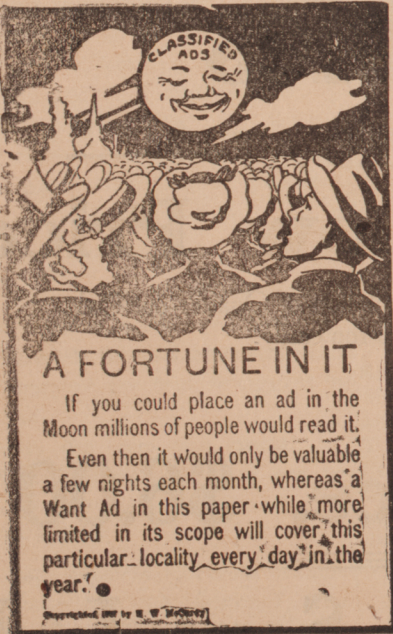

The trotting division of the Horse World stallion stake was easily won by the crack Colorado E. Baroness Eva won in the pacing division of that event. These races were the feature of today's programme.

Ess H. Kay took the Ononaga stake for 2:06 pacers in commanding fashion.

In the Chamber of Commerce stake for 2:09 trotters Soprano took the first two heats, but was just beaten out by her big half-brother, Oro Belini, in the third.

The course was fully two seconds slow due to Tuesday's rain, and it was announced that Ed Geers had postponed until tomorrow the effort by The Harvester to beat the world's stallion trotting record of 2:02 held by himself.

Woonsocket, R.I., Sept. 14.--Some good racing was seen in today's card at the Woonsocket half mile trotting park one event going six heats without deciding a winner. This was the 2:17 trot in which Admirell the favorite, got the first two heats and then trotted a dead heat in the sixth with Arlington, which had captured the third and fifth. Brookline, Mass., Sept. 14.--There was plenty of driving room at the country driving club today for the sixteen survivors of the round for the title play of amateurs for the country golf association cup. The field however, was unusually strong, the thirty six matches for the next four days.

BASEBALL PLAYERS
DEMANDS RIGHTS

Cincinnati, Sept. 15.--Major league ball players are drawing up a magna charta to present to the powers of organized baseball.

It is stated that this bill of rights will be heard by the commission at its next meeting, within a few weeks.

The claims of the players may be classed under these five clauses.

1.--A clause in contracts declaring them "free agents" after playing in one city for a limited term of years.

2.--In case of dispute between players and club owner over salary, a board of arbitration is to pass upon the case.

3.--Representation on the National Commission.

4.--Six months players contracts to terminate at the end of the league season, or compensation for twelve months of service if club owners insist on that time for their contracts.

5.--Freedom to play ball or engage in athletic sports with teams other than those in organized baseball after the league seasons are over.
