CRIPPEN AND HIS PARTY
NOW ON WAY TO ENGLAND

Great Secrecy was Attempted by the English Detectives in an Endeavour to Get Their Prisoners Out of the Country Unawares to the Public—Crippen was Nonchalant as Ever, But the Girl was Agitated.

Quebec, Aug. 20.—Dr. Harvey Hawley Crippen, accompanied by his stenographer-wife, Ethel Clara Le Neve, will sail for England on the steamer Megantic, to stand trial in London charged with the murder of Belle Elmore, his wife, whose mutilated remains are supposed to be those dug up in the cellar of the Crippen's London home.

The last chapter in Canada of one of the most sensational murder cases of recent years opened this morning, when at 7 o'clock, Dr. Crippen and Miss Le Neve were brought out of the provincial jail where for nearly three weeks they have been confined and taken, in charge of the Scotland Yard officers, to Cap Rouge. Inspector Dew and Detective Mitchell, of the great English police organization, are in charge of Dr. Crippen and two matrons from London will look after the Le Neve girl on the trip back across the Atlantic.

The departure from the jail this morning was accomplished quietly. After the many false alarms of the past few days, when it was many times rumored that the noted prisoners were about to be taken through the streets of the ancient capital on the first lap of their return journey, there were but few people about when in the chilly hours of this morning the pair were taken from the big stone building on the edge of the Plains of Abraham, hurried into the waiting cabs, and conveyed away.

Dr. Crippen wore the same cool and unconcerned air which has characterized him ever since he was placed in the jail while Miss Le Neve was nervous and looked pale and distraught.

It is the intention of the officers to board the Megantic at she passed down the river on her way to Liverpool.

GREAT SECRECY.

The departure of Inspector Dew

with his celebrated prisoners was marked by an extraordinary attempt at secrecy on the part of Dew, who chartered a special boat to catch the Laurentian, which sailed last night from Montreal. When the news spread that the start had been made, it was first reported that the couple were about to leave the prison to go to court, and crowds quickly gathered on the Heights of Abraham and along the water front. A force of police was detailed to disperse the crowds. They had difficulty in driving the curious away from St. Louis street, down which it was believed the prisoners would be brought.

The prisoners and the prison authorities were kept in ignorance of the preparations for their removal until little more than half an hour before the doctor and his companion were driven away. The most incomprehensible mystery was made of the whole affair.

The preparations of the latter for the trip did not take long for they had already breakfasted. They took time, however, before leaving the prison to express their gratitude for the manner in which they had been treated there.

Dr. Crippen made a presentation at the jail. He asked Governor Morin if he had any objection to accept a small book from him as an expression of his appreciation of the consideration shown him by the governor.

Crippen was not handcuffed, and Miss Le Neve went on board assisted by one of the two wardresses who held her arm.

ENGLISHMEN WHO
HAVE MADE GOOD

Statement by a Pioneer Worker Who Has Sent Hundreds to Canada

Montreal, August 19.—Mr. J. W. Clarke chairman of the Norwich District Committee, and honorary diocesan and layman of the diocese of Norwich, was a visitor yesterday at the Grand Trunk general offices. On this occasion Mr. Clarke has been in Canada for four months. He has visited Brantford, Peterboro and many other points in Ontario. In the West he visited Winnipeg, Humboldt, Vonda and other points.

Mr. Clarke's method is to settle his first people in Ontario and he sails for England with applications for farmers and farm laborers that will run into the hundreds in Ontario alone.

BATTLESHIP LAUNCHED

Portsmouth, Eng., Aug. 20.—The Orion, Great Britain's newest and greatest battleship was launched here today in the presence of King Alfonso and Queen Victoria of Spain and a distinguished gathering of naval officers and representatives from public life. Compared with the armored cruiser Lion of 26,350 tons just launched, the Orion will displace only 23,500 tons but her ten 13.5 inch guns and her new deadly equipment of torpedoes render her by far the most powerful battleship afloat.

The new torpedo to be carried by the Orion weighs nearly a ton and at a speed of forty knots. The Orion will have a speed of twenty-one knots and will carry 4,000 tons of fuel giving her an unusually wide radius of action.
