Who Has Slumped in Average

TY COBB PASSES LAJOIE IN RACE FOR BUZZ-CART

Strunk Leads American Batsmen But Has Played Very Few Games--Snodgrass Real Leader of National League.

Following are the averages of the leading batsmen of the American league who have taken part in 10 or more games. While Amos Strunk, the young outfielder of the Athletics, tops the list, he is not to be considered the premier batter of the league to date as he has taken part in only 10 games. His figures for those few games are phenomenal and as the boy has ability he is bound to be heard from next year.

Last week came the first genuine slump in the batting of Lajoie and he is now trailing behind Cobb, whose work has been unaffected by his team's poor showing. Lajoie made but few hits last week. His eye failed him greatly against the Washington pitchers, and Connie Mack's sharpshooters proved irrevocable against him too.

Cobb has set a hot pace for all opponents. His hitting in Boston showed plainly that he is after first honors. Speaker dropped five points last week.

In every game but one last week Oldring of the Athletics made more than one hit, and as a result his average took a sharp turn upward. While some of his mates slumped, he more than atoned for their deficiencies and aided his pitchers materially in winning games.

After taking part in three games last week and failing to make a hit in any of them, Hal Chase, captain of the New York Highlanders, finally took himself out of the game. The great first baseman has not been feeling well of late and his work has been greatly affected.

How the mighty do fall. A few years ago Bob Unglaub was considered as dangerous as any batsman in the business and always managed to boast of a fairly respectable average but this year the American league pitchers laugh at his attempts for safe hits, and his humble average of .199 is evidence of the fact. Another former idol of the fans, Terry Turner of Cleveland, is having poor success this year, but his average is respectable as compared with Unglaub's. The averages, including Saturday's games:

Three of Fred Clarke's staff are hitting for .300 or better and one of them, the veteran Charley Phillippe, the hero of many battles and a pretty good pitcher this year, is leading the league. Of course his lead won't be of long duration.

Fred Snodgrass of the Giants is the real leader, and on the present disastrous western trip of his team, he has been meeting with good success at the bat.

Frank Chance is doing exceptionally well this year and he ranks next below Graham of the Doves. The leader of the Cubs is having a good year at the bat, although he is not regularly in the game.

Hans Wagner, seventh on the list, and virtually fifth! Those knockers and there were several a few weeks ago, who said that the big German was going back as a ball player would better take to the tall timbers. Last week, for the first time this season, Hans passed the .300 mark and he is now coming with a rush. His fielding too, has been clean and deadly to opposing batsmen and the ginger shown by him in his playing has so enthused the other members of the Pittsburgh team that all are hitting and fielding well—in fact, better than the members of the Chicago Buffs, the leaders of the league. Tommy Leach, Wilson, Clarke, Byrne Gibson and Flynn are now hitting the ball hard and this accounts for the great work of the Pirates of late.

Wheat of Brooklyn dropped out of the honor list last week for the first time this season. Left-handed pitchers have been the cause of his slump. Magee of the Phillies is slowly relinquishing his place among the .300 men and unless he braces up he will drop out of the honor list. The averages:

INCREASED SUPPORT NECESSARY FOR FURTHER HORSE-RACING HERE

Financial Statement Presented to Park Directors Last Night Showed Deficit on July Meet.

There will have to be some evidence of public support if Fredericton is to have more horse-racing this season. The directors of the Fredericton Park Association met last night and, as a result of that meeting, will sit tight for a while and await developments. The entries for meets at Moncton and New Glasgow close within the next few days, and when these entries are made known the local people will be in a better position to act.

A financial statement was presented at last night's meeting, which showed a deficit on the July meet held here. This result is not particularly pleasing to the directors. The lack of support received from the horsemen of the Maritime Provinces has also been a discouraging feature of the season so far. The very persons who clamored for the exclusion of American horses were the ones to withdraw their support from the opening meeting of the Maritime Circuit.

The yachts started on a twelve-mile race, three times around a triangle and had nearly accomplished the second circuit when a couple of thunder showers rolled down off the Beverly shore, and drowning out the wind, left the yachts flapping around with the Massachusetts a mile ahead of the St. Lawrence. The yachts will make another effort tomorrow to race over the same course.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.
