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

PUBLIC NOTICE

BOARD OF HEALTH

Landlords, Owners, Tenants and Occupiers of Houses and Premises in the City of Fredericton, are hereby notified and required forthwith to

CLEANSE AND PURIFY THEIR PREMISES

by removing all filthy and offensive matter, including the cleaning of cellars and premises generally, so that the same may be ready for inspection immediately, otherwise the fines and penalties prescribed by the Act of Assembly and Provincial Board of Health will be rigidly and indiscriminately enforced.

The following regulations are required to be observed in removing rubbish and offensive matter within the City, viz:

1. All refuse not of an offensive matter, or that may become offensive from decay, may be deposited at the City dump in rear of the City Hall.
2. No refuse or cleanings of any description will be permitted to be dumped, deposited, or placed either on any of the Public Landings, the flats, or any of the River banks or shores, or elsewhere in the City except the locality named in regulation one (as above.)
3. Persons desirous of removing night soil, decaying vegetable matter, or other offensive substances or matter, must apply to the undersigned Inspector, when permission will be granted, defining where and how the same is to be deposited and disposed of.
4. The use of the City surface sewers, or of private sewers leading to the River, is absolutely forbidden, and such sewers must be forthwith disconnected and abandoned. In such cases application must be at once made in the usual way prescribed to enter the City sewers provided for that purpose.

Parties desiring License to keep more than two cows, must apply to the Local Board of Health through the undersigned.

Any infringement of these regulations will be punished by fine and imprisonment as the law directs.

THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY NOW A PARTY OF FACTIONS

Much Advertised House Cleaning Frolic
Has Been Postponed—Once Great Party
Going From Bad to Worse.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

The official announcement handed out from the Opposition caucus at Ottawa, which is said to have reaffirmed its "unswerving loyalty" to Mr. R. L. Borden, signifies that the Opposition have found it expedient to postpone their much-advertised spring housecleaning.

Notwithstanding the heroic efforts put forth by the Toronto News, which is close to the official leader of the Opposition, it has been apparent for some time that Mr. Borden would be unable to effect any of the reorganization which was so strenuously pressed upon him. The programme outlined for him was that the Hon. George E. Foster was to be sent to the guillotine and Mr. Monk, the Quebec leader, was to be deposed, while a score or more of the "Old Tupper Crowd" who were described as "cobwebs" and "deadwood" were to be summarily dismissed.

It speedily developed, however, that none of these gentlemen were willing to submit themselves to the executioner, and Mr. Borden had neither the authority nor the courage to enforce the demands of the reorganizers. So after all the accusation and re-creation and all the clamor for heroic treatment, the party is to remain in statu quo. This, however, does not destroy the fact that the dissension still exists and that the cause thereof has not been removed.

The inspired correspondent of the Toronto News has diagnosed the cause of the Opposition's worries as "general ineffectiveness," and, while he does not say so, the underlying cause of this general ineffectiveness is undoubtedly, the accumulated result of years of lack of strong leadership. Mr. Borden has been ten years at the

head of the Opposition forces. If he were endowed with those qualities which are essential to the successful leadership of a political party, he would long ago have demonstrated his ability. He has had ample opportunity to impress his authority upon the rank and file and also ample opportunity to outline a programme upon which the Conservative party could make a united appeal to the country. He has made sundry and divers attempts to propound a policy in opposition to the government's yet the best that can be said for him and all his various attempts is, to use the words of the Toronto World, that "his leadership has miserably failed."

It simply comes to this, that the Conservative party, which in days gone by was led by men of constructive genius and statesmanship, is now a party of factions, under a leader who is nominally the head of the forces, but who is not able to carry his party with him upon any single definite line of public policy. The party is divided on the question of the tariff. It is split into half a dozen or more factions on the question of the navy. It is united upon only one question, and that is the desire to get into office.

Instead of gaining in strength and efficiency and influence in the country the Opposition at Ottawa has gone from bad to worse. It is now in a much more weakened condition than it has been at any time since it was overwhelmed by the debacle of 1886. It is obviously dissatisfied with the leader, but it is in the helpless position that if Mr. Borden were to be deposed, there is no man in sight to take his place. Hence that "unanimous resolution of loyalty" in the caucus.

KING'S MEDAL FOR POLICE AND FIREMEN

Edward VII will award Thirty Medals
per Year for Acts of Bravery Performed in Colonies.

An important and interesting despatch from Downing St. deals with the institution by His Majesty of "the King's Police Medal," a decoration to be awarded to members of the constabulary forces and fire brigades throughout His Majesty's dominions, colonies and protected territories, and or which all members of recognized British police forces and fire brigades are eligible, provided that the services for which they are recommended satisfy the conditions of the regulations, which are, briefly, as follows:

(a) Conspicuous gallantry in saving life and property, or in preventing crime, or arresting criminals; the risks incurred to be estimated with due regard to the obligations and duties of the officers concerned.

(b) A specially distinguished record in administrative or detective service.

(c) Success in organizing police forces or fire brigades or departments or in maintaining their organization under special difficulties.

(d) Special services in dealing with serious or widespread outbreaks of crime or public disorder, or of fire.

(e) Valuable political and secret services.

(f) Special service to royalty and heads of States.

(g) Prolonged service; but only when distinguished by very exceptional ability and merit.

The number of medals to be awarded for service in His Majesty's Dominions Beyond the Seas is not to exceed thirty in one year. There will be an annual award of this medal, and any recommendations which Colonial Ministers may wish to make should reach Downing Street by the 30th September in each year. It is essential that every such recommendation should specify the particular act of gallantry, or special service, or record of service, in respect of which the candidate is recommended.

The medal is to be designed and styled "The King's Police Medal," and is "to consist of a circular Medal of Silver with Our Effigy on the obverse, and on the reverse a design emblematic of Protection from danger and shall bear on the rim the name of the person to whom the Medal is awarded." This medal is to be worn by those to whom it may be awarded suspended on the left breast, the ribbon—an inch and three-quarters in width—being of dark blue, with a narrow silver stripe on either side. Additional acts of gallantry performed by those who may have previously won the King's Police Medal will be rewarded with additional bars.

WANT TO SMOKE AS BROTHER DOES

Massachusetts Girls Think they Can
Toy with Cigarettes Just as Well
as Men.

Spencer, Mass., April 14.—Two young girls, hardly out of short dresses, smoked cigarettes in front of Officer John M. Norton a few days ago and Officer Norton immediately got into action.

He told the girls to throw away the paper smokes and hurry away with unusual speed, or else he would cause them infinite annoyance. At the same time he read them a lecture on the evils of cigarette smoking, telling them that only a "brazen-faced hussy" would smoke cigarettes.

A little later his remarks found their way into the local paper.

At once Officer Norton began to receive letters from young women of his own and surrounding towns.

Yesterday the last straw in the shape of a letter arrived in his letter box. The letter follows:

"Officer Norton:

"Dear Officer—I have just seen a lot of large type in the newspaper to the effect that 'Girls Must Not Smoke Cigarettes,' which statement emanated from you.

"I don't get you at all on this matter. You say that a girl who smokes on the street is brazen-faced. You say that something ails her head. Is that so, Officer Norton? I utterly fail to get you.

"If a girl who smokes cigarettes is brazen-faced and weak-headed, why isn't a boy who does the same thing? I think he is—if the girls are.

"You see, Officer Norton, I am a girl, and it is being drilled into my head that boys and girls should have the same rights and privileges. I am being taught that my brother is not my superior, but my equal; we are having the same school advantages; physical training belongs to us both; we have the same standard of purity, and I expect some day we shall have equal pay for equal work.

A pick-pocket profited by the incident and relieved a Dutch marine of his pocket book containing \$1,200. Several arrests were made. It was said that the act was one of protest against the action of the opera comique.

HOME SEEKERS ATTENTION

The Grand Trunk Railway are planning Excursions to the Canadian North West. These have been christened Home Seekers' Excursions and bring to mind the thought that there are thousands of new homes yet to be found in this ever-growing country—particularly along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The Grand Trunk Pacific has acquired sufficient land to make nearly 100 towns, cities, between Winnipeg and Edmonton. The lots are now placed on the market for sale, and are being rapidly picked up.

Since last September between Winnipeg and Edmonton, the G.T.R., have been operating passenger and freight service. This is a distance of 703 miles, and all along the line there are villages and towns springing up with surprising activity.

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


