public on Monday, the 28th inst.**DAILY STEAMER.**There will be a daily steamer between  
Fredericton and St. John for the  
remainder of the season, the Acadia  
having been placed on the route.**FORTY DAYS' RAIN.**It rained on St. Swithin's day and the  
weather wise pronosticate forty  
days' rain.**ACT OF VANDALISM.**On Sunday night some evil disposed  
person cut and disfigured the plate

odor it must be more or less tainted**THE LAW AS A DEBT  
COLLECTING MACHINE**

Mr. Lloyd George Chancellor of the  
Exchequer of the United Kingdom has  
rebutted the Law Society of England  
of which he is a member for its op-  
position to reforms which would cut  
down its members' fees. The Law So-  
ciety retaliated by calling a special  
meeting and passing a vote of cen-  
sure upon Mr. Lloyd George for his  
adverse criticism. Mr. Lloyd George,  
however, holds to his statement, and  
sees nothing to withdraw and the op-  
inion of the country appears to be  
pretty unanimously with him. It is  
the avidity of the profession for the  
money they can screw out of their un-  
fortunate clients and others that has  
made the jibes against it so popular.  
As for Mr. Lloyd George's rebuke to  
the Law Society it is common knowl-  
edge that one of the most beneficent  
social measures of modern times the  
Public Trustee Act, was long frustra-  
ted by astute legal opposition in the  
Commons. In the investigation of titles  
to property the legal red tape is so  
great that the charges have some-  
times amounted to as much as twenty-  
five percent of the purchase money.  
Those who have read the famous will  
case of 'Jarndyce v. Jarndyce' in  
'Bleak House' need not be told that  
England suffers at the hands of her  
lawyers; all English history and lit-  
erature testify to it. The Law Society  
has now done some good in calling  
attention by its opposition to the  
need of further and drastic reform, al-  
though much perhaps cannot be ex-  
pected while so many lawyers sit in  
Parliament.

But as the Montreal Witness points  
out, England is not alone in need-  
ing protection. A few days  
ago our attention was called to a  
case where a paltry debt was rapidly  
magnified to enormous proportions  
by getting into the clutches of the  
law. A poor carter owed his grocer  
\$3.68. He was sued for that amount  
in the Circuit Court of Montreal and  
judgment was rendered against him  
for the full debt of January 31 last,  
with interest from the twenty-second  
of the same month plus \$6.70 for costs.  
This brought the debt up to \$10.38,  
plus interest. Afterwards the debtor's  
employer was served with a summons  
to appear in court and declare what  
he owed or would owe his employee.  
This new proceeding involved, of  
course additional costs, besides in-  
convenience and annoyance for the em-  
ployer. In order to avoid trouble, it  
has been arranged between the parties  
that the employer shall keep for the  
payment of the debt the sum of a  
dollar a week out of the carter's salary,  
until a total of \$18.83 has been  
reached, which amount will be accept-  
ed in full settlement. Thus an original  
debt of \$3.68, which the debtor  
could not pay has grown in six  
months to be \$18.83, or five times the  
amount of the original debt. Such is  
the working of the law.
