ACCOUNTS OF TORREY
EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN
ARE MADE PUBLIC

Counterfeit Dollar and Missing Hymn Books Financial Loss to Committee—Large Spiritual Balance.

The accounts of the Torrey Evangelistic Campaign, held in the Arctic Rink May 15—June 12, have been closed and all bills paid. The minutes of the various meetings of the executive and the accounts of the treasurer have been deposited with the secretary, Rev. Dr. Smith, for future reference. The statement of receipts and expenditures as given below are self-explanatory, unless it be an item of \$11.89, (less \$2.40), which the committee paid for Hymn Books carried away from the rink by people of musical but absent-minded ways. A counterfeit silver dollar also escaped the scrutiny of the finance committee when the money was counted and deposited. This spurious coin is the only financial souvenir of the campaign. On the moral and spiritual side there is a large balance, which, it is believed, will be an asset of until value to the city and, indeed, the whole province, for years to come.

"H" COMPANY, R. C. R.,
LEFT FOR CAMP SUSSEX
ON THIS MORNING'S TRAIN

71st York Regt. will Leave Early Tuesday Morning—Advance Party Goes on Monday.

The first detachment of troops to leave for Camp Sussex was "H" Co. R. C. R. of this city which made its departure by C. P. R. this morning. The soldiers paraded at the barracks at 9.15 and marched to the railway station under the command of Capt. du Domaine with Lieut. Costin as subaltern. Q. M. Sergt. Galloway is in charge of the barracks with a small party of men under his command.

The advance party of the 71st York Regiment will leave Fredericton on the 9.45 train Monday morning. The party will be composed of three men from each company and will be commanded by Q. M. Sergt. Clark. Capt. Pringle the quarter master will meet the party at Sussex.

The regiment will leave at 7 a. m. Tuesday. The local companies "A", "D" and "G" will parade at the drill hall at 6 a. m. "B" Company will drive from Burr's Corner in time to join the others here. "C" Company of Stanley will proceed to camp with the 73rd Northumberland Regiment via Chatham Junction.

So far recruiting has been brisk and it is expected that the regiment will go to camp at full strength. There will be a scarcity of officers however. Capt. F. A. Good of this city, who is in command of "E" Company of Fredericton Junction will again act as musketry officer during camp. Lieut. Sansom of Stanley will be attached to "E" Company during camp. It is likely that several officers of the 62nd St. John Fusiliers will be attached to the 71st Regiment during camp.

THE SPRINGHILL ROAD
SHOULD BE GIVEN
SOME ATTENTION

The Most Popular Drive-Way in This Vicinity in Now Scarcely Passable.

The Springhill road, which should be Fredericton's most popular and attractive suburban driveway, is in any thing but a satisfactory condition at the present time. It seems to have very poor drainage and there are many deep holes in it, calculated to bring cuss words from drivers of automobiles and other vehicles. This is about the only country road which is frequented by any considerable number of Fredericton people, and it is up to the Department of Public Works to do something to improve it. It is no secret that there is a scarcity of money for road purposes at the present time, but the Springhill road is certainly entitled to some special consideration. The Mail feels certain that if some public-spirited owner of an automobile would take the Chief Commissioner for a drive over this piece of road during his next visit to Fredericton, and explain the situation to him, that he would see to it that adequate repairs are made.

There is a splendid opportunity to obtain a supply of gravel from the river, and the cost of hauling and spreading it upon the road would not be great.

Last year when Mr. Edward Moore was chairman of the road committee, he had a section of Government Lane gravelled, and today there is no finer piece of roadway in this province. Autoists never fail to "pull out" when they strike this piece of road, and only respect for the speed laws prevents them from striking a fifty-mile an hour clip. The City Council should finish graveling the roadway to Bailey's bridge, and the Public Works Department should continue the good work as far as Springhill. This is a matter of vital importance to a good many people, and the Chief Commissioner will make friends for himself by giving it his attention.

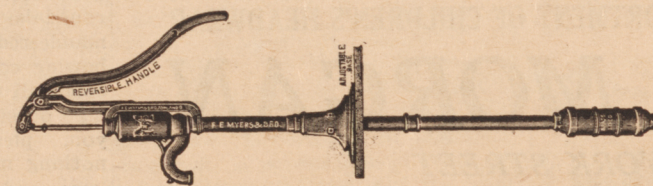
