AMERICAN UNIONS ARE LOSING GROUND

Canadian Federation of Labor Says Americans are Fighting Hopeless Cause in Canada.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—The chief feature of the convention of the Canadian Federation of Labor which opened here yesterday was the report of the executive at the afternoon session regarding foreign Labor Unions. The report said:

"We are pleased to state that the efforts of American Unions to retain their hold on Canada is being gradually and surely weakened, and we hope that they will realize the hopelessness of their cause, show a sense of justice and common sense, and withdraw from their autocratic policy, which if persisted in means ruin to them. We hope during the coming year to see gathered into our ranks thousands of comrades who have been put outside the pale of unionism by the narrow and autocratic policy of the American unionism of today."

"THE ALASKAN," ONE OF BEST MUSICAL COMEDIES EVER SEEN HERE

"The Alaskan," one of W. P. Collier's musical comedies, was presented at the City Opera House last night before a crowded house and well deserved the patronage it received. "The Alaskan" is a fit successor to "The Burgomaster" another of Mr. Cullen's productions which made a big hit in Fredericton and in fact all the Maritime Provinces.

"The Alaskan," like the majority of musical comedies, has no plot to speak of. What plot there is of just sufficient to carry a lot of good comedy and pretty music. Dick Atwater has been grubstaked by an eastern millionaire and locates Discovery claim on the Yukon. The wealthy partner dies and his daughter succeeds to his property. She visits Discovery mine with a keen desire to meet her unknown partner. She becomes slightly confused when she meets Walsingham Watt, the manager of a wandering opera company. When the heiress meets the real Dick Atwater Cupid gets in his work. Discovery mine plays out. Dick goes away and makes his fortune, returns to Dawson City, where he meets his sweetheart and everything ends happily.

Jessie Stover as Arlee Easton made a most charming heiress and Al Rauh as Dick Atwater could not be improved upon. Their song "The Moth and the Bumble Bee" was one of the hits of the evening and was encored several times. Mr. Rauh's magnificent tenor voice was also heard to advantage in "The Riffles" and "The Face of the Girl I Love," both of which were encored. Two of the feature songs of "The Alaskan" were "Snowball" and "The Totem Pole." Miss Sylvia De Frankie, who was here before with "The Burgomaster" was as charming as ever in the snowballing song and the audience entered into the spirit of the song to such an extent that it was some time before the harmless "snowballs" kept flying from stage to pit and back again. Miss De Frankie also sang "Let's Rub Noses," in the first act in a most taking manner. "The Totem Pole" was a bass solo with chorus. In it Detmar Poppen's magnificent voice was heard to full advantage. Mr. Poppen was also well received when he sang the solo, "For I Dream of You."

Mention must be made of the work of Richard F. Carroll and Leo Kendall, who as Walsingham Watt and Professor Knicklebein were two of the funniest comedians seen here in a long time.

The work of the chorus was excellent in every way and it is to be hoped that Fredericton will have the opportunity of seeing a few more musical comedies of as high a standard as "The Alaskan." Two drawbacks to last night's performance were the absence of an orchestral accompaniment, Mr. Al Ellis the musical director accompanying on the piano, and the inability of the company to use all its scenery and properties.

HUMAN SACRIFICES IN VOODOO RITES

Ghastly Ceremonies in Connection with Snake Worship in Haiti

London, Sept. 14.—A secret religious sect, worshipping a god known as Voodoo, the Snake-God, and who offer up human sacrifices, is again showing signs of vitality in Haiti. The matter has been brought to the notice of the German authorities by the Inspector of Police who had made a thorough investigation.

The following summary of the report is published in the Cologne Gazette and from this it would appear that a woman who is now in prison in the capital awaiting trial was directly responsible for the killing and eating of five children.

In her house I found a barrel containing pickled human flesh, the remains of a child aged about twelve. It is, unfortunately, well known that the Voodoo faith has still many adherents.

The priests of the cult are all-powerful and the sacrifices are usually animals, but occasionally, as in the present instance, young children are immolated. The god himself takes the form of a snake, and his mouthpiece is a priest who is assisted by a priestess.

Estes Liberis, the young woman concerned in the present affair, was at the time high priestess of the cult. At the great ceremony in honor of the snake-god the high priest and priestess sit on a double throne, the woman being clothed in nothing but a gorgeous girde. Worshippers of both sexes attend with red clothes round their loins. On an altar stands a wooden box containing the snake which is brought from its box and worshipped by all present, gifts being placed on the altar while the populace prays for the fulfillment of some great public desire.

Then begins a wild dance, headed by the chief priestess, who discards her girde as the dancing grows more furious and a halt is not called until the people begin to fall exhausted to the ground. If any misfortune has befallen the people a sacrifice is offered to the god.

It was on one of these occasions that Estes Liberis insisted on the sacrifice of a human victim, and, in concert with a man named Conzo Pelle, decided to kidnap a girl, a niece of Conzo. The child's mother was enticed away, and on her return was informed that the chief priestess had called for her daughter. The mother seemed greatly honored, and a special ceremony was immediately arranged.

When all were assembled the girl was fetched from her hiding place, laid in front of the altar, and strangled by her uncle. Her head was cut off, and all those present drank some of the blood which was collected in a bowl. The flesh was subsequently cooked at Conzo's house, and instead of being eaten as had formerly been customary was preserved.

Two girls who had overlooked the cooking of the flesh were declared to have offended the god and these too were then similarly sacrificed, their deaths being followed by two more a few days later.

SUGAR TRUST HEADS BROUGHT TO TRIAL

New York, Sept. 14.—Ernest W. Gael, former superintendent of the Williamsburg Refinery of the Sugar Trust who, with Charles R. Heike, former secretary and treasurer of the Sugar Trust was convicted last spring of conspiracy to defraud the government by the underweighing of sugar, was yesterday sentenced to two years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta and fined \$5,000 by Judge Martin in the United States Court.

After imposing sentence, Judge Martin granted a stay on appeal and fixed bail at \$25,000. Sentence on Mr. Heike who has been called the "Manhigherup" is still pending. The conviction of Heike and Gaelbraith was in a large measure brought about by the testimony of Oliver Spitzer, former dock superintendent, who, following his conviction and the serving of a part of his sentence at Atlanta turned states evidence. Spitzer was pardoned by President Taft.

GRAFT HUNTERS AGAIN BUSY

New York, Sept. 14.—After a rest since last Friday the members of the graft investigation committee assembled here today to resume the work of probing legislative corruption. Former Lieutenant Governor M. Linn Bruce, chief counsel today was prepared to place before the probers the accounts of various individuals with the banking and brokerage firm of J. S. Bache and Co which are expected to throw light on the recent speculative operations of legislators. The Bache firm, which hitherto had declined to produce its books and was threatened with prosecution consented to produce the records.
