Entry by 3.00 proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

> Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a

(including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot ob-
