GROUND BURNING BENEATH THE TOWN

Carbondale, Pa., Threatened with
Destruction by Blazing Coal
Mines.

Carbondale, Pa., March 18.—Literally, a large section of this city stands over an inferno. Fire has been raging in the mine of the Fenn Colliery for several years. The expenditures the company made fighting the fire forced the company into bankruptcy. Since then the flames have raged in fury unconfined.

The fire is close now to the surface of the ground, through which noxious fumes and gases escape. The flames have spread under a great part of Carbondale. It is certain they are eating away the pillars of coal the miners left to support the surface. Should they fall, many houses must be engulfed in a veritable Hades.

Only one resort is left to the citizens; to ask Gov. Stuart for State aid to extinguish the fire. The State's Supreme Court today sustained the finding of the lower court that Carbondale cannot spend \$80,000. It will cost that sum at the least to attack the fire; the city is within \$60,000 of its legal indebtedness.

The request to the Governor will be put on the ground that a public calamity threatens. If State aid is refused all that remains is to wait for the ground to cave in.

MONTREAL DOES NOT FEAR TARIFF WAR

Montreal, March 17.—Enquiries at the office of Hon. W. H. Bradley, consul general of the United States here today developed the fact that exporters on this side of the line are in no wise perturbed over a threatened tariff war between Canada and the States. Instead of there being any rush to get goods into the States before the opening of April, Mr. Bradley stated that exports through Montreal to the States for some weeks past had been smaller than usual. Shipping and railway companies also stated that imports from the United States through Montreal had also been unusually light, so it is evident that there is not much fear amongst business men of any immediate tariff trouble.

The general feeling amongst business and shipping people here is approval of the stand of the government at Ottawa, the opinion being expressed that since our imports from the States are mainly manufactured goods and our exports raw material the dominion stood to gain much more than they would lose if tariff reprisals were indulged in.

SOME NICE BOQUETS FOR THE DAILY MAIL

St. Andrews Beacon.—The Fredericton Daily Mail, which succeeds The Herald as the liberal organ of York county has made its appearance. It is a bright and readable sheet, well filled with interesting news. Its editorial expressions will be a pleasing change to the people of Fredericton.

Since the Herald of Fredericton, suspended publication some months ago, the Liberal party has been without a paper in the N.B. capital. The Daily Mail now makes its appearance as successor to the Herald. It is well printed and gives promise of enterprise and ability in its management.—Wesleyan.

St. John Globe.—The Daily Mail has succeeded The Herald as an organ of the Liberals of Fredericton. It is an eight page paper, six columns to a page, is well printed, has all the local and telegraphic news, and is editorially vigorous in denouncing the provincial government and upholding the Ottawa administration.

Chatham World.—The Daily Mail has appeared in Fredericton, as the successor of the deceased Herald. It is a large paper, with a very large amount of advertising patronage and is evidently well equipped in all departments. It devotes a large space to legislative reports. It is a Liberal paper in both federal and provincial politics.

THE PETITCODIAC RIVER OPEN

Moncton, March 17.—Marking the very earliest opening of navigation on the Petitcodiac river in the history of Moncton, the two-masted schooner Inez, Capt. Beaumont, sailed into port today, being the first vessel of the season to come up river. Previous to the present year the earliest arrival of a vessel at Moncton was March 30, twenty-two years ago. The river has been free from ice for a week or more.

The river steamer Wilfrid C., which laid up here for the winter, is expected to start the season's run shortly.
