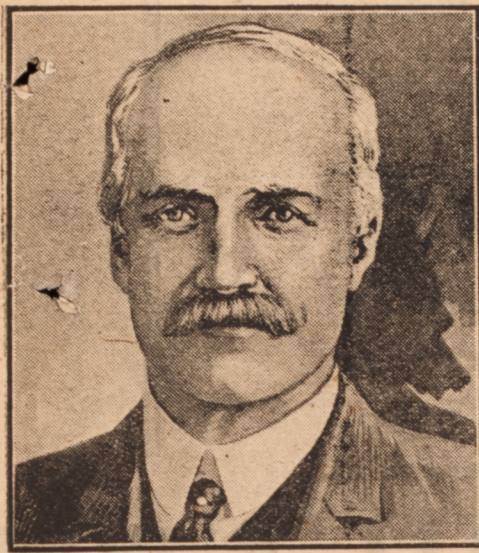

A PRACTICAL FARMER SCORES GOVERNMENT

A correspondent who signs himself "Practical Farmer" writes to the St. John Telegraph as follows:

Sir,—I desire to direct the attention of all who are interested in agriculture to the failure of the Government's agricultural policy. This is the more extraordinary in view of all the promises, or bluffs, made by this government with regard to what it was going to do to better agricultural conditions in this province.

The agricultural commissioner is wholly unable to defend himself. Starting at the importation of so called dairy Shorthorns made by the C. P. R. Company a few years ago, the present secretary for agriculture, at a time when the dairy business was beginning to boom in this province, most of these cattle were sold through Carleton county, and if you examine the agricultural report you will find a steady decline in dairy products in that country ever since. The point is this, that the Shorthorns are not dairy cattle; they were bred for beef, and beef only; the original breeders of these cattle had only beef as their ideal when they originated them and so they have been bred along these lines for centuries.

On the other hand, Ayrshires, Jerseys, etc., were bred for dairy purposes, and that only. The beef type and dairy type are animals of different conformation entirely, and you cannot have both in the same animal. So when these cattle came in on the dairy business it was killing with one hand what had been built up with the other; and this would be the result in this country if the government bring in a number of these Shorthorn cattle where the dairy produce industry has gained such prominence. Besides if you examine the report of this noble agricultural commission, you cannot find where any person ever asked for these cattle or even suggested that they be got; but you do find they have neither beef nor a dairy industry they once had in Carleton County.

This is the policy of educating the farmers the wrong way. In this country, which takes the lead in the dairy business according to the agricultural report—and even this does not take into consideration the quantities of milk and cream that daily go into St. John—the herds that are doing the best work are those that have been bred along a certain dairy line; that is, starting with a grade herd and using a pure bred dairy bull and following along for years with the same herd, the herd becomes well elsewhere.

graded up along that certain line and makes a more useful and profitable herd than if a different pure bred bull of another dairy herd was brought in every time a change of sire was made. The government of Nova Scotia make the different societies elect which breed of cattle they prefer, and compel them to follow that line for twelve years and not change from one breed to another; so in this way grades in a certain district are all grades of one breed. I take it for granted they are going to make an importation of these dairy Shorthorns; in fact it has been decided.

If you refer to the commission's report you will see they there say traces of former importations are not very perceptible and recommend something be done to assist those people who are breeding good stock. Then why make these importations at all? It is not assisting the breeders, but rather doing them an injury as it is educating the farmers in the wrong line of grading up their herds. There are in this county several herds of pure bred cattle, not any of which are even descended from government importations, yet they have all given a good account of themselves at the different exhibitions even when shown against stock from Ontario and Quebec, and there has been sent to the United States and the other provinces of Canada from this country during the last year more pure bred cattle than ever the government imported. Private individuals have imported more cattle from Scotland this last spring than the government brought out at that time, and any one of these animals were worth as much money as the government's whole lot. The commission also recommend that a suitable person be given charge of the work of selecting stock. Has that been done? Ask anyone who knows.

"TRAVELLER" TALKS PLAINLY ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS

Officials of Agricultural Department Have No Practical Knowledge for Their Work --Crocket Criminal Libel Prosecution Subject of General Comment.

To the Editor of The Richibucto Review:

Dear Sir,—The regrettable failure of the agricultural policy suggested for the Medical Minister to advance the condition of the farmers, serves to emphasize the weakness of the immigration schemes of the Department. So far as can be observed, taking a view of the whole Province, few immigrants of any value have been located here. Certainly Kent County has not benefited in the slightest degree by the expenditure made in connection with the immigration offices. On the contrary, the exodus of promising young men and women, French and English, continues, and no intelligent effort is made to replace them. The fact is that the officials in charge of that department are absolutely lacking in training and practical knowledge of their important work. The immigration officer at St. John, Mr. A. B. Wilmut, a worthy and agreeable man, in his way, is a young lawyer, who, it is said, prior to his appointment, spent a portion of his time at his office in Fredericton doing little, and the remaining portion on his father's farm at Belmont, Sunbury County, doing less. He was chosen by Mr. Hazen for the position because the Premier found it necessary to please his father, Mr. R. D. Wilmut, ex-M. P. for Queens-Sunbury, the latter of which counties Mr. Hazen represents in the legislature. So confident did Mr. Hazen feel at the last Dominion election, that Mr. Wilmut would be re-elected and that Mr. Borden was sweeping into power, that it was planned, with Mr. Wilmut's consent, that Mr. R. D. Wilmut should be appointed to the Senate, and that Mr. Hazen himself should take the seat thus vacated and a portfolio in the Borden Cabinet. But the best laid schemes of men gang aft a-gley. Mr. Wilmut was defeated. Sir Wilfrid Laurier came back to power with the whole New Brunswick contingent supporting him, save the two unfortunate who represent St. John and York. Hence, to relieve to a limited extent Mr. Wilmut's grievous disappointment, his lawyer son was appointed immigration agent with headquarters at St. John. He is a fit subordinate to the Medical Minister. A new agent was appointed in London, in the person of an Englishman, who had been in the Province for only a short time and has not yet been relieved of that bumptious assumption of universal knowledge with which one is so frequently impressed in men who come from the "Old Country" to teach us ignorant provincialists to do things as they should be done.

The unfortunate position in which the law officers of the Crown (the Attorney and Solicitor Generals) have been placed by the reckless interference of the erratic Solicitor McLeod in the incidents preceding the Crocket criminal libel prosecution is a subject of general comment. Mr. McLeod, at the instance of Manager Crocket of The Gleaner, placed himself in communication by telephone with the local government appointee, Mr. C. B. Fraser, of Chatham, Registrar of Probates, and either wilfully or negligently, misinterpreting Mr. Fraser's reply, rushed with his distorted report to Manager Crocket, who that day published in the Free Speech Gleaner the shameful article accusing a citizen of Fredericton of forgery and calling upon this same Solicitor General and the Attorney General to prosecute him for the alleged crime. Another Fredericton paper having intimated that the indications were that the Solicitor General was bringing official pressure to bear upon Mr. Fraser to confirm the alleged forgery, Mr. Hazen valiantly rushed into print to deny the imputation on behalf of the Government. Subsequently, Solicitor General McLeod was called as a witness before the Magistrate and from his own testimony his share in the treacherous scheme was exposed. He found it necessary to emphatically contradict Mr. Fraser, who, in Northumberland and elsewhere he is known throughout the Province, is recognized as an honest and truthful man. What does Mr. Hazen think of his "unnecessary" Solicitor General? If reports are true, he must have had frequent occasion of late to lose confidence in him as a law officer. The administration of justice is being brought into disrepute and the incidents reported from different sections of the Province in connection with the Courts cause people generally to ask, what next?

The latest rumor in St. John is that the President of the Council, Maxwell, is seeking civic appointment, and will retire from the Government. Conditions in the Executive between men, who are necessarily thrown into confidential relations, cannot continue to be agreeable when one of them publicly and unnecessarily attacks the others in respect to their most sensitive personal relations, and opinions. The breach widens and the parting must come ere long. The outlook in St. John for 1911 is encouraging indeed. The development at Court-nay Bay, the C. P. R. terminal construction, and other contemplated improvements have already aroused an optimistic feeling that is putting new life into business. Minister of Public Works Pugsley will be richly entitled to all the praise the constituency can give him and to the generous renewal of their confidence. Mr. Hazen and his blue ruin friends are still suggesting doubts and possible failure. It cannot be that the wish is father to the thought.

GREAT LIBERAL VICTORY AT ST. JOHNS, QUEBEC

A Crushing Blow for the Tory-Nationalist Combination--By Election for Quebec Legislature Resulted in the Return of Mr. Robert by Double the Normal Majority--English Vote Went Solidly Liberal.

Montreal, Dec. 29.—In one of the most spectacular and keenly contested by-elections ever held in this province, Mr. Robert, Liberal, was elected in St. Johns county over H. Hebert the opposition candidate by a majority of 663. At the general elections of 1908 Marchand, Liberal, had a majority of 322.

Robert's big majority came as a big surprise to his opponents, as it was hoped that a reduction would take place in view of the strenuous campaign put up on behalf of the opposition candidate.

It was a straight party fight between Liberal and Conservative, but the English vote of which there is quite a percentage in the country tidily for the Liberal nominee.

ANOTHER NEW YORK BANK IN TROUBLE

New York, Dec. 29.—There was a further development in connection with the closing of the Northern Bank of New York, and its branches on Tuesday, when the state banking department today assumed the temporary charge of the Washington Savings Bank pending further investigation into its condition. J. G. Robinson, whose operations caused the closing of the Northern Bank, is president of the Savings Institution.

Supt. Chayne made the following announcement: "The banking department has, for the present, assumed charge of the Washington Savings Bank pending a further examination into its condition. This step has seemed necessary by reason of that bank's relation to the Northern Bank."

MANIAC WITH GUN SOUGHT "JOHN D."

Cleveland, O., Dec. 28.—"Get that maniac," was the order given to the Cleveland police today when a hunt was begun for a man who exchanged a number of shots last night with Bert Knapp, keeper of John D. Rockefeller's Forest Hill estate and Marshall Stamberger, of East Cleveland, while he evidently thought he was shooting at Mr. Rockefeller. After emptying his revolver the man fled through the grounds. Knapp saw the intruder as he climbed over a tall fence. Instead of heeding a challenge to stop the man commenced to shoot. A telephone message brought Marshall Stamberger, and the demented man turned his revolver against the officer. He escaped owing to the darkness.

While Mr. Rockefeller is in the east, Marshall Stamberger placed a police guard about the grounds, for fear the maniac would return and do some damage. It is feared he might attack other persons. The police took Knapp's description of the man and visited various institutions for the insane to learn if any person answering the description had been discharged recently.

PLOT INTENDED FOR CORONATION DAY

London, Dec. 29.—The Daily Chronicle states that one of the theories that is being considered by the police regarding the discovery of the bomb factory in the East End, on Tuesday, is that it is connected with a plot intended to develop at the time of King George's coronation.

The police authorities attach the greatest importance to their latest discovery in connection with the Houndsditch crime, in which three policemen were killed. They claim to

have found documents proving that the assassins belong to a desperate, highly-organized international gang. Among the documents found are said to be letters revealing a sensational plot and containing a great mass of other information concerning the plans of anarchists in London and in continental capitals.
