## THE PRINTING BUREAU TO BE REORGANIZED

**The Secretary of State, Who Has Been Conducting an Investigation, Will Make Important Changes--Bureau Though Overstocked Showed a Snug Profit Last Year.**

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—For a year past, Hon. Charles Murphy, secretary of state, has been conducting a most thorough job of governmental house cleaning, in connection with the country's huge printing bureau at the capital, which annually handled an output of printed and stationery matter costing over \$1,500,000, and which is one of the very largest industrial establishments of the kind in Canada.

The results of that house cleaning, begun voluntarily and without suggestion from the opposition in or out of parliament, are embodied in a voluminous report to the governor-in-council which will be presented to parliament on the opening of the session. The report concludes with a series of comprehensive recommendations looking to the re-organization of the whole bureau from top to bottom, the rectifying of abuses inherent in the anomalies of the act of parliament which created it many years ago, and the placing of the whole business of parliamentary and governmental printing on an up-to-date and business-like basis.

### STARTED ON WRONG BASIS.

In brief, the minister has found as a result of many weeks of the most painstaking investigation, that there has been ever since the bureau was created a radical lack of co-ordination, and administrative unity in the conduct of the bureau due primarily to the serious defects of the initial act establishing it. Parliament started the bureau on a wrong basis, with divided jurisdiction, an unbusiness-like organization and no effective central control. It has been wrong ever since.

Mr. Murphy has found waste, both of energy and money. He has found graft proven on the part of practically only one man, the late Frank Gouldthrit, superintendent of stationery, who, because of a lax and inadequate system of accounting, took advantage of that system starting three years ago to collect a rake-off on goods purchased from a half dozen New York firms at higher than Canadian market rates.

The loss to the country on stationery supplies so purchased is estimated, after thorough examination, at \$94,000. But as a partial offset to this, Mr. Murphy, by prompt action in cancelling orders, and in seizing goods already delivered under fraudulent circumstances, recovered \$23,366 of improper profits. Thus the net

loss is reduced to about \$70,000. No evidence was shown of any improper dealings with any Canadian firm.

### BUREAU SHOWED A PROFIT.

The minister has found a further committal of this system of purchasing supplies that in many lines there has been a gross and absurd overstocking, though the final loss from this will be comparatively small, since most of the present over-plus can be ultimately used or otherwise disposed of. He has found uneconomic methods of doing business, radical defects of plant and machinery, and inadequate discipline. And despite all this he has found that the books of the printing bureau show that as a factory the credits charged for work done over-balanced the cost for wages and supplies last year by over \$300,000.

Numerous reforms have already been instituted. The officials and employees found guilty of malfeasance, or proved to be incompetent, have been dismissed. The ex-superintendent of stationery, Frank Gouldthrit, fled at the beginning of the inquiry and a few days later committed suicide. The superintendent of printing has been succeeded by an experienced and thoroughly competent practical man. All supplies are now bought by public tender. An adequate accounting system has been established.

### PROPOSED REFORMS.

To finish the work Mr. Murphy recommends to parliament that a new act be passed governing the printing bureau. The central idea in the new legislation will be to replace the present divided jurisdiction and disjointed action of the various branches by a central and well defined control of the king's printer over all branches with direct responsibility to the minister.

To prevent present waste in preparing printing and revising copy in which, by the way, the members of parliament lead the way, Mr. Murphy proposes a central bureau for the editing and final preparations of all printing matter. This bureau will act as a sort of sieve or clearing house, regulating blue books, Hansard, stationery supplies, etc., and insuring economy and efficiency in every direction.

To remedy the defects of plant and operation the minister proposes many improvements. With all the recommendations carried into effect it is believed that a net saving to the public treasury of at least \$150,000 per year will be effected.

## SOME NOTABLE MEN AT THE Y.M.C.A. CONVENTION

Mr. Cyrus McCormick, head of the great harvester concern, is another of America's great men whose pride and delight it is to help in uplift work, and his association with it goes back for a quarter of a century. Honored in election as one of the Vice-Presidents of the Conference, Cyrus McCormick has earned the distinction. Twenty-five years ago Mr. McCormick on leaving college went to Chicago, where he joined Mr. John B. Farwell and Mr. James Houghtaling. The trio succeeded in rehabilitating the Y. M. C. A. in the Windy City. They erected a building costing a million dollars, the greatest structure of its kind at that day and caused the Y. M. C. A. world to stand aghast. And now history is repeating itself, for there has now been raised one million more for the purpose of building 12 branch Y's throughout the city. One of these will in all probability be a low-priced hotel for young men.

Mr. John W. Ross, President of the Montreal Y. M. C. A., is a man who they say is thoroughly posted as the General Secretary in the details attendant upon the erection of three buildings which will cost \$400,000. Someone says he "sleeps on the job."

## MONK AND BOURASSA CELEBRATED VICTORY

Montreal, Nov. 9.—A big demonstration was given Henri Bourassa, Armand Lavergne, F. D. Monk and other heroes in the Drummond-Arthabaska by-election, this evening at the Ontario Street skating rink, at the recent victory.

The rink was crowded to listen to general glorification held to celebrate the orations. It was such a demonstration as to show that the campaign of Bourassa throughout this province must be reckoned with, in future political horoscopes, as a distinct power.

While Gilbert, the man who was elected in Drummond and Arthabaska in the Nationalist interests, was the nominal centre of the gathering, the crowd had come to applaud Henri Bourassa, and they did it.

F. D. Monk, who has gradually become more and more a leader of the anti-naval element in this province, was also present and made a speech, being greeted with almost as much applause as Bourassa, although he made a much more guarded speech. A similar reception met Armand Lavergne, who was the fire-eating orator in the Drummond and Arthabaska election.

The meeting was typically dramatic more especially when Bourassa, at the close of an impassioned speech, proposed a resolution endorsing the policy of the Nationalists upon which the Drummond and Arthabaska election was won. Mr. Bourassa called for a show of hands on the resolution, and in an instant there showed a forest of hands.
