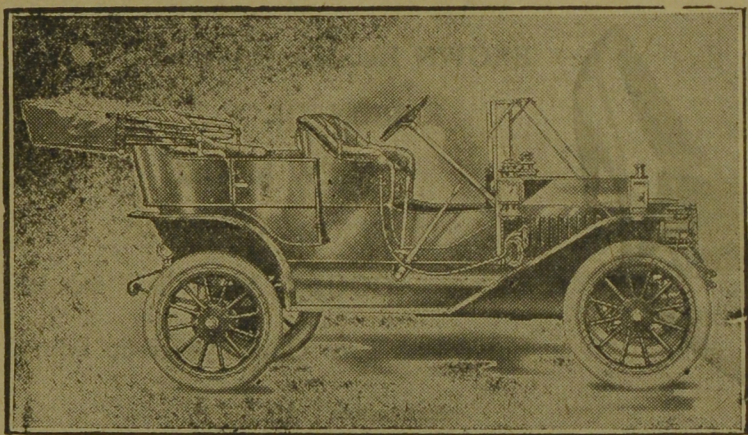

FRED CAMERON DOES THE TRICK AGAIN

Won Five Mile Race at St. John Last Night, Sterling 2nd—Corkery Dropped Out—New Maritime Record.

St. John, May 18.—Running almost at a 100 yards dash clip, Freddie Cameron, of Amherst, winner of the recent Boston A. A. Marathon, won the five mile race in the Victoria rink last night and incidentally clipped 19 45 seconds off the maritime indoor record, previously made by him at the Maritime Championships in Halifax last year. Cameron's time for the race last night was 26 mins. 24 1-5 seconds, while his previous record was 26 mins. 44 seconds. Ernie Sterling, of St. John, finished a close second, in 26 mins. 29 2-5 seconds. Corkery did not finish the race. Cameron also came very near to breaking the maritime indoor record for one mile of 4 mins. and 40 seconds, held by Ross of Halifax. Cameron finished the first mile of last night's race in 4 mins. and 43 2-5 seconds, which is certainly remarkably fast time. Sterling and Corkery, of Toronto, also ran a good race, but the round track did not suit Corkery's long stride and as a result he lost a lap early in the race, which he never regained. Sterling plugged gamely on all through the race and at the finish was only about one-tenth of a lap behind Cameron, and about three-quarters of a lap ahead of Corkery. It was about nine o'clock when the runners were called to the scratch. Cameron got a great reception as he stepped out to the track, as did Corkery and Sterling. At the crack of the pistol Cameron jumped into the lead closely followed by Corkery and Sterling. Cameron started at a terrific pace and after about two laps had been run, had gained about a quarter of a lap on the other two runners. Corkery and Sterling kept pretty close together, but on the third lap Sterling passed Corkery and started for Cameron, amid deafening cheers. Cameron also spurred and at the close of the first mile was still a quarter of a lap in the lead. The time for the first mile was 4.43 2-5. In the second mile Cameron passed Corkery on fifth lap and the two ran together until the tenth lap when Corkery passed Cameron, but was repassed again on the twelfth lap. Sterling was still running a quarter of a lap behind Cameron. The time to this mile was 10 mins. 4 seconds. In the third mile Sterling spurred and passed Corkery on the third lap, and again went after Cameron, but was unable to cut down his lead. The time to this mile was 15 mins. 26 seconds. Things livened up a bit in the next mile for Corkery loosened up and on the seventh lap, passed Sterling and at the end of the mile had caught and passed Cameron. Time, 20 mins. 56 1-5 seconds. The crowd got greatly excited at this time. On the first lap of the last mile Cameron let out a little, to which the other two runners responded gamely. On the seventh lap, however, Cameron had caught Corkery again and then came the final spurt. Sterling and Corkery also ran hard and all three finished the race with a magnificent burst of speed. Cameron's time for the five miles was 26 mins. 24 1-5 seconds, and Sterling's 26 minutes 29 2-5 seconds. Corkery did not finish. At the close of the race the crowd gave three hearty cheers for the lad from Amherst.

When seen after the race Cameron said "I feel as though I could keep right on for the marathon distance. I am about four pounds heavier than when I won the race in Boston, but I expect to take off as soon as I start training for the Canadian championships. Sterling is a good man, and with proper training ought to make some of the fast ones hustle."

The preliminary events were all well contested. The 220 yards dash was won by Garnett with Willis second. Time 27 1-5. The one mile race was also very evenly contested. Peterson winning, with Cribbs second and Danaher third. The time was 5 mins. 9 seconds. In the 440 yards dash Garnett again proved himself a winner, running the distance in 58 2-5 seconds. Willis was second. Garnett will likely enter the sprinting events in the sports in connection with Amherst Old Home Week and ought to give a good account of himself.

It was announced at the rink last night that Cameron, Corkery and Sterling would in all probability be seen in a ten mile race at the rink on Saturday night. The races last night were largely attended, the rink being packed. The officials were:

TRACK AND FIELD.

Matt McGrath of the New York Athletic Club, hurled the 56-pound weight without run or follow, two inches and a fraction beyond the world's record at the annual games of the Christian Brothers of Ireland, in New York, but it is probable that the new record will not be allowed by the A. A. U., as a detachable handle was used instead of the fixed handle prescribed in the rules. The record is 38.33, made last winter by Pat McDonald, of the Irish-American Athletic Club.

Scott of Leland Stanford University set a new American intercollegiate mark of 12 ft. 6 in. for the pole vault in the first annual Pacific coast intercollegiate field day meet Saturday.

The world's high jump record for women is claimed for Miss Rachel Hardwick of Quincy, Mass., who in competition Saturday, cleared 4 feet 6 inches. This exceeds by an inch and a half the record established last week by Miss Theodora Wheeler of Fairfield, Conn., a student at Vassar College.

The first championship meet of the new A. A. U. of Canada is likely to be held in Montreal this fall on the M. A. A. A. grounds. The date suggested for the meet is Sept. 24.—Mr. E. Herb Brown, president of the Quebec Association of the A. A. U. of C. is in communication with Mr. Merrick, president of the A. A. U. The meet is expected to bring out the best athletes of both Canada and the United States.

KUBIAK EASY FOR LANGFORD.

New York, May 17.—Sam Langford the Boston negro, punished Al Kubiak, the Michigan heavyweight, so severely tonight that the referee was forced to stop a scheduled ten round bout at the Fairmont A. C. in the second round. Kubiak outweighed the black by at least forty pounds, but the shifty negro scored with such terrific body blows that the white man suffered keenly. In the second round he floored Kubiak for the count of four, and the crowd demanded to have the bout stopped before Langford could hit him again.

DAN MACDONALD TO BOX BILLY ST. CLAIR

Arrangements have been completed for a boxing bout between Dan McDonald, the Cape Breton wrestler, and "Billy" St. Clair, who is in the city with George LeBarr. The bout will take place here on May 24th.

He had a chance to box in Philadelphia, but when he told what he wanted for his services the promoter chased him out of the office.

LONDON A GOOD BUYER OF OUR BEST STOCKS

London, May 16.—Mr. W. M. Aitken one of Canada's leading young financiers, has returned from a business trip to England. It is needless to add that his mission to London and other British financial centres, was a success, and Mr. Aitken appears to have been given a hearty welcome by English bankers and others, who realize that the Dominion is a land of great promise for the safe investment of capital.

Mr. Aitken looks the picture of health and happiness, and his voyage across the Atlantic has evidently given him renewed vigor and energy to carry to a successful issue the many important matters financially and otherwise, which require his personal attention from day to day.

The financial situation in London, when he left was decidedly favorable and he was of the opinion that the purchase of Canadian bonds by London since the first of the year has been comparatively more extensive than that of United States bond issues, and he thinks that a very active stock market will follow in the wake of these important bond transfers. Canada's credit said Mr. Aitken is first class in England, and it may be stated that the Canadian Pacific Railway and the securities of the Dominion of Canada stand about on the same level, which should be complimentary to both the country and that railway which has contributed so much to the prosperity of the Dominion.
