MEDICAL INSPECTION  
OF SCHOOLS URGED  
AGAIN ON TRUSTEES

York County Association For Prevention of Tuberculosis Held Second Annual Meeting Last Evening.

The York County Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis held its annual meeting in the city Council Chamber last night. The officers of the association were re-elected and reports of officers received. The most important business transacted by the association was the adoption of a resolution urging upon the school trustees the necessity of the medical inspection of pupils. The finances of the association are reported to be in good condition.

Since organization, this society has scattered literature dealing with tuberculosis and its prevention. broadcast over the county, the county councillors and clergymen being used as distributing agencies. Copies of Dr. Backnoff's book "Tuberculosis is a Preventable and Curable Disease" were procured and distributed. A copy was presented to the libraries of each of the following institutions, University of New Brunswick, the Provincial Normal School and the Fredericton High School.

The attendance last evening owing to counter attractions was not as large as it should have been. Among those present were: His Honor Judge Barry, Mr. A. R. Slipp, M. P., Dr. C. C. Cones, Councillor Howard Rogers, Mr. C. F. Chestnut, Mr. F. B. Edgcombe, Mr. J. W. McCready and Dr. W. H. Irvine.

Judge Barry took the chair at 8.15. The medical committee appointed at a previous meeting to formulate a recommendation that the provisions of the Provincial Health Act be extended so as to make Tuberculosis a notifiable disease reported. The report was to the effect that the provision required was already contained in the Health Act.

## SECRETARY REPORTS.

Dr. W. H. Irvine, the secretary-treasurer, presented his report, which was very satisfactory. The financial position of the association was said to be good and the members to number upwards of one hundred.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Judge Barry made a short address, in which he commented upon the present sanitary condition of Fredericton. He said he felt sure that education concerning tuberculosis, its dangers and prevention would accomplish much good.

## CHANCELLOR JONES.

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, spoke along a line similar to that followed by Judge Barry. He emphasized the fact that the value of fresh air was being more generally recognized and the fear of draughts diminished.

PRESENTATION TO THE  
PARISH OF CHRIST CHURCH

Two volumes of the Holy Bible have been presented by Mrs. Andrew Phair to the Rev. Canon Cowie, as godfather of her grandson, Osborne Phair Rainsford, and they have been placed by him on the lectern of the Parish Church for constant use at the services of the Church, and as a memorial of Mrs. Phair's interest in the Parish and its work.

This edition was published by Virtue, a London publishing house, about seventy-five years ago, and it is illustrated by admirable steel engravings, after the paintings of a few of the old masters and of Wm. Hamilton, a Scotch historical painter of the 18th century, but, chiefly, after such artists of the period of publication as Wm. H. Hartlett, the celebrated English artist, traveller, and writer, and also Schopin, Vernet, Copley, Melville, Coln and others.

The real value of the illustrations, however, is in the engravings themselves, which are especially fine, being the work of Cooke, Wallis, Brandard, Cousen and others of the period, 1839-1834, when, under the guidance of the greatest artist of the English school, Joseph Mallord Turner, the real educator of the whole school of engravers, the art of steel engraving reached its highest development in England.

These books are greatly prized by the Rector and corporation of the Parish of Christ Church, who have received them into their guardianship.

LIKELY TO RECOMMEND  
WATER EXTENSION  
FOR NEXT SPRING

Information Expected From Glasgow Not Yet Received—To Ask City to Take Up Advertising.

The City Council next week will have before it a recommendation in connection with the requested extension of the water-service up the Woodstock Road to Bailey's Bridge. The Water Department has asked for information from firms in Glasgow concerning the prices of pipe, but so far nothing has been heard from the Scotch firms. It is realized that it is impossible to make the extension this year, as the pipe cannot be obtained for several weeks. The recommendation which will be made to the Council will very likely be in favor of preparing to extend the service in the spring. An eight-inch or probably a ten-inch main is to be laid from Smythe Street to Bailey's Bridge. A four-inch main at present runs from Smythe Street to the Old Government House, but is not large enough to meet an increased demand for water.

## ADVERTISING SCHEME.

A representative of the McAlpine Publishing Company, of St. John, is expected to appear before the Council in connection with the advertising map of Fredericton that his firm is preparing. Many local merchants have ordered quantities of the maps, and the city is to be asked to do the same.

The report of the Administration of Justice Committee on the market by-law, will be received by the City Council at its meeting Tuesday night. No report on the amendment of the by-law for the licensing of places of amusement is expected, as the committee of the whole council has not yet met to consider the matter.

DONALD CAMPBELL  
BADLY INJURED  
IN VANCOUVER

Grandson of Ex-Warden Scott of This City Loses Sight of One Eye by Torpedo Explosion.

Mr. William J. Scott, of the Scott Lumber Company, is in receipt of a letter from Vancouver, B. C., conveying the news of a serious accident which recently befell his nephew, Master Donald Campbell, the eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Campbell, formerly of Kingsclear. It seems that the little fellow was playing near his home with two older brothers, when one of them came across a torpedo lying on the ground. Being ignorant of the dangerous nature of their find, they began experimenting with it, and the result was an explosion. Donald, who was standing nearby looking on, had his face badly lacerated by the contents of the explosive and was at once removed to the hospital and placed under the care of physicians. It was found that the sight of one of his eyes had been destroyed and that of the other seriously affected.

The last word received was that the little fellow was doing well and the doctors were hopeful of saving the sight of one eye.

The unfortunate boy is a grandson of Ex-Warden John Scott of this city and also of Mr. John A. Campbell, ex-M. P. P., of Kingsclear.

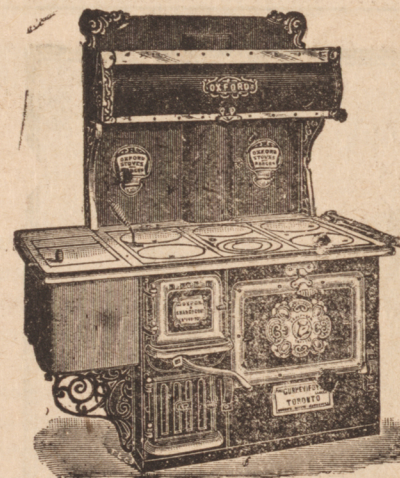
