CHAIRMAN MAYBEE OF THE RY. COMMISSION SCORES EXPRESS COS.

Says Making Employees Sign Away Their Right to Compensation for Injury is "Heathenish".

Toronto, May 26—A sensation was sprung at a meeting of the railway commissioners this morning by the chairman, Hon. J. P. Mabey, who produced an agreement which he said all employees of the Canadian Express Company were obliged to sign, and he wanted to know if all express companies had such agreements.

"It may have a bearing on the question of tolls," he said, significantly. The agreement is a waiver of all claims for injury or death resulting from the negligence of the employing company, its employees or associated companies, and confirms any contracts in these matters entered into by the railway and express companies.

"A heathenish relic," was what Chairman Mabey called the agreement, and he said, in his opinion the courts would struggle hard before holding it valid.

A somewhat similar agreement was admitted to by the Dominion Express Company's representative.

The Canadian Northern Express Company said they had no such agreement.

PORTUGUESE ANARCHIST

Tells of Assassination of King Carlos—The Men Selected for the Murderous Work Were Divided into Four Groups, Each Waiting at a Different Point—Many Prominent Persons Implicated.

Lisbon, May 26—The Government is awaiting the completion of the investigation of the statements made by an Anarchist named Ramires before taking action against those named as the conspirators in the assassination of King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz in 1908. Ramires escaped to Brazil, following the assassinations, but was recently arrested and brought back here. Subsequently he made a confession and gave to the police the names of 1,148 persons, including several prominent in politics, who, he said, shared in the conspiracy.

According to Ramires, those selected for the killing were divided into four groups and placed at as many points along the route of the royal carriages, in order that if one group failed the others would be prepared to execute the death designs.

COAL STRIKE COSTS

GLACE BAY \$52,000

Sydney, N.S., May 26—The taxpayers of the town of Glace Bay are now up against a heavy bill of expense in connection with the calling out of the Militia during the strike. The Militia Department is now calling upon the taxpayers to pay the sum of \$51,971.72 to defray the expenses of the soldiers who were called to protect life and property.

Of this amount \$12,316.00 is claimed from the municipality for protection at Dominion No. 6 and Reserve Mines. This amount Warden Levate regards out of proportion, but before moving further in the matter he will await a detailed statement from the authorities.

STATUS OF OVERSEAS DOMINIONS RECOGNIZED

While Nominally All Arrangements With Other Countries Must be Made Through the Imperial Government, Each Oversea State is at Liberty to Make Its Own Terms.

London, May 26—A parliamentary White Paper has been issued regarding the question of colonial treaty-making powers, containing the correspondence between the British Government and those of the over-seas states.

Lord Ripon, in 1895, in connection with the speeches made at the conference on the trade relations of the Empire at Ottawa sent a circular despatch to the Dominion governments laying down the principles that a foreign power can only be approached through the British representative at the court of that power; that to give the colonies the power of negotiating treaties for themselves without reference to Her Majesty's Government would be to give them international status as separate sovereign states, and would be equivalent to breaking up the Empire but it would be desirable generally that the British Ambassador who was conducting the negotiations should have the assistance of a delegate of the colonial government to act as a second plenipotentiary or in a subordinate capacity.

On July 4, 1907 Sir Edward Grey, informing the British Ambassador at Paris of the desire of the Canadian Government to open negotiations

with the French government for a new commercial convention recalled the despatch of Lord Ripon and said:—"I do not, however, think it necessary to adhere in the present case to the strict letter of this regulation the object of which was to secure that negotiations should not be entered into or carried through by a colony unknown to and independently of His Majesty's Government. The selection of the negotiator is principally a matter of convenience, and in the present circumstances, it would obviously be more practical that the negotiations should be left to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the Canadian Minister of Finance, who will doubtless keep you informed of their progress. If the negotiations are brought to a conclusion in Paris you should sign an agreement jointly with the Canadian negotiator, who will be given full powers for the purpose."

In a subsequent despatch to the Ambassador, Sir Edward added:—

"In the event of the Canadian delegates desiring to make or accept any verbal alterations, either in the English or the French text, you are authorized to agree thereto without reference to me."

ALBERTA POLITICS NOW UNDERGOING SHUFFLE

Premier Rutherford Retires and Chief Justice Sifton Resigns from Bench to Take Reins of Government.

Edmonton, May 26—Premier Rutherford resigned this afternoon and Chief Justice Sifton was immediately sworn in as prime minister.

It is stated, on good authority, that Sir Wilfrid was instrumental in having the arrangement made to call Sifton, and the latter consented to become premier at his personal request.

It is understood several of the present ministers will be retained, but the future of Cross, attorney-general who was one of the strongest defenders of the Alberta & Great Waterways Railway contract, is doubtful.

The whole arrangement is a compromise intended to establish unity in the party. The cabinet personnel will probably be announced next week. None of the insurgents are regarded as having any chance to be included.

WORLD'S CROPS CONTINUE TO SHOW UP WELL

Montreal, May 26.—From the most recent despatches from European centres, it would seem that there is some small disappointments in regard to the crops of certain of the large wheat raising countries, because expectations were very high; but the general outlook continues excellent. The daily decline in the price of wheat is perhaps the best gauge of the supplies, visible and to come.

Some deterioration, it is said, has occurred in France owing to cool, wet weather. Low temperatures have also been complained of in Germany. But the wheat outlook there is still good. There is need of rain in Southern Italy. Wheat is not promising so well in the United Kingdom. But the outlook in Hungary and Roumania, as well as Bulgaria, is favorable. In South Russia warmer rainy weather has prevailed, and farther north prospects are seasonable. In India harvest weather is slightly less favorable for the north. Australia is waiting a more favorable turn for seedling wheat. Argentina has good soil conditions for autumn seeding.

The situation in the Canadian west just now, is curious. There is much uneasiness, as farmers still have over 25,000,000 bushels of last year's crops, and there is such difference between the price Canadians are asking and the English markets are willing to pay, that it looks as though a great portion of wheat on hand would have to be carried over till next year.
