On May 16th the applications for rights to mine coal underlying granted lands in the Grand Lake coal district in Queen's and Sunbury Counties will be received at the Crown Land office. Applications from owners of the fee in such granted lands, are to have precedence in making applications. The latter may be for license to search license to work or twenty-year cases. Heretofore, such licenses have not been given as far as granted land was concerned although the government had the power. In the Grand Lake district however, the owners of lands have taken no steps to develop and by issuing license to others development is to be forced.

MUNROE PLEADED
GUILTY TO THEFTArrested Yesterday at Oromocto—In
Scott Act Case Magistrate Speaks
of Penalties for Missing Witness

George Monroe, the young Scotchman charged with stealing thirty-five dollars from Henry Hallett, his chum, appeared in the police court this morning. He elected to be tried by Police Magistrate Marsh and pleaded guilty. His Honor remanded the prisoner until 11 a. m. Friday.

The magistrate asked the young man a few questions and told him he would be pleased to read any certificates of character he might produce or hear statements from his friends. The prisoner stated he was twenty-one years of age and a native of Scotland and had been in Canada about three months. He handed certain letters to the magistrate.

After reading them the magistrate said: "I am sorry to see a young man of your age, who can produce such a letter of recommendation from his clergyman, in the position you are, charged with stealing a sum of money."

The letter was from a local clergyman.

Monroe left town in a livery rig Tuesday afternoon and was arrested at Oromocto Wednesday morning by Policeman Foss, who went to Oromocto by boat. The young man was found at James Kelly's boarding house and was evidently going to lie low for a while.

SCOTT ACT CASE.

The Doherty Scott Act case was again before the court. Two witnesses were examined but the sale of liquor was not proven. City Clerk McCready, who was prosecuting, asked for a week's adjournment in order that Charles Blizzard, a much wanted witness, might be produced.

"I will grant the adjournment," said Magistrate Marsh. "I wish to say, moreover, that I will have any subpoenaed witness brought before this court if it takes two months. A witness who is served with a notice to appear before this court and who absents himself, makes himself liable not only to a heavy fine, but also to the cost the officer of the law may be put to, to get him."

TO ACT TOGETHER.

It is understood that the committee of the Board of Trade appointed to interview the provincial government with regard to the matter of assistance in paving the streets in the neighborhood of the Parliament Buildings will ask the city council to appoint a similar committee. The two will approach the government jointly.
