**PHARMACEUTICAL SOCIETY MEETS HERE THURSDAY**

Visiting Druggists Will Be Entertained at Pine Bluff Where Meeting Will Be Held.

The New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society will hold its annual meeting here on Thursday. It is about ten years since this society met in Fredericton in annual session. As announced previously in The Mail the meeting will be held in one of the camps a few miles above the city. The business session will be held in the afternoon and in the evening the visiting druggists will be the guests of those of the city at dinner. The details of the programme of the meeting will not be known until tomorrow.

The members of the Society from places outside the city are expected to arrive here in the morning. The majority will come from St. John. It is not yet known how many will attend the meeting but it is expected that the total number will be about thirty. In the afternoon the delegates will proceed to Pine Bluff by motor boat. The business of the afternoon will consist of the election of a council, the review of the year's business and the reading of papers by prominent members of the society. In the evening there will be a dinner with other entertainment following. Mr. P. J. Mahoney of St. John is the present president of the society.

**IS IT THE BROWN TAIL MOTH?**

His Worship Mayor Thomas is disturbed over the discovery of a peculiar species of moth on the grounds of his residence Waterloo Row. The moth was shown to a lady who, while a resident of the state of Maine saw the ravages of the Brown Tail Moth and was acquainted with the appearance of that pest. She pronounced it to be similar in appearance to the Brown Tailed Moth. His Worship still has the moth in his possession and will obtain expert opinion on the matter. The insect was found on an elm tree. It is to be hoped that Fredericton will escape the ravages of this Brown Tailed moth as disfigured trees would detract much from the appearance of the city.

**APPLIED FOR WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS**

Attempt to get Harvey Hanson out of Jail—Judge Barry will give Judgment Tomorrow.

Application for a writ of Habeas Corpus was read this morning before His Honor Judge Barry on behalf of Harvey Hanson, who was sent to jail on Thursday last in default of payment of a fine of fifty dollars, imposed for first offence under the Canada Temperance Act. Mr. P. J. Hughes supported the application and the city clerk, Mr. J. W. McCready, opposed.

**GROUND OF APPLICATION.**

The grounds on which the application is based are: There was no evidence of an offence under the C. T. Act before the magistrate.

That the conviction was against the evidence.

That facts produced in evidence constituted a gift not a sale.

That the commitment varied from the conviction and date.

**JUDGMENT TOMORROW.**

His Honor said that he would be prepared to give judgment tomorrow. The argument occupied a couple of hours.

Hanson was captured on Thursday last by Police Sergeant Phillips, who found him walking on Brunswick St., in the rear vicinity of the jail. He did not have to go far to hand his prisoner over to the Deputy Sheriff. Hanson had been wanted for some time previously, but had evaded the police.

**AUTO BLEW UP.**

With a bang that was heard for miles around the large touring automobile belonging to an American named Gibson, who was touring Nova Scotia, went up in the air at Annapolis last week, and when it landed it was in a thousand pieces and the owner was lying dead by the roadside. The chauffeur who was badly injured says something went wrong with the flow of gasoline, and Gibson got out to see what the trouble was. He opened the tank and in some unknown way, let fall the lighted cigar that he was smoking. In an instant there was a frightful explosion and the machine was blown to pieces. Gibson was dashed against a tree and broke his neck. Gibson's body was sent home to Newark.

**BUKOWINA WON FROM BOBS HANDILY**

Exciting Motor-Boat Race Last Night Won by S. Kerner's Craft—Eight Mile Course.

The Bukowina holds the motor boat championship of the river, winning easily from the Bobs in an eight-mile race last night. No official time was taken, but those who did time the winner, agreed on 1 hour and 5 minutes as the time. The Bukowina certainly travelled some.

The race excited much curiosity and at the finish there was a big crowd of spectators on the bridge as well as another crowd of enthusiasts at Atherton's boat-house.

The start was made off Atherton's, Starter Chas. Flett getting them away together. Early in the race it was seen that the Bobs had little chance. The Bukowina with Commodore S. Kerner at the engine, and Capt. W. A. Lindsay steering, walked right away from the Bobs, with her owner, George Chubbick, handling the engine and Bert Atherton at the helm.

The bouy at the Birches was rounded by the Bukowina with about a half mile lead. The Bobs had difficulty in getting through the swift water in the vicinity. It was a procession all the way down to the bridge, where Commodore Kerner gracefully acknowledged the cheers of the crowd. The Bukowina returned to Atherton's just as the Bobs, which did not finish, got in.

It is to be hoped that this race is the beginning of a series. There are numerous boats here and good races could be arranged.

The presence of other craft on the course, some of which got in the way of the racing boats, interfered greatly with the latter last night.

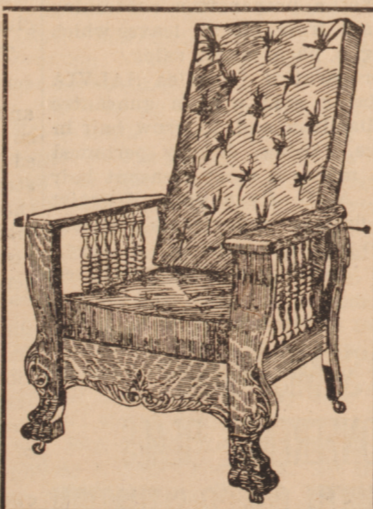
