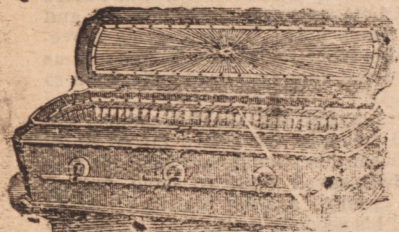

EXPULSION OF JEWS IS STILL GOING ON

Kiev, Russia, June 30.—The expul-
sion of Jews still continues, 158 being
sent out of Kiev in the last two days
61 from Solomoka and 57 from Dem-
ieffka. Many of those expelled were

proceeded to specified destinations,
under the protection of passports.

**CLASSIFICATION OF
FREIGHT RATES WILL
NOT BE SUSPENDED**

Washington, June 30—Announce-
ment was made by the Interstate
Commerce Commission today that it
would not suspend official classifica-
tion No. 36, involving over 6,000
items which was filed to become ef-
fective July 1. This declaration to
act is regarded as a victory for the
railroads. For nearly a month, the
commission has been overwhelmed
with protests against the proposed
classification of freight, many ship-
pers seeming to entertain the idea
that the re-arrangement of freight
classification would result in largely
increased rates. The subject was
considered very carefully by the Com-
mission, a thorough and comprehen-
sive check being prepared on the en-
tire classification. In the 6,000
items and ratings involved there are
only 58 changes, of which 28 reduc-
tions and 30 advances, the latter in-
cluding 12 increases in carted wheats.
In an official statement issued today
the Commissions says:

The principal increases are the
carted minimum of horse vehicles
from 10,000 to 11,000 pounds and an
advance in the classification of auto-
mobiles from first class to one hun-
dred and ten per cent. of a class
and the Commission is not satisfied
that these items should be suspended.
This ruling, however, will not pre-
vent or delay the hearing of any
complaint which has been made or
may be made against the reasonableness
of these or any other increases ef-
fected by the new classification.
