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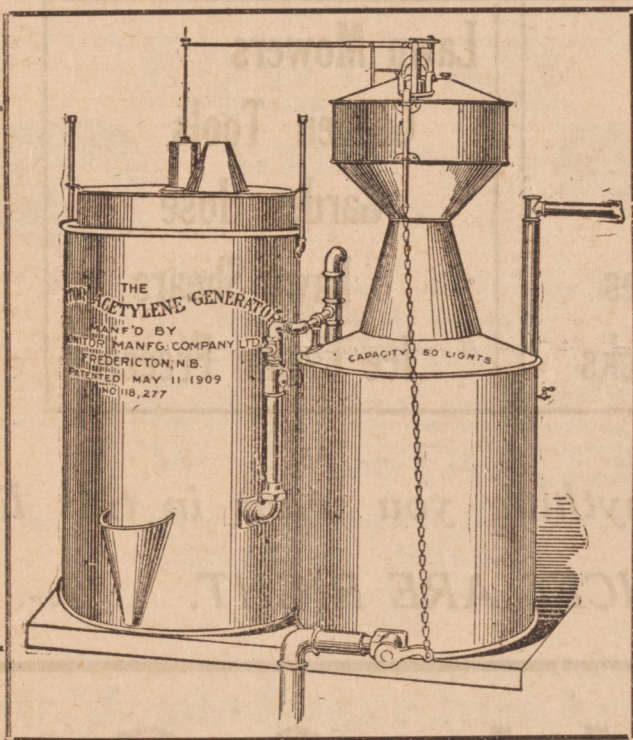

KING GEORGE'S MESSAGE TO THE BRITISH NATION

Expresses His Appreciation of the Sympathy so Universally Expressed by His Subjects—Promises to Earnestly and Faithfully Maintain the Best Traditions of the British Throne.

London, May 25.—The King has issued the following message:
"To My People Beyond the Seas:
The innumerable messages of kindness from my loyal subjects beyond the seas have deeply touched my heart and have assured me that I have in full measure their sympathy in the great trial which has befallen me and them; that my sorrow is their sorrow, and that we have a common love and happiness.

All his people throughout his dominions were dear to the heart of my beloved father; for them he lived to work and in their service he died. I cannot doubt but that they will hold his name in grateful remembrance. I am now called to follow in his foot-steps and carry on the work which prospered in his hands.

As a sailor I have been brought into constant contact with the overseas dominions of the Crown. I have

personally realized the affectionate loyalty which holds together the many lands and diverse peoples in one glorious fellowship. Nine years ago I travelled through the Empire, accompanied by my dear wife. Had the King lived, we should together, at his expressed wish, visited South Africa in the coming autumn to open the first parliament of the South African Union, the latest and greatest evidence of that peace and harmony which my father loved to promote.

It will be my earnest endeavor to uphold constitutional government and to safeguard in all their fulness the liberties which are enjoyed throughout my dominions, and under the good guidance of the Ruler of all men I will maintain upon a foundation of freedom, justice and peace the great heritage of the United British Empire.

SYSTEMATIC LOOTING

Disclosed in Insurance Investigation—Reserves of Several Mutual Benefit and Fraternal Societies Said to Have Disappeared in a Mysterious Manner—Total is Well up in Millions.

Chicago, May 25.—A chain system of looting the treasures of merged fraternal societies to a total well up in the millions of dollars has been disclosed as a result of the insurance scandal investigation that brought States Attorney Lawrence M. Magill of Rock Island, county to Chicago, on what is said to have been a successful hunt for evidence.

Trails of alleged embezzlements are being followed by detectives into a dozen cities of Illinois, and into two or three other States. One sum of \$57,000, the entire reserve fund of the Order of Fraternal Tribunes, is said to have been whisked around the country for several months before its final disappearance "into the ice cream," as one of the officers of the society described the process.

In addition to the Fraternal Tribunes, the American Home Circle and the Northern Life Insurance Co. previously mentioned in the tangle, there were mentioned for the first time the Royal Benefit Society of Washington, which draws no color line; the Independent Order of Mutual Aid, whose \$70,000 reserve mysteriously disappeared when it was merged into another society, and the Farmers' Federation, which also has passed out of existence.

FIFTY MILLIONS REFUSED FOR CONTROL OF C. N. R.

Montreal, May 25.—It is stated that MacKenzie & Mann have refused \$50,000,000 for their common stock in the Canadian Northern, the former being quoted as saying he would not part with it for \$100,000,000.

It is generally known that MacKenzie & Mann have retained the 400,000 shares of common stock and have not even pledged it in their financial undertakings.

Rodolphe E. Forget, the well known financier, who has recently returned from Europe, expressed no surprise at this development, saying that the stock which represents the control of the system could easily be placed in Europe or New York at a good figure.

EARL GREY TO TOUR NORTHERN WILDS

Ottawa, May 25.—The northern wilds of Canada will probably have a distinguished visitor this summer. Earl Grey, who last year visited the Yukon, is contemplating a journey overland to Hudson Bay. If the present plans are carried out, the Governor-General will leave Ottawa in July for Winnipeg and will there be taken by a party of the Royal North West Mounted Police over the route of the Hudson Bay Railroad to Hudson Bay. This will involve a trip over a very stiff piece of wilderness, much of it by canoe.

At Fort Nelson or Fort Churchill, on Hudson Bay, whichever is chosen as the land terminus of the journey, the Governor-General will be met by the Government steamer Earl Grey, and in this vessel will journey through Hudson Straits, where commercial craft in a few years will be making regular voyages with cargoes of wheat and cattle from the Canadian West. The steamer will then come south and land His Excellency at Quebec.

This will be the most ambitious piece of pioneer traveling ever attempted by a Governor-General of Canada.
