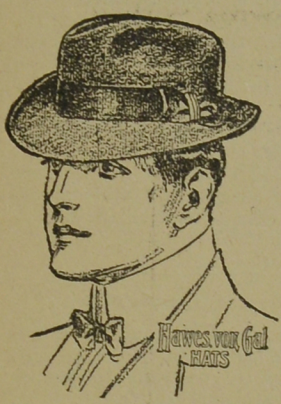

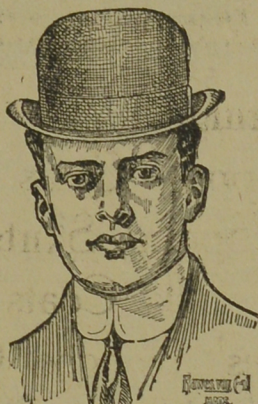

PAID VALUE OF ORE INTO COURT

Toronto, March 10.—Master in Chambers Cartwright has adjourned a motion to compel George Barber, James Connelly and others to tell where they got the ore which they sold to J. E. Wilkinson Co. of this city. The Wilkinson company has paid into court the value of the ore, and the money is claimed by the men named and by the Nipissing and Crown reserve mines.

At the examinations at North Bay on March 1, the men refused, on the advice of counsel, to tell where they got the ore.

St. John, March 11.—Members of the Horticultural Association are much exercised over Aldermen Kelly and Potts' opposition in legislative committee to fix a grant of \$4,000 a year for Rockwood Park by the Common Council. They promise to make a fight for it.

TROUBLE WITH DRIVES EXPECTED

St. John, March 10.—The snow is gone, or all but so, and a number of the lumber operators in the lower sections of the province have been compelled already to cease operations. Their success in getting out their cut now depends chiefly upon the way in which they located in the fall. Those who have divided their operations up so as to be near the railroads or on the highways will get out a good average cut. They will be able to get their lumber to the highways if it is not located very far from them, and by taking portable mills to their brows, will be able to saw and take their stuff out on wheels during the summer. In some cases they will have to resort to the trick of building tramways from the railway lines in to their brows. It seems to be the general sense of the operators that the cut is fully up to average, but that every one will experience great difficulty in getting his lumber to the markets. The snow gone, there is now great competition to secure portable mills, upon which the situation depends, and the owners of these are having a great season.

A. McLeod, who is cutting at Anandale on the N. B. Coal & Railway Co's line, for Malcolm Mackay and George McKean, is one of the lucky ones. He will get out all his 2,500,000 foot cut by using a tramway for 800,000 of it, and utilizing his situation to the highway. The others near him have not been so fortunate, however, and will have to abandon much of their cuts.

Parker Glasier, M. P. P., for Sunbury county yesterday said that many of the operators would lose largely, although the price which the shortage would cause should help them some. The amount of the cut was all right, although the fall had been useless on account of rain, as there had been a long enough period of good sledding to insure an average cut and its yarding, but few would be able to get out more than half of their cut, for there were no hopes of any more snow.

CRESCENTS CHAMPIONS.

Amherst, N. S., March 10.—The Amherst Ramblers won the Nova Scotia Amateur Hockey League championship tonight by defeating the Halifax Crescents 17 to 0. Only a small crowd witnessed the game and were much disappointed over the showing made.

SELLING PRESSURE CAUSED SHARP SLUMP

New York, March 11.—Active selling pressure in the opening dealings in stocks carried prices downwards sharply all through the list. The most active stocks nearly all showed losses of a point, these including Union Pacific, St. Paul, New York Central Interboro, Metropolitan, pfd., American Smelting, Amalgamated Copper, Anaconda and Central Leather, American Car. lost 1½ and Reading and Great Northern pfd. were down ½.
