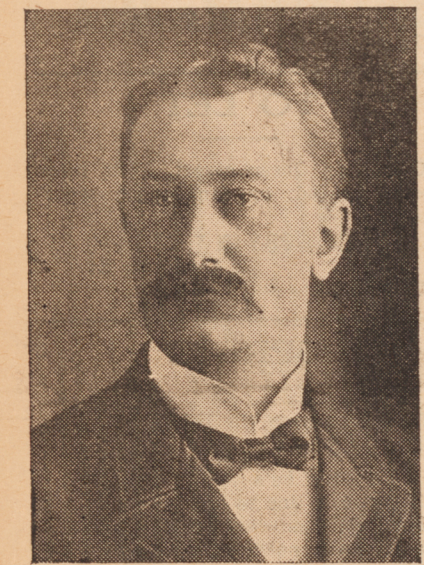
OPPOSITION MEMBERS EXPRESS CONFIDENCE IN THEIR LEADER

Hon. C. W. Robinson is
Waited on by His
Supporters in the
Legislature

AND PRESENTED WITH ADDRESS
AND CHEST OF SILVER

The Utmost Unanimity Prevails and Every
Confidence is Felt in the Future of
the Party.

Moncton, N. B., June 1.—An ar-
rangement made by the members of
the local opposition in the later days
of the session of the legislature at
Frederickton, to surprise their leader,
Hon. C. W. Robinson, at his home in
Moncton, and do honor to him as a
man and their leader, was carried
out this afternoon and evening, when
all of them, excepting Hon. McLe-
Billois and Dr. Sornany, who were
unexpectedly detained at home, ar-
rived by the noon train.

Messrs. Copp, Sweeney and Legere,
members for Westmorland, met the
members from St. John county, Car-
leton and Victoria, as well as those
from the North Shore counties, and
later in the afternoon all met with
Hon. Mr. Robinson in the board of
trade room.

After pleasant greetings there was
general discussion of party affairs,
and reports from all the counties
represented showed a feeling on the
part of the electorate that augurs
ill for the Hazen government when
they appeal to the electors.

Upon the invitation of Mr. Robin-
son, the party attended the concert
in the Methodist Church in the eve-
ning to hear the famous soprano,
Miss Wetmore, and afterwards were
entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Robin-
son at their beautiful home.

After supper, the real purpose of
the gathering was shown when the
following address was read to the
leader of the opposition and a very
handsome chest of silver was pre-
sented to him:

THE ADDRESS.

"To the Honorable C. W. Robinson,
B. A., M. P. P.:

"We, the Liberal members of the
local legislature of the Province of
New Brunswick, desire to tender you
on this occasion our most hearty,
loyal and united support.

"We recall today with feelings of
pride the fact that for many years
you have sat as a member of the
local house for the county of West-
morland, and for many years during
that period you have discharged with
dignity and ability the duties of the
high office of speaker, circumstances
which attest the esteem and respect
in which you are held both by your
constituents and your party.

"Though called to be premier of
this great province at a time when
the duties and responsibilities of of-
fice would have weighed heavily upon
older shoulders, you assumed and
bore them. Though the appeal of the
people that followed was adverse
nevertheless we believe that time

WILL ATTEMPT TO CROSS LAKE ONTARIO IN AN AEROPLANE

Most Ambitious Non-
Stop Flight Yet Pro-
posed Being 86 Miles
Over Water—Fast
Boats Will try to Keep
up With Him.

Rochester, N. Y., June 2—Dr. Wil-
liam Greene, a well known aviator,
who has recently moved to Rochester,
will attempt on June 21 to fly from
Rochester across Lake Ontario to
Toronto. Dr. Greene will use a bi-
plane of his own design and manu-
facture. As the crew flies it is
about 86 miles from Charlotte, the
port of Rochester, to Toronto, a dis-
tance over water never yet attempted
by any aeronaut.

Fast boats will relay across the
lake under the aviator in order to
be on hand in case of accident.

AMERICAN RAILROADS SERVED WITH INJUNCTION AGAINST INCREASED RATES

St. Louis Mo. June 2—Service in
the injunction suit for the govern-
ment against railroads to restrain
them from advancing freight rates
was obtained on officials of three of
the roads here today deputies from
the United States Marshall's office
served the order at the headquarters
of Missouri Pacific Wabash and Frisco
systems.

The announcement last night that
the defendants proposed a vigorous
contest of the restraining order
granted at Hannabel Mo., Tuesday,
though not unexpected, was taken
in shippers circles here to indicate
conclusively that the government had
caught them napping.

It was only after extended telegraphic
conferences yesterday that the
general conference of railroad counsel
to be held in Chicago tomorrow,
was agreed upon.

From information obtainable this
morning the old freight rates are in
effect at all points on the railroads
having general headquarters here.
None of the officials would permit
himself to be quoted on the question
of rates today.

\$750,000 DAMAGE DONE BY FIRE LAST NIGHT

INDIGNATION AGAINST ALMA KILLNERS' SLAYER GROWS FAST

Subscriptions Towards
Increasing Reward for
His Discovery Coming
in so Quickly, that
Amount will Reach
\$10,000.

Louisville, Ky., June 1—With the
contribution by the city council of
\$2,500 to the fund which will be of-
fered for the arrest and conviction
of the slayer of little Alma Kellner,
whose body was found in a cellar of
the St. John School, the reward has
now reached \$5,500. This will be
augmented probably today by an
offer by Governor Wilson of \$500 on
behalf of the State. Smaller sub-
scriptions of from \$5 to \$100 were
tendered today by citizens of Louis-
ville and it is expected that before
the end of the week, the amount will
reach \$10,000. Chief of Police Lind-
say says that he has received in-
formation that Joseph Wendling, the
missing janitor, remained in Louis-
ville as late as March 1.

MADRIZ FORCES MEET DEFEAT AFTER THREE DAYS BATTLE

Panama June 2—Salvador Cham-
orro, father of General Chamorro one
of the provisionals has received a
message from Bluefields dated May
30 stating that his son has defeated
the Madriz forces under Generals
Lara and Padilla after a battle which
lasted three days. The number of
casualties is not given but it is re-
ported that 300 prisoners were cap-
tured by Chamorro.

DECLINE IN STOCK MARKET PRICES STILL CRUMBLING

Many Margins Wiped Out by Recent Slump—C.
P. R. Holding Well—Today's Montreal Sales.

New York, N.Y., June 3—The stock
market today gave early evidence of
the continued disturbance felt on ac-
count of the federal government's
move against freight rate advances.
The reduction in the official discount
rate of the Bank of England caused
sharp advances in the London stock
market but the New York had very
little benefit from that.

After a spotty and unsettled open-
ing the whole market turned weak
and very large blocks were unloaded
upon the market. The first price of
St. Paul was at an advance of a
point over the closing price of yester-
day but it had fallen to 2½ below
yesterday in the course of half an
hour. This was more than a point
below the lowest price touched in
yesterday's slump. The decline else-
where was less violent and a quick rally
followed.

Lumber and Creosote
Plant With 125,000
Gallons Creosote
Burned

CAUSED BY EXPLOSION OF
TANK HOLDING 45,000 GALLONS

Plant Was Burnt Out About Six Months
Ago, and Had Only Recently Been Re-
constructed.

Texas, Ark., June 2.—The plant of
the International Lumber and Creosote
Co., together with 125,000 gal-
lons of creosote, 25 carloads of creosote
on the cross ties and a large
quantity of raw material, was de-
stroyed by fire last night. The loss
is \$750,000. The fire originated with
an explosion in a tank containing
45,000 gallons of creosote, finally
burning itself out. The plant was re-
cently re-constructed. It was almost
burned by fire about six months
ago.

PREMATURE EXPLOSION KILLS THREE MEN AND INJURES THREE MORE

Allantown Pa June 2—In a prema-
ture explosion of a blast in a stone
quarrie of Lehigh Portland Cement
Co., at West Copley Pa, three men
were instantly killed and three others
seriously injured. Three men are miss-
ing and it is feared they are buried
under the mass of rock.
