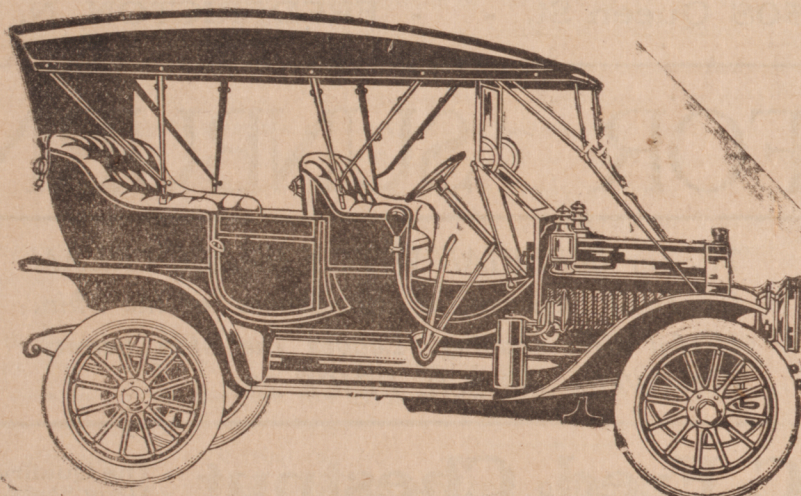

SNODGRASS AND COBB ARE THE TWO BATTING LEADERS

Giants Great Outfielder Fell Off a Few Points But Still Leads Nationals--Cobb and Lajoie Both Have Higher Averages.

NATIONAL LEAGUE

Following are the averages of the leading batsmen of the National league who have taken part in 10 or more games. Fred Snodgrass of the Giants lost a number of points last week, but he still retains a firm grip on first place. His slump, however, resulted in his dropping below Lajoie and Cobb in percentage, and while Fred has repeatedly said he is not looking for cups or other honors for the premier batter of 1910, there is every reason to believe that McGraw is urging him on in an effort to capture some prize. The new batting sensation of the league has supplanted permanently Cy Seymour in the New York outfield.

Three men last week made enough hits to total an even 100 for the season's work. They were Schulte of the Cubs, Huggins of the Cardinals and Paskert of the Reds. The latter is again nearing the 300 class. Last week he did excellent work with the stick. Mitchell and Bescher, two fine batsmen, have fallen down badly in the past two months, and their failure to drive in runs has told in the team's standing.

Byrne of the Pirates leads the league in the number of hits.

All the regular men of the Pittsburgh team have done exceptionally well at the bat in the past month and their stick work has aided the pitchers in winning games. Wagner now ranks fifth and his work in the past week in all departments bordered the sensational. Fred Beck and Graham of the Boston Nationals are among the first 20 batters of the league. As usual Ty Cobb heads the list, but this week finds him with a none too comfortable lead over Lajoie who has passed the Tiger in the number of hits.

Paul Melan, the young western wonder who was put out by a pitched ball at Chicago was able to enter the game after a few days rest and is showing up strongly. In the west he has been the talk of all baseball writers.

Though the Red Sox slumped badly on their western trip, a number of their men are still hitting the ball well, although not as consistently as formerly. Speaker with .338 is the fourth man in the league.

Rube Oldring and Eddie Collins of the Athletics are two young men who are gathering base hits with a decided regularity. Collins a month ago was hitting for about .260. On the last western trip he picked up wonderfully, and securing three hits a game became a custom with him. No doubt before the season ends he will be up fighting with Lajoie, Cobb and Speaker for the leading honors.

A surprise in the league this season has been the phenomenal hitting of Kack Knight. He has played in many positions for the Highlanders and has done well in all. His teammate Cree, has been slashing hits out with much frequency and from an average of less than .200 a month ago he is now up among the first 20 men. The averages:

HOW BILL LANG AUSTRALIAN FIGHTER LOOKS ON STREET

Short Sketch of Man Who Thinks He Can Take Johnson's Measure-- Twenty Seven Years Old.

Pugilistic followers are just now much interested in the career of William Lang, heavyweight champion of Australia, better known as Bill, who is in this country and ready for business with champion Johnson. Oh, it isn't often one finds a good young man who doesn't smoke or drink or swear or even use the pink-edged language one finds about boxing shops, and who is also decorated with a nose that slants downward in the middle like a broken umbrella rib and whose ears are a bit frosted by the slam of glove. Lang is a surprise from more than one angle of view. In spite of the five years' professional fighting in Australia he looks and acts like a big, kind hearted, good natured kid. And the story of his life as he tells it, recalls the tales of the old days when the fancy and the Corinthians rode down by coach and chaise from London town to see the Darby Pet and Gloucester Chicken go at it in the snow brind a stack. He is the type of the old style British fighter, so far as his early schooling goes. His first fights were in the open air on the mining fields of Australia and his ambition seems always to have run toward winning the fight rather than toward pulling down the purse.

NOT A KICKER.

It may be assumed that he is a good sportsman, too. He is quite satisfied internally with the decision the referee gave on his fight with Tommy Burns. That is plain enough—but he doesn't say so. He doesn't set up the long yell about being robbed. "The referee gave the decision—and I suppose he was the best judge of the play" is the form in which he voices any grievance he may feel. Nor does he glory over his victory over old Bob Fitzsimmons. "He ought not to have come back to the ring," says Lang.

"I wasn't extra hard on the old chap."

LOOKS GOOD.

If he doesn't talk like a fighter he looks like one. His weight is said to be 196 pounds and he is an inch better than six feet tall. His shoulders are wide and his legs are sturdy but without superfluous flesh. That combination carries the promise of both jolting power and speed. It is said of him that he starts slow, and, after a talk, one may understand why. Likely enough he doesn't begin to fight until he has been ripped into hard enough to warm his blood. If the list of men he has fought does not carry conviction to American ears it still looks as though he is the best that Australia can produce. Only one Australian ever got a decision over him. That was on points and he won the return match by a knockout. He was born in Melbourne twenty-seven years ago on July 8.

"I began me fighting on the 'opal fields" said Lang. He carries the burr of the Australian accent, that differs from the cockney of London by a twist. He speaks slowly rather modestly, and with care to select just the right word.

"I was a big young fellow, and pretty good at football. I always liked to box but I had no thought of making it a business. I just got into it you know."

His christened name was Lan Dranchi.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
