NEW D. C. L.'S.

Globe: His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown, who received the degree of D. C. L. at Sackville May 10, was admitted an attorney Oct. 24, 1884, and was called to the bar a year later. He was appointed to the Supreme Court bench over a year ago. Mr. A. P. Barnhill, who received the same degree, was admitted attorney in 1888, and was called to the bar in 1889. Mr. Barnhill has for some time been engaged in very important work as a commissioner in connection with the waterways between New Brunswick and the State of Maine.

ALUMNI GOLD MEDAL WAS NOT AWARDED

Examiners Decide Against Giving Usual Prize for Latin Composition—New Officers Elected Last Night.

The Associated Alumni of the University of New Brunswick met 7th semi-annual session in the library of the Normal School last night, President; J. T. Jennings, Fredericton. There was a large attendance.

The report of the examiners of the Latin essays, written in the alumni gold medal competition, was received and after discussion, adopted. The report was to the effect that four essays had been received. It was recommended that the medal be not awarded this year.

It was decided that the faculty, subject to the approval of the president and secretary of the Alumni Society, decide to what students the scholarships presented by Judge Wetmore, of Saskatchewan, shall be awarded. A resolution of thanks to Judge Wetmore was passed. E. A. McKay, P. J. Hughes, B. C. Foster, J. D. Phinney and H. V. B. Bridges were appointed a committee on revision and consolidation of the bye-laws.

OFFICERS.

The following officers were elected: Dr. W. C. Crockett, Fredericton, President; J. T. Jennings, Fredericton, A. B. Maggs, Sussex, J. W. McCready, Fredericton, vice-presidents; H. V. B. Bridges, secretary-treasurer; S. A. McLeod, Sussex, Hon. J. D. Hazen, St. John, W. H. Harrison, St. John, A. S. McFarlane, Fredericton, C. W. Hall, Fredericton, Dr. H. S. Bridges, St. John, B. C. Foster, Fredericton, members of the council.

The society's representatives to the Senate elected were: Dr. J. V. Ellis, St. John, and J. D. Phinney, Fredericton.

SPECIAL PRIZE.

The recommendation that the Brydson-Jack Memorial Scholarship be awarded C. Perley Steeves was adopted. W. H. Hoyt, who was a close second in the competition for the scholarship, was awarded a special prize of twenty dollars, donated by Hon. J. D. Hazen.

On motion, it was decided that it be recommended to the Senate that honorary degrees be given Mr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Normal School, and Chief Superintendent Carter.

Last evening the Alumni Society met at the College. The meeting was rather informal, being the first since the organization. Refreshments were served at the close.

DR. ALLISON ASKS TO BE RELIEVED OF PRESIDENCY

Sackville, N. B., June 2.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the board of Regents of Mount Allison College yesterday, Dr. David Allison gave notice of the desire to be relieved of the duties of president of the University as soon as the board could fill the vacancy, or not later than the end of ensuing collegiate year. Old Lingley Hall, which was moved from its site last year to make room for a brick wing to the ladies' college, will be sold, the condition being that it was not to be used by the purchaser for any unseemly or improper purpose. A resolution of the Alumni Society, urging the board to inaugurate a forward movement for \$200,000 to add to the endowment fund, received unanimous approval. The appointment of a man to undertake this movement was with the executive. The new brick wing to the ladies college was officially named Jarius Hart Hall. It was decided to hold a special meeting of the board soon to take into consideration the question of a successor to Dr. Allison. A resolution congratulating Dr. Evans of Hampton, chairman of the board, on fifty years in the Methodist ministry, was passed. Dr. Borden reported that Mrs. Ryan and C. W. Fawcett had intimated their intention to pay the entire cost of the Charles Fawcett Memorial Hall, and in addition, the cost of the electric light fixtures and heating plant. The original offer was about \$6,000 towards the new hall. As a matter of fact, the gift will amount to twice that sum.

RACING PROGRAMME ALTERED LAST NIGHT

Another Race Added to Mid-summer Meet and Changes for Better Events Made.

At a meeting of the directors of the Fredericton Park Association last evening the programme for the races to be held here on June 30th and July 1st was altered to a considerable extent and the number of races was increased from five to six. The alterations will meet with the general approval of horsemen. The total amount of the purses will be \$1800. Three races will run off on June 30th and three on July 1st. The programme now is as follows:

THURSDAY, JUNE 30TH.

Free-for-all trot and pace, Class Purse \$300 2:21 pace and 2:18 trot class purse \$300, 2:30 Pace class purse \$300.

FRIDAY, JULY 1ST.

2:18 pace and 2:15 trot, class purse \$300. 2:25 pace and 2:22 trot, class purse \$300. 2:30 trot, class purse \$300.

The conditions to govern the races and entries will be as announced. Entries will close with the secretary J. D. Black on Monday, June 20th.

In the mixed classes the trotters will have an advantage of three seconds.

HONORARY DEGREES FOR LOCAL EDUCATIONALISTS

Principal Bridges and Chief Superintendent Carter Given Degree of L. L. D.—Prof. Salaries' Increased.

The senate of the university of New Brunswick is regular session this morning decided to confer on Mr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Normal School and Mr. W. S. Carter, the Chief Superintendent of Education, the honorary degree of Doctors of Laws at today's encoenia. The conferring of these degrees had been recommended by the alumni society. Those present at the senate meeting were Chief Superintendent Carter Judge Barry, Wm. Parke, Wm. M. McLean, Dr. Thos. Walker, Dr. H. S. Bridges, Judge McLeod, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Hon. J. V. Ellis, Hon. George F. Hill, Prof. W. T. Raymond B.C. Foster and Registrar Havelock Coy.

SALARIES RAISED.

It was decided to increase the salaries of Prof. Day and Prof. Stephens \$100 per year making that of the first \$1300 and of the second \$1200.

ACADEMIC YEAR

It was also decided to authorize a change in the academic year making it possible if necessary to begin the year earlier in the fall and end earlier in the spring.

GYMNASIUM COMMITTEE

A committee was appointed to look into the matter of heating the gymnasium by hot water.

It was also decided to pay the professors' salaries by the month after the beginning of the next academic year.
