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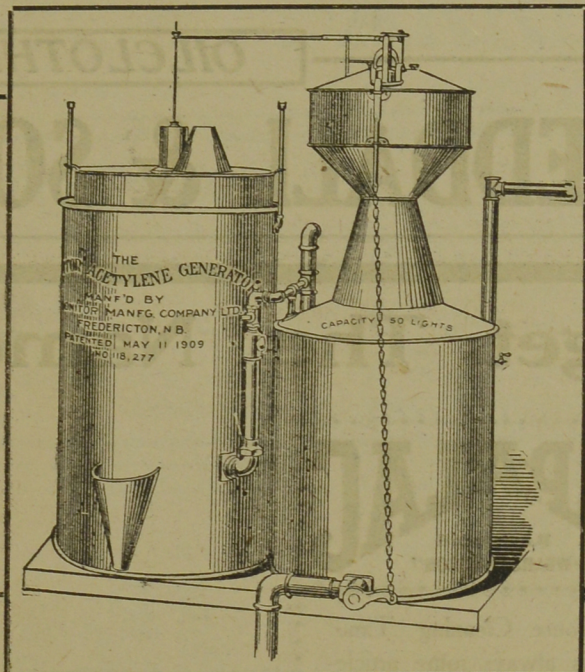

### INDIGNANT DENIAL

New York, April 13—Samuel F. Hayden, a Washington attorney, who was one of counsel for Mrs. Florence Maybrick in her fight for release from a British prison and has since been her legal representative in this country has branded as incorrect the reports from Paris that Baroness de Roques, Mrs. Maybrick's mother had died in poverty there. The Baroness, he said, only left this country for France early in March and he had supplied her with ample funds. He added that she was also authorized to draw on him for more money if needed.

Reports of trouble between the late Baroness and Mrs. Maybrick were also denied by Mr. Hayden. He declared that they had been on the best of terms and that the Baroness only reason for going abroad was because the climate of Chicago did not agree with her.

When Mrs. Florence Maybrick learned of the death of her mother, Baroness de Roques in Paris, she said "I don't understand it, the friends with whom she was staying in Paris know where I can be found. The story of her dying in want is false. I have taken care of her and we have been together ever since I left England. She had been in Paris about a fortnight and I have received three letters from her, all telling how well she was getting along. The last one I received only this morning. I had intended going to her just as soon as my engagement would allow me."

## JAPAN HAS LARGE MERCHANT FLEET

In this She Has Great Advantage over United States—Americans Lack Merchant Marine.

New York, April 13.—Discussing the possibility of war between the United States and Japan, Mr. Leslie W. Shaw former Secretary of the Treasury, addressing the Commercial Travellers' National Merchant Marine Association, said, inter alia:

"Japan has 550 merchant ships in commission now and about as many more under construction. We have six. In the event of war, Japan could put 200,000 soldiers on the Hawaiian Islands in one month, because she has the ships. We could not put 100,000 soldiers there in one year, because we have not the ships.

"On any foggy day Japan could land 100,000 men on the Pacific coast and they could take our sea forts from the rear before the forts could be prepared for landward defence.

"In the late trip of the battleship fleet around the world, we hired the ships of twenty-five nations to act as colliers. Not one of those ships could be available for us in the event of war. And when war comes, a battleship without coal will be found more useless than a battleship without guns. I am in favor of the proposed appropriation of \$129,000,000 for our navy, but I am also in favor of a million or two now and then to get a merchant marine."

## EVIL DISCLOSURES STILL IN HARRY THAW CASE

New York, April 13.—(Special) Clifford W. Hartridge one of the attorneys who defended Harry Thaw in his first trial for the murder of Stanford White failed today in his effort to collect from Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw the prisoners' mother, a balance of \$92,000 for counsel fees and disbursements which he claimed to be due him.

More than that, Judge Holt, of the United States circuit court, in denying a motion to set aside the sealed verdict of the jury which had heard Hartridge's suit against Mrs. Thaw, made the sensational statement that an inquiry was uncalled for, regarding the professional conduct of Hartridge and to determine whether ground existed for perjury prosecution.

Hartridge had already been paid \$33,000. His suit for \$92,000 and interest which he claimed to be due as a balance, has been on trial for several days. This verdict was in favor of the defendant, Mrs. Thaw. The counsel for Hartridge immediately moved to set it aside.

Judge Holt denied the motion. "The developments in this case," said Judge Holt, "called for a rigid examination into the personal conduct of the plaintiff to determine whether grounds for a prosecution for perjury exists."

Judge Holt ordered the papers in the case left with the court and that the district attorney be notified. The bar association will also be notified. During the trial, Mrs. Thaw and Harry Thaw testified. Hartridge recited numerous payments he claimed to have been made to women of the tenderloin and others in smoothing out certain stories, concerning Thaw.

Judge Holt declared that if Hartridge had paid money to women who might have been witnesses at the Thaw trial, it was a case for the grand jury.

### THE DETROIT STRIKE

Detroit, Mich., April 14.—President Jere G. Hutchins, of the Detroit United Railway Company, President Mahon, of the International Street Railway Men's Association, and Mayor Philip Breitmeier, held a conference today relating to the threatened walk-out of conductors and motormen on Detroit city lines. If the railway company refuses to grant the demands of the men for a flat wage scale of thirty cents an hour, it is thought the matter will be brought before the International executive committee which meets here Friday.

### EARTHQUAKE IN KANSAS

Lawrence, Kansas, April 12.—Two earthquake shocks were reported last night by the seismograph of the Kansas University. The first begun at 6.40 p. m. and reached its full force at 6.47. The second shock begun at 9.02 p. m. and lasted five minutes. The source of the disturbance was within 1,500 and 1,600 miles southwest.

### A MAD ANARCHIST

Paris, April 13.—A sensation was caused in the Palace of Justice today when an anarchist, in revenge fired four shots at M. Flery, president of the court, which found the man guilty a year ago. Emery was not hit by the bullets and the anarchist was arrested.

## CRUSADE AGAINST CONSUMPTION

1909 Banner Year—Canada Participated in Movement—Annual Meeting of Society in Montreal in June.

The year 1909 will be marked in the calendar as a red letter year in the history of the crusade against consumption. The movement received a great impulse from the congress of distinguished physicians which was held in Washington, U. S., in the autumn of 1908 to consider the further measures to be taken to stamp out this dreadful enemy to the life and happiness of mankind.

Canada in common with the rest of North America, perhaps one should say the whole civilized world, has participated in the renewed and increased activity which resulted from the deliberations of the congress.

Never since the organization of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis has there been such activity displayed in Canada in this fight for life. Older branch associations have been reinvigorated, new associations have been formed which are showing in many cases a vigorous activity. Several new institutions for the relief and treatment of consumptives have been opened and the demand for our literature has been larger than ever. Take it all in all 1909 was a year of great progress in the work of the Association.

The Tenth Annual Meeting will be held in Montreal on the 7th of June next and preparations are being made to make this one of the best, if not the best meeting in the history of the Association.

## STREAM DRIVING HAS BEGUN ON MIRAMICHI

Chatham, April 12.—The first stream driving of importance on the Miramichi took place yesterday when 100 men went in on the Sobies River to drive out the logs of the Rosbank Lumber Company and the Miramichi Lumber Company. It is stated by people who live up the river that the ice is all out of the stream and that the conditions are such that the stream-driving season will be a favorable one. The southwest boom will be hung on Wednesday.

A rather groomsome find was made by a resident of Loggieville a few days ago when he picked up in the river a pair of dead horses, to which a sled was still attached. Upon inquiry it was learned that the horses were drowned three weeks ago at Northwest Bridge. They had been drowned while crossing the ice with a load of stone and were owned by Sinclair Bros., lumbermen, of Bridge-town. The horses had been carried down stream a distance of sixteen miles.

Peter McDonald, of this town was married to Miss Nellie Messeter, of London, England, at the cathedral at 6 o'clock this morning. Mr. McDonald was for a number of years clerk at the Adams House, and lately has acted in the same capacity at the Touraine Hotel. Mr. McDonald has purchased the Riverview Hotel and will start business on his own account on May 1.

The local authorities have begun a campaign against the selling of cigarettes to minors. Seven boys appeared before Judge Connors on Saturday, the case being the first of the kind in the town. All were let go with a caution and the owners of some of the tobacco shops will be summoned.

### LURED TO THEIR RUIN

New York, April 13.—(Special) With the arraignment of six men in a Brooklyn police court today and the announcement that warrants were out for twenty others, the Brooklyn police declared that one of the biggest raids on dealers in "white slave" ever made in New York was in progress. Eight girls were in court to testify against the prisoners. One of them was only nine years old. The oldest was fifteen. They all told the same story that they had been lured to a moving picture show where candy or other cheap presents given to them, and they were taken to a house maintained as a headquarters by the band.

### SETTLEMENT EXPECTED

Winnipeg, April 13.—Special.—Amicable arrangements will be reached within a few days between the Canadian Pacific Railway and its commercial operators, who are demanding substantial increase. All operators between Fort William and the coast will share in the advance, which will amount to between ten and fifteen per cent.

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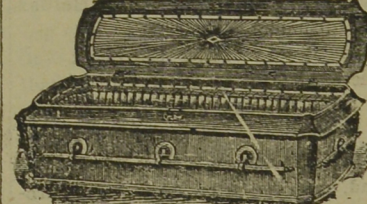
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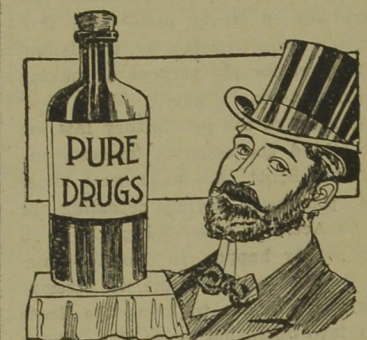
