He alleges she also kicked him on the shins when in bad humor over his suspension and called him names. The police report says Rube's landlady held him at bay until his arrest. Waddell took his belongings from the boarding house today.

HARRINGTON SAID TO BE SIGNED WITH AMERICAN TEAM

Boston College Pitcher now Player in St. John According to Telegraph will Play in Big League Company Next Season.

It will be interesting news for the fans that Frank Harrington, St. Peter's new pitcher, has signed, since reaching St. John, with one of the leading teams of the American League, and now has the contract in his pocket, complete with his signature. Harrington will report toward the close of the present season. His services are chiefly required for next season. To those who have seen Harrington perform, the news of his call will not come as a surprise. He has all kinds of shoots and all kinds of control, combined with plenty of power. He plays well with his fielders, and aims to reduce the game to the best combination possible.

During the present season, with Boston College, and with the Milford, N. H. team of the Bay State League Harrington has lost but one game. He will pitch this afternoon in the St. Peter's-St. Joseph's game.

CHICAGO AMERICAN'S FINE NEW GROUNDS

Chicago, June 24--The new \$750,000 plant of the Chicago American League club was completed today, except for a few finishing touches. It will be dedicated on July 1. The grounds' grandstand, pavilion and bleachers have a seating capacity of 35,000.

The players' clubhouse contains hot and cold baths, showers, rubbing tables and other conveniences. There is a lighting system for the purpose of holding big outdoor entertainments at night, night baseball being a possibility.

C. P. R. OFFICIALS REFUSE TO ANSWER MEN'S ULTIMATUM

Neither Side Satisfied with Terms Suggested--Some Comment Over Men's Action in View of Acquiescence of Their Representatives in Conciliation Board's Finding.

Montreal, June 23--The award of the board of conciliation and arbitration in the case of the dispute between the G. T. R. and its employees, in the yard and train service on the Eastern division, was today rejected by the general committee representing the men, which is in session here, just as the decision of how the trouble between C. P. R. and its employees in similar branches of the service should be settled, was rejected on Tuesday.

The committee are preparing a long report, setting forth their objections to the decision, which will be forwarded to the department of labor at Ottawa and to the G. T. P. today.

The report will also contain answers to the arguments of Wallace Nesbitt, who represented the railroads on the board, and who did not agree with the conclusions arrived at by the chairman and by the representatives of the employees. Mr. Nesbitt's objections to the decision of his conferees on the committee were set forth in a minority report.

The action of the men in rejecting the suggestions of settlement offered by the board is in some circles regarded as peculiar, in view of the fact that their representative, in conjunction with the chairman, handed down the award, while the representative of the company was the member to object to it. It is stated, however, by the leaders of the men that their representative's views differed in several particulars from those of the chairman, but that finally he conceded several points to arrive at a decision.

BOTH SIDES DISSATISFIED.

As matters stand now both the men and the company are dissatisfied with the award. The work of the department of labor finished when the decision of the board had been handed down and the matter of wages and conditions of service must now be decided between the men and the company.

Up to tonight the committee had received no word from the C. P. R. in answer to their ultimatum delivered on Wednesday morning announcing their refusal to accept the award of the board in the case of the dispute between the C. P. R. and its employees, whom the committee represent.

Their message demanded an answer before 10 a. m. today, and declared that it would be unless to hold further meetings to consider the question of a settlement unless the company would without reservation agree to accept the principle of the standardization of wage rates throughout the territory in question, so as to place their men on the same basis as those of other railroads in the territory.

The message further declared that failure to reply before the hour mentioned would be taken to indicate that the C. P. R. refused to grant the concessions asked for and that the committee would proceed to act on that assumption.

The committee, however, took no action when they failed to hear from the company, as it was understood that owing to delay at the labor department at Ottawa, the company had not received the official copy of the award until noon today.

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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
