## ASK FOR SLAUGHTER OF ALL FOREIGNERS

Chinese Unrest Becomes Acute--Foreign Warships Getting Ready for Action Without Delay.

Peking, June 3.—The consuls at Nanking report that native disturbers in that city have assumed openly an insulting attitude toward foreigners and have defiled the walls of the American consulate in a disgusting manner.

Placards have been posted in the streets calling upon the people to rise and slaughter the foreigners and destroy their property.

Threats that a revolution will be launched on June 5, the date set for the opening of the Nanking exposition, are causing Chinese merchants to flee with their treasures to the country districts where they are burying their wealth.

The authorities at Nanking have removed the bolts from the rifles of the soldiers. The situation is considered to depend entirely upon the attitude of the military in the city, which up to the present time has not manifested symptoms of disloyalty.

German, Japanese and United States men-of-war are lying off the town, and it is said that these vessels will be adequate to protect foreigners in the event of an outbreak. The commanders of the warships have conferred and agreed upon a plan for concerted action if necessary.

All the diplomats at Peking think that an outbreak in the provinces south of the Yngtse-Kiang River is likely to occur at any moment. They believe, however, that it is extremely improbable that the trouble will reach this city.

## WOMAN AND CHILD LEFT ALONE ON A DESERT ISLAND

San Diego, Cal., June 4.—Leaving a woman and child on Guadaloupe Island, 150 miles off San Quintain, Lower California, A. Marconson of Los Angeles and a companion, the latter the husband of the woman, arrived in San Quintain last Wednesday after passing six days in an open boat. This information was brought by steamer from Ensenada, Lower California, yesterday. The party of four was shipwrecked. The two men in a small boat started for San Quintain to obtain help. A relief party has set out for Guadaloupe Island. The island is uninhabited.

## AN EXAMPLE OF THE USE OF AIRSHIPS IN TIME OF WAR

London, June 4.—An army airship made a surprise reconnaissance over London during the night. Leaving Aldershot at 11.30 o'clock last night the aircraft started for London in the teeth of a stiff breeze. It reached St. Pauls two hours later and circled over the Cathedral at a height of 1,000 feet. Returning, the airship arrived at the barracks at Aldershot at 3 o'clock this morning. The distance between Aldershot and London is about 35 miles and the time made by the airship first against and then racing with the wind is considered excellent.

## "ONE SHAVING SET" FOR MRS. EVELYN THAW

Referee in Bankruptcy Can't See How Such a Thing Could be Necessary for Her Use

Pittsburg, June 4.—The postponed hearing in the case of creditors of Harry K. Thaw was resumed today. Referee in Bankruptcy Blair called a halt when the item of "one shaving set" was reached in the bill of Disalvo Bros. of New York against Mrs. Evelyn Thaw. Mr. Blair said he could not see how a shaving set for a woman whose husband was in jail could "be considered necessary, to say the least." Nor could the Pittsburg referee be moved one iota by the talk of counsel.

After some bitterness Mr. Blair announced the hearing postponed until June 24 to give counsel for the Disalvo Bros. time to look up matters and show the necessity for this mysterious shaving set which was bought by Evelyn a short time before she was cut off her husband's credit list entirely.

## WESLEYAN STUDENTS HOLD CRIMINAL ORGIE

Break Into Church, Load Altar Chairs on Cart Containing Beer and Trundle Them in a Drunken Parade--Desecrate Graves and Smash Tombstones.

Saybrook, Conn., June 4.—More than one hundred sophomores of Wesleyan University, "the devil's own," as they style themselves, members of the Theta Nu Epsilon fraternity, stormed Saybrook last night to initiate twelve members. They held sacrilegious revels, destroyed property, stole whatever they saw, assaulted one of the leading citizens of the town, and everyone got even drunker than he was before he arrived.

About sixty more of "the devil's own" went to Lyme, taking with them to that "dry" town all the beer, and things more potent, that they could carry, inside and out. Lyme got off better than did Saybrook, because those who went there got so drunk early in the evening that they could not do any mischief.

SOME NOVIITIATES SWOON.

The degree team of the Saybrook crowd was divided into three classes—"arch demons," "fiends," and "devilings." The latter were the novitiates, and some of them lost consciousness from their torture long before the "rough house" was over and will be in bed for several days.

The twelve novitiates were strapped in the aisles of the cars, face down, and they had to ride this way the entire distance. They were ducked at frequent intervals with beer.

Every time the trains stopped at a station a detail of sophomores got off and stole everything they could lug back on the train. Several of them made a specialty of stealing the signal lanterns, thus endangering the lives of everybody on other trains. These lanterns were tied on a rope and dragged along the tracks behind the train. The noise this made tickled the students hugely.

When Saybrook was reached the novitiates—some of whom were hardly able to walk by this time—were unstrapped and taken from the train blindfolded. Then the "hellish" procession started. The march led down Ferry Street, which was abandoned entirely to the Wesleyan boys. At the Methodist Episcopal Church the procession halted and a number of them broke into the edifice and stole the pulpit furniture. These sacred chairs were loaded into a pushcart with a barrel of beer and the parade was resumed.

DESECRATE CEMETERY.

The march ended at the cemetery. The first thing done there was to pull down as many tombstones as possible, and lift all the slabs that could be lifted and throw them around and break them.

Judge Houston Landen was told of the cemetery to prevent the further desecration of the graves. When he arrived the novitiates were on their knees at the edges of the graves, with their heads stuck in the ground and pails of water were being thrown on them. Several swooned under the water cure.

The students were asked to go away and leave the cemetery, and were told of the law against desecrating graves. A rush was made for the judge and insulting remarks were hurled at him.

SMASH ALL THE DISHES.

Then the crowd went to Fairview Hotel, where a splendid dinner had been ordered and was ready. That dinner lasted until midnight, and when it was over there was not a whole dish or piece of furniture in the dining-room.

Finally things got so bad that Deputy Sheriff Morrow organized a posse of the citizens and went after the drunken collegiates, but the youngsters' sentinels warned them and they all got to the train before the posse arrived. Those of the novitiates who were overcome by the initiation and the initiators who were too drunk to walk were carried.

Warrants have been sworn out and as many boys as Judge Landen can recognize will be arrested. The town authorities will insist upon a thorough investigation and upon prosecution.

## ELECTION SIGNS IN MANITOBA

Winnipeg, June 4.—The Provincial registration dates for Winnipeg and Brandon are: June 15, 16 and 17, and both parties are working under pressure to get every possible name on the lists. Belief grows that the elections will be brought on early. Mr. T. C. Norris, Liberal leader, starts this week on a tour of the whole Province.

## EGYPTIAN EDITOR SCORES ROOSEVELT

Calls Him "a Tyrant, Full of Gall, and a Diabolical Man"—His Speech Declared an Insult.

Cairo, Egypt, June 3.—The Nationalist editors are execrating Mr. Roosevelt with picturesque Orientalism. Sheik Ali Yousoff denounces him in his newspaper, 'Al Moayad' as a tyrant full of gall, a diabolical man, and a bloodthirsty butcher. 'Al Moayad' is regarded as a moderate paper among the Nationalists.

The Coptic newspapers welcome Mr. Roosevelt's dictates as golden texts.

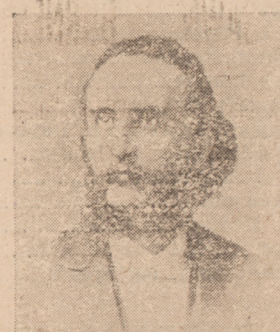
Geneva, Switzerland, June 4.—The young Egyptian committee today issued a violent protest against the sentiments expressed by Theodore Roosevelt in his speech at the Guild Hall in London and in which the former president of the United States expressed the opinion that Great Britain should show a firmer hand in Egypt. The committee declares that the speech was an insult not only to Europe and Egypt but to the whole civilized world.

## REV. W. W. BREWER TO RESUME ACTIVE WORK

Has Received Formal Call From Exmouth St. Church, St. John, After Being out of Active Ministry for Some Years.

St. John, Jan. 6.—The Rev. W. W. Brewer, of Marysville, York Co., is to return again to a pastorate after ten years' absence from active ministerial work. He has been invited to take charge of Exmouth Street Methodist Church at the beginning of the coming church year, which opens in July.

The quarterly board of the Exmouth street church resolved upon extending a call to Mr. Brewer at a session on Thursday evening. The formal invitation has already been forwarded. Since the death of Rev. W. W. Lodge while in the pastorate of Exmouth street church, Rev. Mr. Brewer has been supplying the pulpit in conjunction with Rev. T. J. Deinstadt. During the same period and for some months previous, he and Rev. Mr. Deinstadt have been conducting services at McAdam.

Rev. Mr. Brewer is recognized as one of the most powerful pulpit men which the Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and P. E. Island has ever produced. He came to this province from England thirty years ago entering the conference immediately upon his arrival. About ten years ago he resigned on account of ill health. At that time he was pastor of the Marysville church and at Marysville he has since made his home. Since his retirement from the ministry Rev. Mr. Brewer has interested himself in various ways. At one time he was proprietor of a peanut farm.

Rev. Mr. Brewer has been the incumbent of a St. John pastorate before. At one time he was in charge of Centenary Church. He has also been pastor of each of the two Methodist churches in Charlottetown.

## BRITISH HOUSE OPENS WEDNESDAY

Opinion Now That Fall Session Will Deal with Lords and Election will Come in January

London, June 5.—Despite the deflatory rumors of a compromise conference, the confident expectation now is that there will be an autumn session of parliament to deal with the lords' veto question and an election probably in January.

The necessary business of the session commencing Wednesday comprises the budget, revision of the civil list, a regency bill, modification of the king's accession declaration and the census bill.

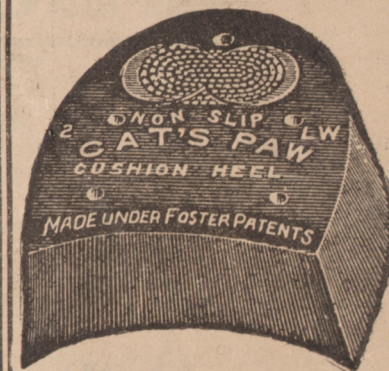
