## CONFIRMATION AT ST. DUNSTAN'S CHURCH TOMORROW MORNING

His Lordship Bishop Casey Will Arrive This Evening--Will be Here Several Days.

His Lordship Bishop Casey of St. John will arrive in the city tonight and will remain here until next Wednesday or Thursday for the purpose of administering the sacrament of confirmation, at St. Dunstan's Church in this city, at St. Anthony's Church in St. Mary's and at other places in this county. His Lordship will visit Stanley, Kingsclear, Cork and other places. He will make Fredericton his headquarters, leaving this city in the morning and returning each evening. While here he will be the guest of Rev. Father Carney at the Rectory, Brunswick Street.

## AT ST. DUNSTAN'S

There will be a large class for confirmation at St. Dunstan's Church, the exact number not being known yet. The sacrament will be administered at 10.30 a. m.

## AT ST. ANTHONY'S

At St. Anthony's Church the sacrament of confirmation will be administered to fifty. A large number of children from Marysville are included in that number. Confirmation will take place at 3 p. m. Sunday. The time for confirmation at the other churches is not yet known. At Stanley there will be about forty candidates. Twenty-five of these will be from Tay Creek. At Kingsclear, Cork and other places there will also be large classes.

## THE MARKET THIS MORNING ALMOST A RECORD BREAKER

People who visited Phoenix Square this morning were privileged to see the largest fall market in many years. All of the space around the city hall was taken up and produce teams extended down Queen Street as far as Wilmot's Alley. The variety of produce offered for sale was large and the quality seemed to be excellent. Chickens were rather plentiful and brought from 75c. to \$1 per pair. Potatoes were scarce and the brisk demand sent the price up to \$1.50 per barrel. Other prices were as follows: Eggs, 30c.; butter, 24c.; turnips, 50c.; carrots, \$1; apples, \$1.25 to \$3.50; lamb, 9 and 11c.; pork, 12c.; beef, 8c.; onions, per peck, 25c.

## BOY CAPTURED RACCOON NEAR TEMPLE FOUNTAIN

Fredericton is coming as a game-centre. Squirrels have been hunted by boys in the shade trees of the city since last spring but now raccoons and partridge have put in their appearance. Last night a young boy named Alex Atkinson captured a 'coon in a tree near the Temple Fountain in front of the Parliament Buildings. The 'coon when discovered showed no inclination to come down and Atkinson climbed up and knocked it off with a club stunning it. Yesterday morning Atkinson captured another 'coon near his home. Depredations by raccoons in chicken-coops in the rear part of the city have been common of late.

The other morning a good looking partridge was seen in a tree in Parliament Square but flew away when an attempt was made to capture it. A short time previously a partridge had been shot on Brunswick street.

## BIG GAME SEASON HAS PROVED TO BE VERY SUCCESSFUL

Sportsmen From Various Parts of World Have Passed Through on Way to Woods.

The hunting season is now in full swing and about one hundred foreign sportsmen have passed through Fredericton on their way to the Miramichi woods or elsewhere after big game. These sportsmen have come from points as far separated as Germany, London and Porto Rico as well as from all parts of the United States.

So far the mooseheads with greatest spread of horns have been brought out by Mr. L. Biddle of Philadelphia and Mr. F. H. Bailey of London. The horns of both heads had spreads of about sixty inches.

Few carcasses of moose or deer have been brought out of the woods so far and what have been brought out have been the property of provincial hunters. Until the weather comes cold it will be impossible to transport carcasses of game from the depth of the woods where the best animals are killed and keep them from spoiling.

Mr. A. W. McNamara of Purcetown, Md., who has been hunting in the neighborhood of Upper Blackville, came to the city this morning. He reports that moose and other game are plentiful where he has been hunting. He has got his moose, but will go back into the woods again. A moosehead arrived from Clarendon for Elmac Bros. this morning, sent by George Murphy. To date about fifty heads have been sent to local taxidermists.

## REMOVAL OF OLD PEERS WILL BE BEGUN EARLY NEXT WEEK

Work May Start Sunday--Dredge Now on Its Way--Traffic Will be Interrupted.

The work of removing the piers of the old highway bridge which for the past two years have blocked the river-channel at the present highway bridge for the past two years will begin not later than Monday and it is possible that owing to the urgency of the work the removal may be begun Sunday. In order that traffic may not be interfered with more than is absolutely necessary the work will be done at night.

## DREDGE ON THE WAY

Contractor C. J. B. Simmons has made arrangements whereby he will be able to use a dredge belonging to the Dominion Department of Public Works to remove the piers. The dredge left St. John this morning and is expected to arrive here this evening or tomorrow.

## BRIDGE TO BE CLOSED

In order that the work may be done properly it will be necessary to open the draw-span and close the bridge to traffic. Mr. Simmons has obtained the necessary permission from the Provincial Department of Public Works and will close the bridge each day from the time work begins until it is completed, between the hours of 4.30 p. m. and 5 a. m.

Mr. Simmons has been endeavoring for some time to complete his contract in connection with the removal of the piers, but inability to obtain a dredge has prevented him from doing so.
