SANDY McLEOD WON FROM BUCH LAST NIGHT

American Got First Fall—Promoter Sayer Announces Another Match Here New Year's Night.

It was not a very big crowd that saw Sandy McLeod and Cyclone Buch wrestle at the City Opera House last night, but all went away thinking they had got their money's worth and determined to see the bout that Promoter J. J. Sayer announced that he will put on here on New Year's night. Dan McDonald is expected to be one of the contestants.

Sandy McLeod, the middleweight champion of Scotland won last night from Buch, who claims the middleweight championship of New York State. The Yankee wrestler took the first fall in 11 minutes 15 seconds with a clear bar-hold. The Scot took the other two, the first with a crutch hold and an arm-lock in 11 minutes 15 seconds and the second in 23 minutes 15 seconds with a half Nelson and head scissors.

The crowd seemed to think that Buch was given his fall too soon, but Sayer, who was referee said the fall was all right.

BUCH MADE GOOD IMPRESSION

Buch made a good impression on the crowd and showed that he knew pretty nearly everything about the wrestling game. He wasn't very particular about the methods he used either and the crowd hissed him when he was observed putting his teeth in to McLeod's arm. Buch was twelve or more pounds lighter than his opponent, but gave the Scot all he could do. The New Yorker's bridging was a feature of the match. Several times Sandy had his man on the mat and brought his whole weight on his chest repeatedly only to have Buch bridge and finally wriggle away. McLeod's head-scissors was noticeable throughout the bout. This was the hold that made Dan McDonald give McLeod a fall in a recent match between the two.

McLEOD POPULAR

The crowd, if the little gathering of sixty or seventy can be called a crowd, seemed to be with McLeod, although Buch had his supporters. The gate was just enough to pay the rent and Promoter Sayer went in the hole to quite an extent but still thinks that wrestling will take here.

Buch attributes his defeat to a long railway journey from New York here and mainly to the fact that he was suffering from stomach trouble since the preceding night. The American gave McLeod credit for winning a straight match, although at the time the referee awarded McLeod his first fall Buch put up a howl.

Tonight Cyclone Burns will meet Kilonis and McLeod at Moncton, agreeing to throw both in an hour. Dan McDonald will appear in the Carleton City Hall, Saturday night, agreeing to throw ten men in an hour.

PORKY FLYNN HAD THE BETTER OF MORRIS

Fall River, Dec. 15.—Dan (Porky) Flynn, of East Boston, and Andy Morris of Boston, went 12 rounds to a draw last night before 1200 members of the Colonial Club at the Casino on Morgan street. Referee Cote's decision was popularly received, although Flynn had the better of the bout, and was the stronger at the finish, having Morris groggy and all but gone. It was Morris' great recuperative power that stood him in good stead, and his ability to recover saved him time and again.

In the last few rounds Morris forced the boxing, and in the 10th and 11th rounds he got in some stiff punches that made Flynn wince. It was "Porky's" stinging left that did the greatest damage, the East Boston lad reaching Morris almost at will.

Flynn was the cleverer of the pair, and in the fighting he roughed it so much that Morris complained of Flynn's elbow work, which did considerable damage.

Sam Langford was in Flynn's corner, as was also Bob Armstrong. Langford was introduced with a challenge to box any man in the world. Sandy Ferguson was in Morris' corner, and before the main bout Langford and Sandy, who are to meet soon, had an oral tilt that delighted the crowd.

Flynn did all the leading in the first round and ripped the left to the face several times. It was Flynn's round by a slight margin, but in the second Morris evened things with a couple of heavy rights to the body.

Owing to an injury to Young Ernie's leg he will not be able to box Pal Moore in Philadelphia, Dec. 21. Tommy Langdon will probably take Ernie's place.

PRO HOCKEY LEAGUE FORMED LAST EVENING

New Glasgow, Moncton and Halifax Crescents in New Organization—Double Schedule.

Halifax, Dec. 15.—There have been some rather sensational moves in hockey circles in the Maritime Provinces during the past twenty-four hours, two leagues, an amateur and a professional, having been formed since eight o'clock Wednesday evening. For some time past hockey enthusiasts have been in a state of excitement over the outlook for hockey, fearing that the winter would come and there would be neither a professional or amateur league.

At a meeting of representatives of the Wanderers, Crescents, Amherst and Truro held in the latter town Wednesday evening, the Nova Scotia hockey league was re-organized and a four-team league formed, consisting of the Crescents, Wanderers, Truro and Amherst.

A schedule was drawn up, and it was thought that amateur hockey would reign supreme, but this evening representatives of the Crescents, New Glasgow and Moncton held a meeting at the Arena Rink, and a professional league was formed, consisting of the above named teams.

SCOTCH MARRIAGE LAWS NOT LAX

London, Dec. 14.—The peculiar marriage laws of Scotland have been attracting a good deal of fresh interest since the "irregular" Scotch marriage of Mr. Frank Jay Gould and the young English actress Miss Edith Kelly. It is indeed a remarkable fact that the marriage laws of England and Scotland differ so widely as they do; but, then it must be remembered that these different laws have existed at least, the Scotch law has, since before the union of the crowns and have never been altered. It is undoubtedly an easy matter to contract matrimony in Scotland but it is not, after all, quite so easy as it sometimes made out to be in fiction and on the stage.

It is remarked in M. A. P. that many a romance has been made to hinge upon such a plot as two persons playing in amateur theatricals going through a mock marriage only to find themselves tied hard and fast for life. Of course this is sheer nonsense, for the validity of the marriage by declaration depends on the intention and free consent of the parties to be married. Nor is an irregular marriage obtained by fraud, force or fear in any way binding.

Common enough however, is what is known as "marriage by repute or habit." If two persons have lived together as husband and wife, have addressed each other as husband and wife and permitted others to address them the Scotch law holds them married, although proof of marriage may be wanting—even if, no ceremony has been gone through with. Therefore the man who, as sometimes happens in England, goes through a form of marriage before a sham priest with a confiding girl and afterward repudiates the marriage could not escape in Scotland for the courts would give the woman her rights.

There is also the "marriage by promise." Of course the women must satisfy the courts that marriage was promised; but provided she can do so she can claim the man as her "lawful wedded husband."

In Scotland it is quite unnecessary to be married in church or even have a clergyman or registrar present, "marriage by declaration or acknowledgment" being held as binding as any other form. Here the contracting parties simply declare either verbally or in writing before two witnesses that they take each other for husband and wife, or that they have already done so. Registration is not even necessary, though it is usual sooner or later to apply to the sheriff of the county to have the marriage recorded.

In England of course, a minor cannot legally marry without the consent of the parents or guardians but in Scotland a minor need ask nobody's leave before marrying, provided the "man" is more than fourteen and the "woman" more than

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
