TWO DIVORCE
CASES BEFORE
THE COURT TODAY

Four Witnesses in Robinson Case Heard this Morning--Bryson Case is Off.

The October sittings of the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes adjourned from Tuesday last, reopened before Judge McKeown this morning. The case of Robinson vs. Robinson was begun this morning, four witnesses being examined. The case was resumed at 2.30 this afternoon. At three o'clock the case of Smith vs. Smith was taken up. The case of Bryson vs. Bryson is off, papers not having been served.

ROBINSON VS. ROBINSON

Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff in the case of Robinson vs. Robinson and read the libel which set out that the plaintiff before the marriage resided in St. John and the defendant in Marysville, being an employee of the Canada Eastern Railway. The parties were married at St. John in 1903 by the Rev. Howard Sprague, and removed to Marysville. In April, 1904, the defendant left his wife and went to Upper Canada and she returned to her parents in St. John, with whom she has since resided. The action is brought on the ground of infidelity.

The plaintiff, Ida May Robinson, who is suing for divorce from Frank Leveritt Robinson, was the first witness, she told of her marriage with the defendant, of her married life, and of the conduct of the defendant on account of which she asks for divorce.

Chief of Police Hawthorn and Mr. and Mrs. George Harris, gave testimony corroborating that of the plaintiff.

Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C. of this city appeared for the defendant. He informed the court that he had received no instructions from his client and that consequently his course of action must be based on circumstances.

Mr. O. H. Warwick, of St. John, father of the plaintiff and Mrs. Geo. Warwick of the same city are in the city.

SMITH VS. SMITH

The case of Herbert Edward Smith vs. Alice Maud Smith, was taken up this afternoon. Mr. R. B. Hanson appeared for the plaintiff. The plaintiff resides at Johnston, Queens Co., and the defendant (formerly Deness), at Fredericton. They were married in Middlesex, England, in 1883, by the Rev. L. U. Lee, and came to New Brunswick in 1907. In July of this year the defendant left her home and came to this city, where she has since resided. The plaintiff sues for divorce on the ground of infidelity, one Walter Kincaid being named as co-respondent. Two children were the result of the marriage. Slipp & Hanson are proctors for the plaintiff.

... DECREE GRANTED.

At the end of the trial in the case of Robinson vs. Robinson, Judge McKeown delivered judgment, granting decree without costs or alimony with the consent of Mr. Powell, counsel for the plaintiff. His Honor decided that the allegations of the libel were proved.

PRIZES FOR CIVIC
ELECTION AWARDED

The award of the judges of the civic prize essay competition was announced by Ald. Clark at last night's meeting of the City Council. The prize-winners and the prizes were as follows:—

1st. Prof. Frank P. Day, thirty dollars. 2nd, Miss E. B. Hunter, fifteen dollars. 3rd, Prof. R. B. Miller, five dollars.

The subject dealt with was "Fredericton, its advantages as a residential city."

Eight essays were received in the competition. Some of the writers evidently misunderstood the intention of the competition and the object at which the city aimed in offering the prizes. Some of the efforts although excellent as literary productions were of little value as advertising literature.

The essays of Prof. Day and Prof. Miller were illustrated the former with sketches of public buildings the latter with photographs of manufacturing plants, public buildings, riverscapes etc. Prof. Miller in his essay featured lumbering and its associated industries.

It has been proposed that the winning essay be printed upon the margin of the map of the city and neighboring villages which is being prepared for advertising purposes.

At last night's meeting of the City Council Ald. Osborne expressed the hope that some use would be made of the essays. The committee which made arrangements for the competition was empowered to arrange for further use of the essays by publication.

PROSPECTIVE NAVAL
CADETS WILL BE
EXAMINED HERE

Examinations Will Begin on Tuesday And Will Continue For Three Days.

Examinations for candidates for entrance to the Canadian Naval College at Halifax will begin here on November 8th, next Tuesday, and will continue for three days. Nothing is yet known concerning the place where the examination can be held or who will conduct them but it is expected that someone will be sent here to make arrangements.

Victor Hatheway son of Mr. S. W. Hatheway of Springhill is the only candidate from this section of the province. There is another from Newcastle however.

To date sixty-two boys have signified their intention of writing the examinations at various points in the Dominion. The age limit has been raised one year and boys not over seventeen can write the papers.

LIVELY RUNAWAY.

A horse belonging to Mr. T. V. Monahan attached to a sloop, caused some excitement yesterday afternoon by running away. The animal collided with the carriage of Roadmaster McKay, and with that belonging to Rev. Father Carney in which a lady was sitting. SLEEPING CAR
BERTHS MAY BE
SECURED HERE

Efforts of Board of Trade Have Caused C. P. R. to Permit Local Agent to Allot Berths.

The Transportation Committee of the Board of Trade after some time spent in unceasing effort, has obtained from the C. P. R. the privilege of obtaining sleeping car berths in this city instead of wiring to St. John for them. On and after Monday, November 7th, the local ticket agent of the C. P. R., Mr. F. B. Edgcombe, will be able to allot berths on the St. John—Montreal train and the St. John—Boston train. Sections 9 and 10 on the first named train, and sections 3 and 4 on the second train will be reserved for Fredericton people. Berths must be secured before 11 a. m., however. A diagram will be available at the office of the agent.

At the present time berths have to be secured by local people through the St. John ticket office. With the cost of telegraphing to St. John, must be considered the chance of being unable to secure a berth the day it is wanted. Under the new system, this difficulty and inconvenience can be avoided.

The Board of Trade has been criticized in certain quarters because of inability to secure certain advantages for Fredericton. In the present instance, however, the persistent effort of the Transportation Committee has brought results. The ultimate aim of the committee is to secure a sleeping car service for Fredericton, as under the present system and that to be followed after next Monday travellers must travel to Fredericton Junction by day coach.

RECEPTION AND DANCE.

The U. N. B. students have made arrangements to give a reception and dance in honor of the Acadia football team, which will play here on Monday next. It is not yet known, however, whether the Acadia team will be in Fredericton Monday night, the time set for the reception.

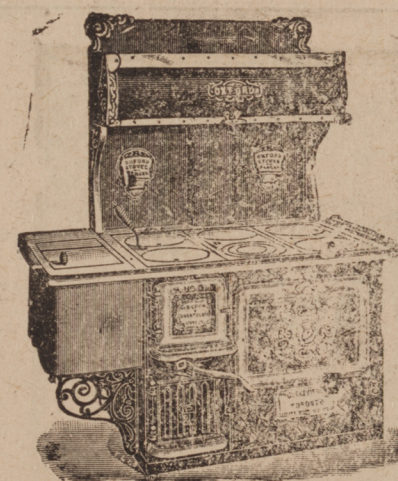
