## DR. TORREY STILL DRAWS BIG CROWDS

He Scores the So-called Saving Grace of Christian Scientists Which He Calls "Buddhistic Philosophy."

Last night's meeting at the Tabernacle was one of the most powerful services since the campaign opened. For a time the ranks seemed to waver, but presently a break came and then a large number came to the front to be dealt with by the corps of workers which Dr. Torrey has gathered about him.

Dr. Torrey has made a happy selection of helpers. Mr. Jacoby has had a large experience in dealing with men and women and knows how to bring them to an intelligent decision. Miss Parker and Miss Anderson are also invaluable helpers and seldom come to the rink without seeking out those who are helped into a better life.

Mr. Butler again sang with fine spirit and expression. One feels the sympathetic soul of the man in every song he sings.

The sermon was in part as follows: WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

The text from which Dr. Torrey preached his sermon last night was the same as that used the night before. After briefly summarizing the points made in the first sermon, he told how Pontius Pilate had tried to get around coming to a definite decision as to the disposition of Christ just as men are doing today. But he could not, and it can't be done now.

You must accept Christ, or you must reject Him. There is no middle ground. Right living will not do. It is just as easy and just as certain for a moral man to be lost as one who spends his life in open violation of all the laws of God and man.

We must confess Him or deny Him. Unless we confess Him on earth He will deny us in that last day.

You must let Him into your hearts or shut Him out. He is knocking at the door—will you deny him entrance?

We must be for Him or against Him. Either stand with John and the other disciples, or with Pilate and Judas Iscariot.

There is no chance to dodge a definite decision as to every one of these propositions—and it must be done now.

Christ is the Son of God, and the divinely appointed King for the whole world. Every man and woman who denies Christ stands charged with high treason, and the punishment for treason under all laws is death.

"Lord, Jesus, I hand in my allegiance; I give up my treason; I take Thee as my King." That is the only way to do, and it ought to be done now, without a moment's delay.

The denial of the existence of such a place as Hell by the Universalist does not make it any less true that there is a Hell, and it will not lessen the suffering of those who go there to expiate their sins.

Men deny Christ's Kingship, but it does not alter a fact for men to deny that fact, but it does make you guilty of robbing Him of His due.

There are some people who deny everything—sin, death, pain and everything else—say it is only mortal thought, and they call themselves Christian Scientists. This is nothing in the world but Buddhistic philosophy and infernal nonsense, taught by Mrs. Mary Baker Patterson Glover Eddy, the many times married woman who does not believe in marriage.

There is nothing Christian or scientific about it.

Right here Dr. Torrey said he regretted that it was sometimes necessary to ridicule such nonsensical propositions as this Christian Science, but it was the best way to do about it.

He closed his sermon with the most impassioned plea to men and women to accept Christ that he has made yet, and a number responded to his invitation.

It is not possible to estimate even approximately the material good that will result from yesterday's meetings over the city, and more especially that of last night. The workers in the meetings are not satisfied, but it is the unsatisfied feeling of men who are seeking to save souls, and in no wise a dissatisfaction with the measure of good that has come to the city from one day's work.
