## NEW REGULATIONS REGARDING LOBSTERS

St. John and Charlotte Counties to have Special Treatment--Regulations to be More Strictly Enforced.

Ottawa, April 24.—The recommendations of Commander Wakeham for the shortening of the lobster fishing season has been rejected by the fisheries committee of the Commons, on the ground that it would seriously disturb the industry.

A very radical recommendation is made that all along the coast except in the Counties of St. John and Charlotte, New Brunswick, the size limit be abolished. In St. John and Charlotte the limit will be ten and a half inches.

It was recommended that in 1911 new trap regulations be enforced that would prevent too many small lobsters being taken. It was recommended that the slats of traps be not less than an inch and a quarter apart and the mesh of the net at either end be not less than three and a half inches.

## COTTON FIRMS WILL ACT TOGETHER

Liverpool, April 25.—Pending the receipt of views of their representatives now at Decatur, Ala., in connection with the affairs of the suspended firm of Knight, Yancey & Company, the local firms affected by the suspension have decided to pool all of their cotton arriving against bank acceptance in the interests of all concerned. The local feeling is more hopeful today.

New Orleans La., April 25.—Accompanied by attorneys, New Orleans representatives of cotton firms and steamship lines which may have been involved in losses following the failure of the cotton firm of Knight, Yancey & Co., left today for Decatur, Ala. to attend a meeting of creditors of the bankrupt concern.

## PIANO AGENT GETS 2 YEARS

Brockville, April 25.—G. L. Riches, who a week ago pleaded guilty to embezzlement from a Woodstock piano firm for whom he had been local agent, will go to Kingston penitentiary for two years. Riches' offence was in selling a number of pianos and telling the firm they were out on rental.

## TO SCALE MT. MCKINLEY

Portland, Ore., April 25.—An expedition promoted jointly by a newspaper of this city, and another of New York City, left Portland today to scale Mount McKinley, Alaska. The party will embark for Alaska on the revenue cutter Tacoma from Seattle on Wednesday. The expedition is for the purpose of determining whether the mountain has been scaled, as it is claimed, by Dr. F.A. Cook, and the Lloyd party.

Centralia, Mo., April 25.—Fire has destroyed twelve places of business including of the largest dry goods and clothing houses with a loss estimated at more than \$100,000.


