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

EXPLOSION IN MINE; FORTY ARE ENTOMBED

Birmingham, Ala., April 21.—The Mulga mine was still closed up today for fear of fire. Between 35 and 40 men, all except 15 of them for fear of fire. It is believed that all or most of them are dead. The cages in the shaft were so badly sprung by the force of the explosion that they are useless and all other means adopted by rescue parties in an effort to reach the entombed men have proved futile. Following the explosion, flames shot up the shaft of the mine for a distance of about 400 feet and the ground is covered with charred timbers blown up from the bottom of a 350-foot shaft by the explosion.

TERRIBLE RECORD

Washington, D. C., April 21.—A large increase in the number of casualties on American railroads is shown by the report for the quarter ended December 31, 1909, as compared with the corresponding quarter of the previous year. A bulletin issued today by the interstate commerce commission shows an increase in the number of persons killed of 301 and in the number of injured of 5,645, as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1908. The total number of persons killed was 1,099 and the total injured was 22,491.


