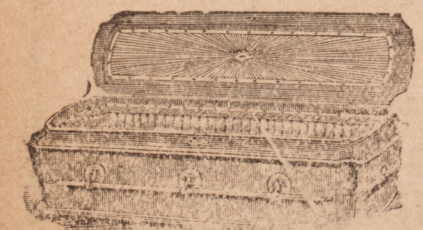
Notice to Plumbers, &c.

HOWE'S LONDON SHOWS HERE TOMORROW

Appreciative Notice From a Quebec News Paper—A Real Old Time Circus With One Ring.

A real old time circus, with its one ring and an opportunity to see what is going on and to reward with its applause the feats of each performer, without stint and without any question as to whether the applause was intended for half a dozen acts going at the same time—such was the performance afforded by Howe's London Circus, which spent its brief stay in Quebec yesterday, and then faded away from the field in which it had presented so conspicuous an attraction to Quebecers, to seek pastures new.

The Howe show made somewhat of a record in Quebec. So great were the crowds that wished to see it that the tent was crowded in the afternoon, and it was found necessary to give a second show to accommodate them. In the evening the tent was again packed. This was one record. Another one was the remarkable way in which the staff of the show handled the great crowds. The proposition which the show was up against was one which called for all the tact which the staff possessed, and they certainly exercised it with success. The patrons of the circus were treated with the utmost courtesy, and when the overflow from the seats began to crowd the arena seats were found for them on the green grass in close proximity to the ring, and every one seemed satisfied.

All the employees of the circus work hard and unceasingly to please the huge crowd.

The first show yesterday afternoon was packed to capacity, the second one had a big attendance and last night there was again a capacity attendance.

With the exception of a couple of numbers, when there were three aerial acts under way, all the performance took place in the main ring, and there were a number of performers that stood out prominently. The Eddy Troupe of wire walkers, the Royal Japanese performers, the performing elephants, the bounding jockey act and many others were as good as the best. Then there were the usual collection of leapers, riders, acrobats, trapeze artists and the clowns—of course.

The menagerie was a well stocked one and was viewed with interest. The baby lions and the baby camel were features, and the grown-up animals were also not unworthy of attention. The five elephants and the herd of camels are due special notice.

NEW RECORD AT SCOTIA'S PLANT

Blast Furnaces Turned Out 300 Tons of Iron in One Day

Sydney Mines, July 25.—All pig iron records of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co., have been broken since the blast furnace resumed operations some weeks ago, after relining and if the output is maintained for the closing days of the month, the July production will be fully thirty per cent. greater than any previous month in the Company's history.

Since July 1st the furnace has produced over 250 tons every day up to Tuesday when all records went by the board, and the 300 ton mark was reached. Previous to the recent relining and remodelling of the furnace lines the best day's record was 240 tons and the daily average was about 130 tons.

Six days ahead of time the furnace began producing iron on June 24th. When shut down on May 1st, it was anticipated that it would take until July 1st to get the furnace producing again, but by working three eight hour shift without a stop the changes decided on and the relining were finished ahead of the expected date.

When completed, the furnace was practically a new one embodying a number of improvements suggested by experience, including a change in the bosh and the crucible which it was expected would increase the output, and lower the cost of operating. The results of these changes were naturally awaited by the officials of the Company with much interest and the outcome has been highly gratifying to them.

Ideal basic pig iron is being produced, consequently the open hearth furnaces have been enabled to break records also.

An average close on 350 tons of steel ingots are being produced daily and on one day the output was 416 tons which far exceeds any former records.

HEART WOUND SEWED UP

Philadelphia, July 25.—Holding the beating heart of a living man in his left hand while with his right he sewed up a wound made in that organ by a knife, Dr. Francis T. Stewart, chief visiting physician at the Pennsylvania Hospital, probably saved the life of Joseph Spence, who was stabbed during a quarrel.

A semi-circular incision was made in the left side just above the heart, and the muscles pushed back, exposing the ribs, two of which were severed and the lungs moved slightly to one side. Five stitches were rapidly made between heart beats, and the slightest slip would have meant instant death. Thirty minutes were all that were required to complete the operation, and the patient was sent back to the ward with a good chance of recovery.

The operation was the second of its kind performed by Dr. Stewart within a month. He recently stitched up the heart of a man who had been stabbed with a pair of scissors. Although the patient is still at the hospital, he is able to stand on his feet, and entire recovery is only a question of time.

Chicago, July 25.—A campaign for the annexation to Chicago of every town and village within 100 miles of the City Hall, will be discussed at a meeting of the 3,000,000 club, which is soon to be called.

Robert C. Givings, president and originator of the club, will bring the subject officially before the "Three Million Era." He declared that the club will consider every phase of the proposition, and the campaign will be launched in the near future.

THE FIRST STEP

The first natural step towards such an arrangement, should come from the United States. It is for them to remember that they have the higher tariff, that we have the weaker and younger industries, and that notwithstanding our small population our trade with them is twice as great as their trade with us. Past experience has made the people of Canada very much like the people from Missouri. Before discussing the subject, they must be convinced that the United States really desires closer trade relations on a basis which will be mutually profitable.

The future rests with the United States. The solution of the problem is in their hands. Such being the case it is difficult and might even be considered impertinent for me, to suggest a practical measure; but if the United States tariff were gradually reduced to a point where the protection afforded both countries would be actually—not theoretically—equalized, always giving prime consideration to the fact that Canada has the younger and the weaker industries, and that her trade preference within the British Empire must stand, than I believe the solution would be in sight.

The fact that we live near the States, is after all the greatest element in our progress, and if at some future time in the history of the world it may be written that Canada, once despised as a frigid clime, developed a race of people with warm hearts and noble ideals, who, though breathing the life of a great Empire fulfilled their part in the eternal plan and made their country the strong uniting link between the two great English-speaking nations of the world it would be a consummation devoutly to be wished.
