## JACK TWIN

## SULLIVAN WENT

## AFTER REFEREE

Tried to Slug Official When Latter Awarded Bout to Porky Flynn—Langford in Ring.

Boston, Dec. 28.—The bout between Jack ("Twin") Sullivan and "Porky" Flynn at the Armory A. A. last evening ended in a manner that those present will not soon forget. Referee Dick Fleming making a flying leap from the ring to escape the wrathful onrushing Sullivan, who then assailed Flynn while Porky was sitting in his corner; the big Twin regaining his head and his ring manners only when Sam Langford, one of Flynn's seconds, suddenly appeared in the ring confronting him. Chasing a referee and hitting a seated opponent were one thing but taking on Langford at such short notice was not to Sullivan's liking, and he at once subsided.

DECISION NOT APPROVED.

Sullivan's anger was aroused by Fleming's award of the bout to Flynn. It was a case of the Twin losing his head. The decision did not meet with the approval of all the fans. Some figured that Sullivan was entitled to the award and there were many others who thought that the worst he should have got was a draw.

After Sullivan had struck Flynn while the latter was seated in his corner, Flynn started after him, and just then it was that Langford appeared in the ring.

It is a good bet that Referee Fleming made the quickest exit from a ring on record.

## FLYNN IMPROVED.

Being with Sam Langford has improved Flynn somewhat. For about a minute after he left his corner he boxed well, but after that he went back to his old style of boxing. He centered most of his blows on the Twin's body, and sent some stiff rights and lefts on to that part of the Twin in most of the rounds.

In the fourth round Flynn accidentally butted the Twin on the left eye, and during the rest of the bout the Twin was bothered considerably by the injury.

## TWIN FORCED FIGHT.

Twin boxed in his usual way and in every round he managed to hook some lefts to Flynn's face and body.

The latter did some good countering, and both blocked many hard punches. Flynn, when at close range would often shoot short rights to the Twin's head, eye and when in the clinches, Flynn seldom missed banging the right onto the ribs or kidneys.

In the last two rounds the Twin had Flynn looking a bit weary with lefts and rights on the face and jaw. In the eleventh round the Twin hooked a hard left into Flynn's wind that must have hurt, judging from the expression that came on his face.

The latter handed the Twin some returns on the face and body, but they served only to make the Twin force matters all the harder, and for several seconds after the bell sounded both continued boxing.

When the referee made his decision declaring Flynn the winner, the Twin let fly the left, which the referee avoided by a few inches and made his leap through the ropes.

In the opening bout Young O'Conner of Cambridge, was given the decision over Young Goodrich of Lynn, in 5 rounds. Joe White of South Boston, and Joe Eagan, of the South End, put up a rattling good 6 round bout, which was called a draw. Kid Pantz defeated Young Jasper in their 6 round bout.

Flynn is likely to be Sandy Ferguson's opponent in the feature bout at the meeting next Tuesday night.

## BILLY ALLEN MATCHED

## WITH ABE ATTELL

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—Word was received here that Abe Attehl and Billy Allen, Canadian champion, have finally been matched for a fight to decide the world's feather-weight honors. They will clash at Syracuse on the night of January 23. The men have been negotiating for some time, but a hitch was suddenly brought about through Attehl's demands. He insisted on a guarantee of \$2,000 and that both men weigh in at 3 o'clock at 123 pounds. The club refused the financial terms and Allen wanted to weigh in at 126. Finally, however, Attehl insisted that they grant his demands or call everything Allen and the Syracuse City club agreed to accept Attehl's terms, and the fight is now cinched. Allen is training at Syracuse, and his wired for his brother Collie to help him out. Win or lose with Attehl Allen will go out west for a tour in the spring.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
