THE TORONTO GLOBE ON MARITIME UNION

(Toronto Globe)

Maritime union is in the air. The rapid increase of population in western Canada, and the certainty that the redistribution of seats in the Commons following upon next year's census the territory west of Lake Superior will have a considerably larger representation at Ottawa than the three Maritime Provinces, give occasion for a discussion of a union of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. It will be an exceedingly difficult and delicate operation to combine three Provinces so proud of their history and their achievements. The questions of a new name, of a capital for the united Provinces and of the proportional representation in the new Assembly of the various units in the consolidation loom up large. There is a good deal of jealousy between St. John and Halifax, and it is probable that the influence of each city would be directed toward preventing the Assembly from choosing the other as capital. Fredericton the present capital of New Brunswick, would be likely to resent rather keenly any movement that would be derogatory to its dignity. There would be little possibility of Charlottetown, the charming capital of Prince Edward Island, becoming the seat of government of the United Maritime Provinces, and therefore Charlottetown would hardly be enthusiastic in the cause of union. Nor are these rivalries of the chief cities the only obstacle in the way of union. There are diverse industrial interests in the various Provinces that no doubt feel safer under the present system. Nova Scotia's Assembly specializes in legislation regarding mines and fisheries, while New Brunswick legislators are expert on forest problems. The Prince Edward Islanders are farmers and the problems of the farm are their special concern. There would be in the minds of many business men of the various Provinces indisposition to entrust the legislative control of their affairs to a new Legislature composed in a large measure of men who have never studied the conditions of business in all the Provinces.

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But if the interests tending to the perpetuation of present conditions are powerful, destiny itself seems to be on the side of union. The men of eastern Canada are intellectually the peers of any in the Dominion. They will not always be content to see the tide of immigration pass through their ports en route to the West without making some effort to attract the new-comers to the development of the exceedingly rich natural resources of the Maritime region. There is room for several millions of people in the Provinces by the sea, and only by union can their inhabitants establish adequate emigration bureaux in Great Britain and obtain their due influence in the national councils at Ottawa. Three little Provinces in three little boats are not nearly so impressive as one good big craft would be manned by Nova Scotians and New Brunswickers and Prince Edward Islanders all pulling together.

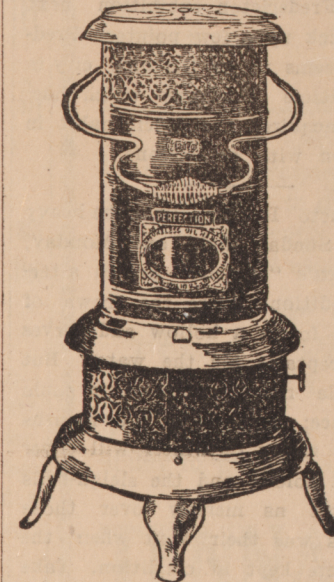

NEW FOOD STANDARD

Ottawa, Oct. 13—New food standards, prepared during the past year by Mr. Anthony McGill, Chief Analyst of the Inland Revenue Department assisted by experts working under him, are now before the Cabinet Council, and will probably be promulgated by an Order-in-Council this autumn. The new standards, so far prepared, cover milk and its products, and grain and grain products.

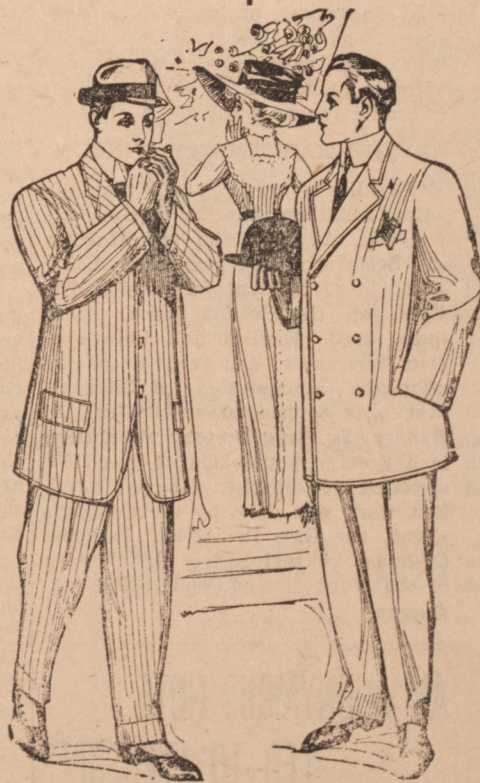
