MARYSVILLE MAN COMMUNICATED WITH NOTORIOUS DR. CRIPPEN

Elias Peterson in Answer to Advertisement Sent Money Order to Much-Wanted Doctor.

The Mail received a query from the Associated Press this morning, concerning the whereabouts of Mr. Elias Peterson of Marysville, N. B., who is said to have communicated with the notorious Dr. H. H. Crippen of London, Eng., and to have sent money orders to him. As detectives and police are looking for Crippen all over the world, on the charge that he has murdered his wife, the fact that a Marysville man has communicated with him is of considerable local interest.

Inquiries were made today of several prominent residents of Marysville, and it was found that Mr. Elias Peterson has been a resident of Marysville for several years. Some time ago he was injured in an accident and lost a foot. He is a middle-aged man and suffers from deafness.

APPLIED FOR ORDER

Mr. Peterson could not be located today, but by inquiry evidence that he has been communicating with Dr. Crippen was found. A short time ago Mr. Peterson applied to Station master S. J. Hallett of Marysville for a money order to be sent to Dr. H. H. Crippen of London. He was informed by the station master that the name was the same as that of the much sought wife-murderer and that it was not likely that he could be located. On being told this, Mr. Peterson changed his mind and did not buy the money order.

SAW CRIPPEN'S ADVERTISEMENT

He himself stated that he had seen an advertisement of a cure for deafness in a newspaper and had decided to use the remedy mentioned by the advertiser, who was Dr. Crippen.

The supposition is that Mr. Peterson has on previous occasions sent money orders to Dr. Crippen and that this has been found out in London by detectives who are running down every clue.

INFESTED WITH SQUIRRELS.

Squirrels have come into the city in astonishingly large numbers within the past few days. At the present time hardly any of the residential streets of the city which have trees about them are without the chattering little animals. The Old Burying Ground seems to be a particular centre of attraction while Scully's Grove and similar places near the outskirts of the city are alive with them. It is not known what has caused the squirrels to become so bold. The small boy has already discovered the presence of the animals and air-guns and stones are being used to exterminate them. More than one accident has been reported as the result of the reckless use of air-guns.

RAILWAY EXTENSION A LIVE QUESTION IN STANLEY PARISH

Special Meeting of Stockholders of York and Carleton Railway Company Called for Monday.

As will be seen by an advertisement in another column a special meeting of the stockholders of the York and Carleton Railway Company will be held at the office of Dr. D. R. Moore at Stanley Village on Monday, August 1st. The object for which the meeting is called is to deal with matters in connection with the proposed extension of the Stanley branch railway from Ryan Brook to Nappadoggin, the divisional point of the Transcontinental. It will be remembered that a Dominion subsidy for this work has already been voted and all that is wanted now is a bond guarantee from a reasonable amount from the local government to enable the work to be carried forward to an early completion. This proposed extension means much to the people of Stanley and the Nashwaak Valley and is fraught with the greatest importance to Fredericton. The grade from Nappadoggin to Fredericton by way of Stanley is a very easy one and it would be much cheaper to deliver freight here by that route than it will be by way of McGivney Junction. The grade from Stanley Village to Ryan Brook, the present terminus is about 175 feet, and practical railway men who have been over the route as far as Nappadoggin report the grade as being favorable. Then there is another important consideration, a railway from Nappadoggin by way of Stanley will be thirteen miles shorter than the route by way of McGivney Junction.

Since the York and Carleton Railway was extended to Ryan Brook, the passenger traffic has more than doubled, and there has been a substantial increase in the volume of freight traffic. It is fair to assume that if the road were extended so as to connect with the N. T. R. that a great boom in both freight and passenger traffic would follow.

A coal mine has lately been discovered along the line of the railway, and those behind the proposition are firmly of the opinion that they will soon be mining large quantities of coal of good quality. If their hopes are realized the railway will be sure to share in the benefits.

The question of railway extension is a live one in the Parish of Stanley just now and the people look to the Local Government to carry out their promises.

COMMISSIONERS WILL TAKE CANOE TRIP ON ALLEGASH RIVER

Counsel and Engineers Will Accompany Them--To Look Into Matter of Diversion and Storage.

The International Commission appointed to investigate matters in dispute between the United States and Canada on the River St. John, next week will personally inspect a portion of the territory in dispute. The commissioners will be accompanied by their counsel and engineers. In all the party will consist of about a dozen persons. The personal inspection will be accomplished by means of a canoe trip, which will give all members of the party a chance to "rough it" on the Allegash River.

DOUBLE PURPOSE.

The engineers attached to the commission were to take this trip of inspection for the double purpose of looking into the alleged diversion of water from the St. John to the Penobscot and for the purpose of investigating the facilities for the storage of water. The commissioners decided that they might as well take the same trip in order to look carefully into the diversion of water from the St. John, which is an international waterway, to the Penobscot, which is an American river, throughout its entire course.

WILL OCCUPY SIX DAYS.

The trip will be made from a point on the headwaters of the Allegash and will occupy about six days. The party will gather at Greenville, on the line of the C. P. R. and from that place will proceed across Moosehead Lake to what is known as the Northeast Passage. There a portage will be made to a stream which will take the commissioners to another lake and thence to the Allegash.

The trip will begin on Wednesday, August 3rd. Mr. A. J. Gregory, K. C., of this city, counsel for the Canadian commissioners, will accompany the party. He will leave for Greenville early next week and does not expect to return until the latter part of the week following. It is possible that the commissioners may hold meetings while on this trip and hear evidence.

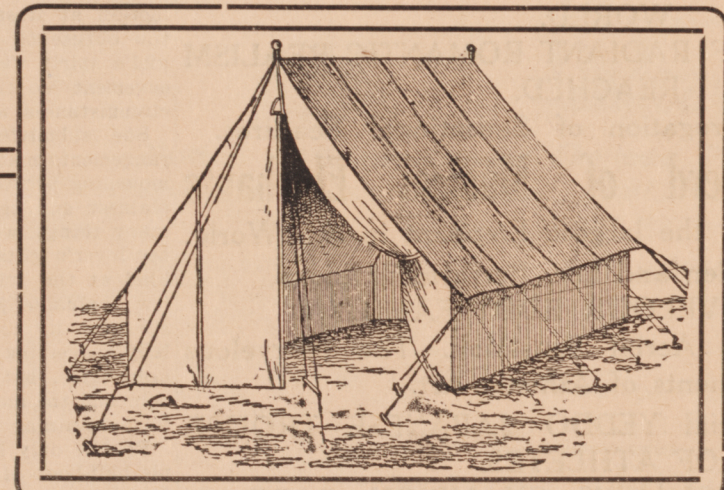
