trust, if one likes that word the better—has proven itself. It has become as nearly popular as such a corporation might ever hope to become. It has almost proved that the inevitable concentration of a great business can be accomplished without danger to public welfare.

United States Steel and its many great plants will be one of the greatest of exhibits to the coming visitors from over seas. Judge Gary, the chairman of its Board, who is also president of the American Iron and Steel Institute, delivered the address of welcome to the members at the meeting on Friday morning, October 14, in the myrtle room of the Waldorf-Astoria. Four papers were presented to the meeting—one by Mr. James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel Products Company, on "Foreign Relations;" another by Mr. William B. Dickson, of the United States Steel Corporation, on "Betterment of Labor Conditions;" a third by Mr. Willis L. King, of Jones & McLaughlin, Pittsburgh, and a fourth by Mr. Charles Kirchhoff on "The International Metallurgical Congress at Dusseldorf."

Prominent among the guests of the Institute will be Colonel Sir Charles Allen, a nephew of Sir Henry Bessemer, and president of Henry Bessemer & Co., of Sheffield. Colonel Allen comes, however, as a director, and representing Ebbw Vale Steel, Iron and Coal Company, of Ebbw Vale, Monmouth, England. Another distinguished English guest will be Mr. Arthur Keen, of Guest, Keen & Nettlefold, who are, perhaps, the largest steel makers of Great Britain. Mr. Keen is vice chairman of the London City and Midland Bank.

DINNERS AND INSPECTIONS.

Members and their guests will dine in the evening in the Astor Gallery of the Waldorf. Immediately after the banquet an exhibition of moving pictures of the Gary plant of the Steel Corporation, illustrating the process of manufacture from ore to finished product, will be given. The pictures will be explained by Mr. G. G. Thorp, vice president of the Indiana Steel Company, which operates the plant.

On the following day the institute

will make an inspection tour of New York Harbor. The members will assemble on board the steamer Observation at Pier 83 North River, at the foot of Forty-second Street, for their all-day excursion. They will visit the large railroad terminals and some of the industrial plants that cluster about the harbor front.

The real inspection trip—that of the United States in the very zenith of her steel age—will begin on Sunday evening. A special train of the New York Central Railroad will take the party to Buffalo by night. In Buffalo there will be an inspection of the great modern plant of the Lackawanna Steel Company, together with a side trip to Niagara Falls. The delegates will travel by night again, leaving Buffalo Monday evening. They will go straight to Chicago and will give Tuesday and Wednesday to an inspection of the steel plants that cluster about that smoky industrial centre, with a most important side trip to Gary, the chief exhibit of the Steel Corporation.

An all night's ride, beginning Wednesday evening, will bring the party to Pittsburgh, the very heart and core of the steel business on this continent. The party will remain there two days, and elaborate plans are being made by the Pennsylvania ironmasters for its reception and entertainment. The members will go from Pittsburgh direct to Washington, where they will be received on Saturday morning by President Taft. The return to New York will be made Saturday afternoon.

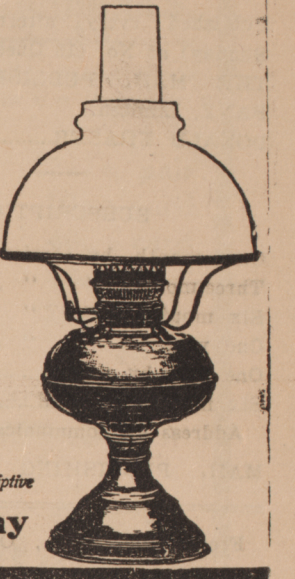

STEAMSHIP OLYMPIC RECORD BREAKER IN SIZE

Belfast, Ireland, Oct. 20.—The first of the two mammoth white star liners The Olympic was launched today amid scenes of much enthusiasm. In accordance with the customs of the White Star line there was no christening ceremony.

The newest vessel is of 45,000 tons. She has been building for twenty-two months and it will be eight months before she will probably be ready for her trial trip. The Olympic is a triple screw steamer, principal dimensions being length over 882½, breadth over all 92½ feet, height from bottom of keel to captain's house 103½ feet. She exceeds by nearly 100 feet in length and by 1,000 tons any other ship afloat.

The Olympic will accommodate 3,500 passengers and a crew of 360. She has eleven steel docks and fifteen water tight bulkheads.

A sister vessel the Titanic is building and will be launched soon.
