' track tonight. The track was twenty-eight laps for the five miles and up until the twenty-fourth lap, Perkins was close at Cameron's elbow, pushing him as he was never pushed before.

Cameron's efforts to shake him off proved unavailable until the twenty-fourth lap was reached when a sudden dash gave Cameron a lead of 25 yards, which he held until the finish, increasing the distance to 50 yards. The time was 25.39½. This is Cameron's fastest time. The track was measured before the race.

### BASEBALL NOTES

Manager "Bill" Clatke of Troy has taken over Pitcher Thompson from Toronto. He was offered to the Senators some time ago but was refused.

Now that Rube McGroff has been sold to Milwaukee, George Hunter is playing in right garden for Wilkes-barre. Mike Joyce has been shifted to left field.

It is said that Cy Parkins, who was scouting for new material for Newark, has recommended to McGinny Pitchers Knight of Albany and Randolph of Troy and Catcher Burns of Utica.

If Jeff Pfeffer was taken in hand by a shrewd manager and taught how to play a fielding game in the garden, he could hold his own with many slugging outfielders. Jeff can hit the ball.--Boson Traveler.

John Schulte, a brother of Frank Schulte, the outfielder of the Chicago National League Club, was found dead in bed in a hotel in Lestershire, N. Y., Tuesday morning. Death was due to carbolic acid poison, taken with suicidal intent, according to the coroner.

Wilbur Corey, the young brother who has been laid up in a Baltimore hospital with typhoid, is getting along very well. President McCaffrey received a note from the doctor in attendance saying that he was improving steadily and would soon be out of the hospital.--Toronto Globe.

## HAYDEN WINNING AT CENTRAL MAINE ANNUAL FAIR Holmes' Horses Show Up Very Well --Ha Ha Broke State Record For 3-Year-Olds.

## IS CANADA AIMING TO BREAK TRUST

Jos. Leiter Says Mr. Fielding Means to Let Live Cattle in Free--Plans Thus to Draw Northwestern Supply Across the Line.

Detroit, Mich., August 30--Detroit wholesale meat dealers are much interested over an interview with Jos. Leiter, of Chicago, printed in that city yesterday, in the course of which the Chicago millionaire made a statement to the effect that Canada is about to lift the tariff on live cattle and is building an extensive string of packing houses to take care of cattle from the Northwestern section of the United States, which will be drawn across the border by the reduced tariff. Mr. Leiter is quoted as explaining the opinion that Canadians are aiming a death blow at the Beef Trust.

Mackenzie and Mann, the railroad magnates, backed by millions of pounds of English capital are said to be the men behind the project. The three transcontinental lines of Canada and the waterways from Port Arthur to the coast are pointed to as offering superior transportation advantages over the United States lines.

According to the interview the Hon Mr. Fielding is said to have remarked about a year ago in a talk with Mr. Leiter: "Suppose Canada were to lift the tariff from American cattle on the hoof; suppose that with our railroads and waterways and by the building of a system of packing houses we were enabled to take care of tens of thousands of cattle from the northern states, turn them into dress beef, supply Canada and the foreign markets, and take from the American Beef Trust its most important source of supply what then would happen to the Beef Trust?"

The American is said to have answered: "You would seriously cripple if not break, the Trust."

Mr. Fielding then remarked, it is reported: "That is precisely what I intend to do."

Chicago packers either deny knowledge of the scheme or refuse to discuss it.

The ladies, officers and men professed delight at Hampshire scenery, and the delight even remained after a heavy rain made the countryside a sorry spectacle to English eyes.

A cablegram announcing the second battalion's arrival at the Q. O. R. meeting has caused much gratification. A drumhead service was held at 11, Rev. Dr. Liwyd, of Trinity College, conducting it.
