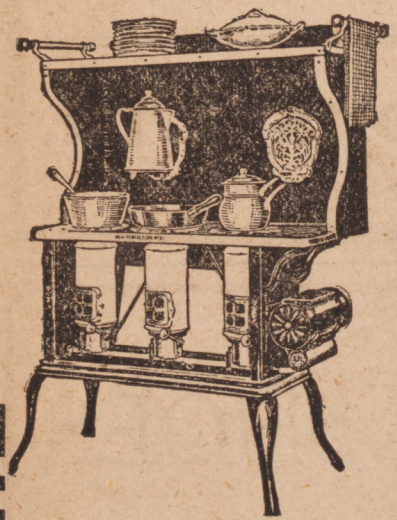

RELIABLE RECIPES

APPLE SHORTCAKE.

Peel tart apples, cut into slices, sprinkle with sugar and put into a pan. Put a plain cake batter or dough over the apples and bake at once. Serve with cream and sugar.

STRAWBERRY PUNCH.

Mash three quarts of ripe, capped strawberries, first picking over carefully and rejecting any fruit that is soft. Add to the fruit three heaping cups of granulated sugar and set aside for an hour or two. Squeeze through a muslin bag, pour the liquid into a punch bowl, add crushed ice, the juice of two lemons and a bottle of apollinaris water. Put a cupful of large, capped strawberries into the punch just before serving.

INDIA RELISH.

Measure three quarts of green tomatoes, after chopping them, and add to them one quart of chopped onions and six red or green peppers chopped fine. Put these ingredients into a cheese-cloth bag and hang where they can drain all night. In the morning put the vegetables into a preserving kettle, add to them one and one-half pounds of brown sugar, one-half cup of salt, three tablespoonfuls of ground mustard, two tablespoonfuls of tumeric, three tablespoonfuls of celery seed and one quart of vinegar. Boil all together for one hour and seal hot.

RHUBARB SYRUP.

Cut unpeeled rhubarb into pieces and weigh. To seven pounds of fruit add two pounds of sugar, and put into a preserving kettle. Add three and one-half pints of water and boil for forty minutes, stirring constantly. Press through a fine hair sieve and bottle. If you like, you may add the thin peel of a lemon to the syrup. When ready to drink add to the syrup an equal quantity of plain or mineral water, and serve with crushed ice.

OLD-FASHIONED ENGLISH PLUM PUDDING.

One-half pound beef suet, one-half pound raisins, one-half pound of currants, four eggs, one-half pound dark brown sugar, one-half pound flour, one-half pound bread crumbs, two teaspoonfuls of allspice, one-half pound citron, chopped fine, one-quarter teaspoonful of baking soda. Chop the suet, seed the raisins and wash the currants. Mix all the ingredients well together, dredging the fruit with flour. Dip a square of muslin into boiling water, flour it well, put the pudding into the centre of the cloth and tie it up firmly. Place a tin plate with holes in it in the bottom of a pot, put in the pudding, fill with boiling water and boil for from three to four hours.

KING OF PORTUGAL
WANTS A BRIDE

London, June 29.—Young King Manuel of Portugal is looking for a suitable bride, but none of the marriageable Princesses of Europe seems to be over anxious to share his some what unstable Throne. His failure to secure a wife during his recent tour is a source of great disappointment not only to Manuel himself but to his advisers.

Manuel is not wealthy as monarchs go. His civil list is just \$1,000 a day, and it was hoped he would be able to make a match with a popular Princess possessing large means in her own right. The father of the Princess was strongly opposed to the alliance, not that he disliked the young Portuguese King but because of the unsettled state of the country.

Since the assassination of the late King Carlos and his eldest son, the condition of Portugal has not improved, and there are fears that before very long serious trouble will break out. A well-known Portuguese politician in a letter to a prominent Englishman, says that the people are intensely dissatisfied with the existing regime and the growing influence of the old clericalism at court, and if reforms are not quickly initiated and the members of the old camarilla dismissed, a revolution may break out at any moment.

CYCLONE KILLED THREE

Moose Jaw, Sask., June 29.—Details which have reached here from Section 31, 1330, about 60 miles from Moose Jaw, show that three persons were killed and seven more or less seriously injured. The dead are Ed. Maddigan and two little children; injured, his mother, two sisters and two brothers, a hired man named Wilson, leg broken; a man named Palmer, collarbone broken, and two others, Thomas and Ward, cut and bruised about the face. Medical help was rushed to the scene. The cyclone was followed by a terrific hail-storm, which swept a strip of country about a mile wide, destroying every house in its path.

LADIES' SKIRT.

Paris Pattern No. 2998

All Seams Allowed.

Made with a seven-gored yoke upper part and a plaited flounce lower part, this attractive skirt is one of the advanced models for summer wear. It may be made as part of a suit, three-piece costume or dress, or worn with shirtwaist of any material as a separate skirt. It is adaptable to serge, mohair, Panama cloth, voile, taffeta, heavy linen or silk. It may also be made with a combination of two materials. The groups of plaits give a pretty flare around the feet and the joining of the two portions is stitched to represent a tuck. If desired, this may be hidden by a trimming of braid or embroidery. The pattern is in 6 sizes—22 to 32 inches waist measure. For 26 waist the skirt requires 5 1/2 yards of material 36 inches wide. Width of lower edge, about 4 1/2 yards.
