CITY COUNCIL FAVORS
EXTENSION OF WATER SYSTEM

Report of Water Committee Recommended Making of All Preparations, for Laying of Main to Bailey's Bridge--Market By-Law Remains Unchanged But Provisions Will be Enforced.

The City Council last evening adopted the report of the Water Committee, which recommended that the prayer of the petition of residents of Woodstock Road that the water, sewerage, fire and light limits be extended to Bailey's Bridge, be granted. The report also recommended that every preparation be made for the extension of the water service from Odell Avenue to Bailey's Bridge in the spring.

With regard to the Market Bylaw, which the grocers and butchers desired to have amended so as to prohibit house-to-house sale of country produce, at any time, practically nothing was done, but it is likely that in the near future a new bylaw will be drafted. The report of the Administration of Justice Committee on the matter, stated that the change proposed by the grocers and butchers was too drastic.

All members of the City Council, with the exception of Ald. Walker, were present, that alderman being confined to his home by illness. The meeting was a record one for brevity, the business being transacted in little more than an hour.

The customary salary vote was passed.

MUNICIPAL HOME.

Ald. Jewett, on behalf of the Municipal Home Committee, reported a balance of \$24.42 on hand, and moved that a cheque for \$150.00 in favor of Commissioner Boone issue. The motion was carried.

APPEALS REPORT.

Ald. Calder, on behalf of the Appeals Committee, reported that the petitions of John Hughes and Robert McMurtrie, for relief of poll-tax on account of old age, had been received, but that the medical certificates required by law had not accompanied the petitions, and they could not be considered. He also reported that the Committee had not seen fit to grant the petition of A. Murray & Co. for reduced valuation on stock. The report was adopted.

WATER EXTENSION.

On behalf of the Water Committee, Ald. VanWart reported that the petition of the residents of Woodstock Road for the extension of the water, sewerage, fire and light limits to Bailey's Bridge, and the extension of the water service to that place, made this fall, had been considered. The Committee recommended that the extension of the limits be made, and that all preparation be completed so as to permit of the extension of the water service as early in the spring as possible.

Ald. VanWart said that at present 1,165 feet of 4-inch main was laid on Woodstock Road, between Smythe Street and Odell Avenue. The distance from Odell Avenue to Bailey's Bridge was 4,050, and the total distance from Smythe Street to Bailey's Bridge was about a mile.

THE ESTIMATES.

The report of the Water Committee contained estimates for 8-inch, 10-inch, and 12-inch pipe, if laid from Smythe Street to Bailey's Bridge, and if laid from Odell Avenue to Bailey's Bridge. The estimates are as follows:

ODELL AVENUE TO BAILEY'S BRIDGE.

8-inch pipe,	\$ 6,400

SMYTHE STREET TO BAILEY'S BRIDGE.

The alderman explained that the pipe had to be obtained from Scotland and that three weeks was the

shortest time in which it could be brought here. It would be impossible to excavate and lay the pipe during the present year except at a much increased cost.

The report, which also contained the recommendation that a new boiler be obtained for the pumping station, was adopted.

MARKET BYLAW.

On behalf of the Administration of Justice, Ald. Osborne reported concerning the petition of the grocers and butchers that the house-to-house sale of produce be prohibited. The report contained the statements that it was inadvisable to alter the existing market bylaw, that the proposed alteration would prevent farmers from going even to shops to arrange for the sale of produce to local dealers and that the provisions of the existing market bylaw were not satisfactory. The report also contained the announcement that the police would be instructed to enforce the bylaw prohibiting house-to-house sale before the hour of 11 a. m.

Ald. Hooper thought some recommendation should be made by the Committee.

Ald. Calder said that the present law was not satisfactory, but could hardly be amended at present. However, a new market bylaw would be prepared and might be submitted at the next meeting of the Council.

TENDERS FOR ROCK.

On behalf of the Road Committee, Ald. Mitchell reported that several tenders for supplying trap-rock had been received. The price was 75 cents per ton. He moved that the Road Master be instructed to arrange the contracts for trap-rock. Carried.

Ald. Mitchell seconded by Ald. Hooper, moved that the petition of T. Bertrand Atherton for leave to sub-let a portion of the land leased by him from the city, to A. H. VanWart for warehouse purposes, be granted. Carried.

Ald. Clark moved that a cheque for \$10.50 issue for pay for special police. Carried.

Mr. S. B. Hatheway, on behalf of the Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association, asked that the city, as usual, furnish suitable buildings for the annual convention of the Association and the exhibition and judging of stock.

It was decided to grant the Association the use of the Opera House for meetings and to leave the matter of securing a suitable building for the exhibition and judging of stock to a special committee, composed of Ald. Harrison, Ald. Hooper and Ald. Osborne.

TAX COLLECTIONS DISCUSSED.

Ald. Harrison called attention to the fact that tax collections in October, 1910, were less than those of the corresponding month of 1909. He asked for some explanation, as the city should not be allowed to go back as far as tax collections were concerned. If the present collector were not doing the work, the city should employ another man, at a suitable salary.

Ald. Hooper thought Mr. Rutter should be given a fair show. He was severely handicapped, as the departure of Mr. VanWart had left things much disorganized.

Ald. Calder was of a similar opinion. Mr. Rutter, he said, would do better in the future.

Ald. Harrison said he had every desire to give Mr. Rutter a fair show, and had favored his appointment.

His Worship Mayor Thomas stated that the present collector had had some hard nuts to crack in the way of collections but had done very well.

Ald. Mitchell spoke along similar lines.

Ald. Clark asked what had been done concerning the enforcement of the bylaw for the licensing and regulation of places of amusement, particularly moving picture shows. The time for enforcing that bylaw had come.

The minutes, when read, showed that reconsideration of the bylaw had been referred to the committee of the whole council.

His Worship said he would arrange for a meeting to consider the bylaw.

GOVERNMENT TO
DEAL GENEROUSLY
WITH CAMPBELLTON

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—It is understood the government will shortly deal with Campbellton's application for aid. Campbellton asked for the government to undertake for a number of years the payment of interest on some \$200,000 of municipal debt.

It is understood that the dominion government is willing to extend aid, in view of the unusual nature of the catastrophe, but prefers to do so finally this year.

Therefore instead of assuming the interest on the municipal debt for a number of years, the government will ask parliament to vote a lump sum for the relief of Campbellton. Probably \$80,000 will be the figure.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—R. L. Borden, Conservative leader, looking the picture of health, after three weeks' sojourn at Hot Springs, Virginia, returned to Ottawa today accompanied by Mrs. Borden. He was asked for a statement with reference to the by-election in Drummond and Athabaska, but was reticent. "I have just returned and know nothing of the situation," he said, "consequently, I have no opinion to express."

To a query as to how he would advise Conservatives to vote, Mr. Borden answered, "I can only advise the electors to vote according to the dictates of their conscientious convictions."

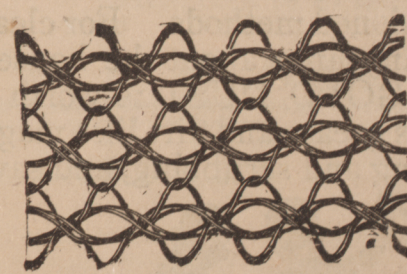
