## BROUGHT BACK TO LIFE AFTER ALL HOPE GONE

Lad of Two Near Mount Elgin Fell into Water Tank—Was Almost Dead When Discovered—Physician's Hard Work Saved Him.

Ingersoll, Aug. 11.—When discovered by chance at the bottom of a large water tank in the barnyard of his father's farm, Louis Frank Vyse, the two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Vyse, who reside near Mount Elgin, was believed to be dead. The child's face had already turned black, and there was scarcely a sign indicating that he was alive. A local physician was summoned by telephone, and he made a rapid trip to the Vyse farm by auto. Although the family had practically given up all hope of the boy's life being saved, the physician worked heroically for over an hour and succeeded in resuscitating the child, who is expected to recover. The strange feature of the accident is that no one knows how long the child was in the water, he had not been missed, and was discovered when his brother went for a pail of water. There were about eighteen inches of water in the tank. The child is supposed to have climbed on top of boards which were laid over the tank, and to have fallen through them.
