PREMIER'S TOUR ENDED FINAL PLEA FOR UNITY OF EAST AND WEST

Crows Nest, B. C., Aug. 31.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party today concluded their tour of British Columbia with meetings at Cranbrook and Fernie.

In closing his address, at Fernie, Sir Wilfrid took occasion to express his appreciation of the reception accorded him throughout the whole Province, irrespective of party affiliations.

"British Columbia is bigger than I thought when I left Ottawa eight weeks ago," he said. "Your goodness and hospitality have warmed my heart, and will ever be remembered."

At Cranbrook the Premier set the stamp of approval on Malcolm A. MacDonald, the young Liberal who suffered defeat for the provincial legislature at the recent elections. Hon. Mr. Templeman expressed the hope that he would yet be in power in the provincial house.

"I have something better to suggest," observed the Premier. "Let us here and now nominate him as the standard bearer of Liberalism in the next federal campaign."

As a closing word, Sir Wilfrid Laurier counselled the people to hasten the time when less would be heard of east and west, and more of the Dominion as a whole.

ADAMLESS EDEN FOR NEW YORK

New York, Aug. 31.—A whole city block of women, with not a man in sight, will become an interesting reality in the "improved mode of living" in New York City early next year. Prominent New York men and women, who are keenly interested in the housing problem, say the new arrangement will offer accommodations for many hundreds of New York's business and professional women and students who represent the bachelor maid population of the city.

The members of the woman colony, which it is declared will be the only one of its kind in the world, will be housed in two separate buildings.

The buildings when completed will accommodate nearly one thousand women. The only men to be allowed on the premises will be those received socially by the young women guests. Men will be encouraged to make social calls, and provision has been made for this social feature of the club by providing a few dozen of what will be known as "beau parlors." Here young women may receive their friends and no record will be kept of the gas burned. In the new order of things, where women will live under the same unrestrained liberty as the men and women of wealthy clubs, there will be no interfering janitress, no elevator maid, no woman superintendent, or lady night watchman tiptoeing about the halls turning out the gas, as a gentle hint to the young man that he had better be moving.
