**NEW YORK PRIMARIES
MAKE NO CHANGE
IN SITUATION**

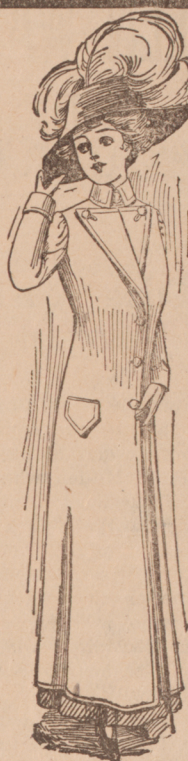
New York, Sept. 14.—Political lead-
ers in the Republican party scanning
the returns of the primaries held yester-
day found that the situation be-
tween the old guard and the Roose-
velt adherents was still unchanged
today. Neither side seemed to gain
any advantage in the primaries, the
Roosevelt forces carrying every dis-
trict in New York County where there
was practically no opposition. In
Kings County State Chairman Wood-
ruff won 19 out of 23 districts.

The old guard now claims they will
get to Saratoga Convention with
109 out of the 142 delegates from
Kings, while Lloyd Griscom, Chief
Lieutenant of Col. Roosevelt, figures
to have 233 out of the 364 delegates
from the greater city to the state
convention. There were no changes
brought about by the Democratic
primaries.

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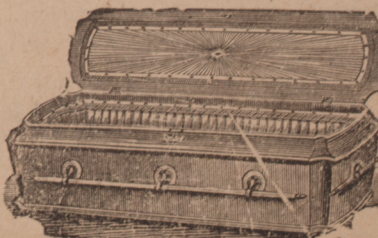
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
