GOVERNMENT TO SELL PULPWOOD CONCESSIONS

Tenders Will be Asked for Rights in Nipegon Pulp Limits--Paper Mills Must be Built--Conditions Prevent Pulpwood or Pulp Being Exported--Successful Tenderer Must Erect and Equip a Paper Mill to Cost Half a Million Dollars--Government will Secure Bonus in Addition to Cutting Dues.

THE NIPEGON PULP LIMITS.

It is announced through the Department of Lands, Forests and Mines that the right to cut pulpwood in the Nipegon limit, the territory tributary to Nipegon River and along the shores of Nipegon Lake will be advertised for sale.

The conditions with respect to the Nipegon limit stipulate that the successful tenderer must erect and equip a paper mill at a cost of \$500,000, and that only in the form of paper may the product of the forest be exported.

The Nipegon limit concession was advertised for sale two years ago, but the tenders were not satisfactory to the department.

Toronto, July 14--The right to cut pulpwood in the area tributary to the Nipegon River and along the shores of Lake Nipegon in the Thunder Bay district, a section of the north country covering many hundreds of square miles, will be sold by the Provincial Government. Tenders will be called for on Saturday.

concessions was arrived at by Hon. Mr. Cochrane, Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines, after the department had been approached by several parties who desired to secure the right to cut the pulpwood and manufacture paper. Two years ago it was decided to dispose of the concession, and tenders were asked for, but the figures submitted were not satisfactory to the Government. From the inquiries that have been made recently it is believed that with the increased value of pulpwood tenders will be received that will prove satisfactory.

MUST MANUFACTURE PAPER.

One of the most important points in connection with the decision to sell the concession is the condition of sale, which prohibits the exportation of either pulpwood or wood pulp itself and makes it obligatory upon the lessee to spend half a million of dollars in erecting and equipping a paper mill. When the concession was advertised two years ago the condition governing this point was that the successful tenderer should enter into an agreement with the Government to erect and operate a mill with a daily output of 150 tons of paper, and to employ an average of 250 hands for at least ten months each year. It was further stipulated that no wood cut on the territory should be exported. These conditions are retained, with the change that the pulp may only be exported in the form of paper.

THE EXTENT OF THE PULP LIMIT.

The successful tenderer will be given the right to cut spruce, poplar, whitewood and balsam or jack pine nine inches and upwards in diameter along the Nipegon River for a distance of five miles inland and along the shores of Lake Nipegon for five miles inland. The right to cut pulpwood continues for twenty-one years and is subject to such regulations as to cutting, measuring, etc., as may be made by the Government from time to time.

MUST PAY BONUS.

Tenders will be called upon to state the amount they are prepared to pay as a bonus in addition to the ordinary dues. The tenders will be decided according to the amount of this bonus. The regular dues are forty cents a cord for spruce and twenty cents a cord for all other woods mentioned. The Government retains the right to change these dues. The successful tenderer has no right to cut other timber or to use or dispose of the land in any way.

STEAMER ON FIRE

New Bedford, Mass., July 15--The steamer James S. Whitney, New York for Boston, of the Metropolitan Line went aground in Vineyard Sound with her cargo on fire.

The Whitney carries two passengers. Her crew numbering thirty men are attempting to drown out the blaze. A revenue cutter is hurrying to the distressed vessel.

GRAND TRUNK RY. SEEKING MEN TO TAKE STRIKERS PLACE

Have Opened Office in Toronto for this Purpose, But the Dissatisfied Employees Say this is Only Bluff on the Company's Part.

Toronto, July 14--The Grand Trunk has opened an office in Toronto and is advertising for experienced conductors and trainmen to take the place of strikers. Officials say the company is actively preparing for a strike, but the employees say the act is a bluff to impress them.

Montreal, July 14--(Special)--The final count of the strike vote on the Central Vermont, a subsidiary to the Grand Trunk, showed today that 98 per cent of the men voted to strike if they did not secure the full eastern association wage schedule. This demand was not accepted by General Manager Jones, but the matter has been left to be settled with the main dispute with the Grand Trunk.

The vote on the latter line is coming in and the union leaders say they expect a big majority in support of their contentions and that they will not act without a majority approximating 75 per cent. In that case Vice-President Berry said this evening the men would give the company one more opportunity to meet the wishes of the men, but no immediate strike orders were thought of as nothing would be done until the vote was in and presented to the Grand Trunk.

Negotiations are still going on with the C. P. R. The men say the company has accepted the schedule, but wants to vary the rules and conditions so as to modify its effect and it is this point which is being debated.

CHICAGO SUFFRAGETTES ADOPT AGGRESSIVE TACTICS

Chicago, Ill., July 15--Chicago suffragettes yesterday began to follow the methods of their London sisters and inaugurated a vigorous campaign on the streets in favor of votes for women. The first campaigners were a woman justice of the peace, a woman doctor, four Vassar Girls and two men equipped with an automobile, a permit from the chief of police, yellow hand bills and a contempt for rain. They preached the gospel of equal suffrage for the first time on the streets of the down town Chicago. The women pleaded for equal rights with men with a fervor that they kept some men standing in the rain for the better part of an hour and drew occasional applause.

INCOMPETENT CHAUFFEURS MUST STEP DOWN

New York, July 15--The confidential clerk to Secretary of State Koenig, who is conducting an examination for chauffeurs in this city under the provisions of New York State's new automobile law, believes that the examinations will have disqualified nearly one-fifth of the city's motor-car drivers by the time the last is held, just before August 1. After that date the examination will be far more severe. Of the 500 of New York's 25,000 hired chauffeurs who took the examination, fifteen percent failed to pass.
