STRATHCONA TRUST COMMITTEE OF PROVINCE IN SESSION HERE

Deciding on Method of Distribution of
Portion of Fund Allotted to New
Brunswick.

A meeting of the provincial com-
mittee of the Strathcona Fund is be-
ing held this afternoon in the office
of the Chief Superintendent of Edu-
cation for the purpose of making ar-
rangements for the distribution of
that portion of the Strathcona Trust
Fund allotted to New Brunswick.
That fund amounts to about seven
hundred dollars per year. Half of
that amount is to be awarded as
prizes for military drill and half as
prizes for physical training in the
schools of the province.

Col. Humphrey, D. O. C., arrived
in the city this morning and is pre-
siding at the meeting of the commit-
tee. The Chief Superintendent of Edu-
cation is a member of the commit-
tee. The military members are Lt. Col.
Sturdee of St. John, Major Anderson
of Moncton, and Capt. F. A. Good of this city. The
civilian members are Principal B. C.
Foster of the High School, Dr. H.
V. B. Bridges, and Dr. Phillip Cox.
Some of the military members of the
committee are not in the city. Capt.
A. H. Borden, superintendent of phys-
ical training in the schools of the
Maritime Provinces, is attending the
meeting in an advisory capacity.

The Strathcona Trust will no
doubt, have the effect of increasing
the number of cadet corps in New
Brunswick, as well as increasing the
liking for military and physical train-
ing on the part of both pupils and
teachers.

The awarding of the prizes for mil-
itary training will be in the hands of
the military members of the commit-
tee. The school inspectors of the
province will award the other prizes.

made a good start on the removal
of the second pier.

The funeral will take place at 2 p.
m. Saturday. Rev. Mr. Foster will
conduct the service. Interment will
be made in the Baptist Cemetery,
Marysville.

DIED IN HOSPITAL
The death of Robert Gorman took
place at Victoria Hospital, yesterday.
Death was caused by cancer. The de-
ceased was fifty-eight years of age
and was born in Birdton. He is sur-
vived by a widow, seven sons and two
daughters. The remains were taken to
Birdton by rail this morning. The
funeral will be held Sunday afternoon.
Rev. W. R. Pepper conducting the
service.

**REV. T. ALBERT MOORE
TO BE HERE SUNDAY**

Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore the ener-
getic and efficient secretary of the
Lords Day Alliance of Canada will
speak in the Methodist Church next
Sunday evening.

Dr. Moore has for years been sec-
retary of that powerful organization
"The Lords Day Alliance," and no
man in Canada has done so much
towards making the Lords Day Act
operative and a powerful instrument
in securing Sabbath observance and
in securing a day of rest for toiling
thousands who otherwise would be
compelled to labor seven days in the
week.

Dr. Moore recently felt compelled
to resign the secretaryship of the
alliance, as the Methodist General
Conference recently held in Victoria,
B. C. elected him to succeed Dr.
Chown, as secretary of Temperance
and Moral Reform in connection
with the Methodist Church in Can-
ada.

Dr. Moore will speak in Marysville
in the morning.

MUNICIPAL UNION WILL MEET AT NEWCASTLE IN 1911

Delegates Returning to City From
Woodstock Had to Transfer on
Account of Run-off.

The Fredericton delegation which
attended the fifth annual convention
of the Union of New Brunswick Mun-
icipalities at Woodstock has returned.
The delegation included Mayor
Thomas, Ald. VanWart, Ald. Weddall
and City Clerk McCready. The jour-
ney to Fredericton via the Gibson
Branch, was interrupted at Zealand
on account of a run-off which had
torn the track up for some distance
and made it necessary to transfer
passengers over the break, which oc-
curred yesterday.

Dr. Sterling of Stanley, the new
president of the Union, and Mayor
Murray and Ald. McDonald of Camp-
bellton, arrived from Woodstock this
morning. The general opinion of the
delegates was that the convention
was one of the most successful ever
held by the Union.

NEWCASTLE NEXT YEAR
Next year the convention will be
held in Newcastle. Mayor Thomas in
his address to the convention ex-
tended an invitation to meet in Fre-
dericton, but as the convention was
held here some years ago it was
thought best by the executive to
make Newcastle the place of the next
meeting.

The matter of auto legislation
which was expected to cause consid-
erable discussion, was not touched
upon at the convention.

REMAINS BROUGHT HERE.
The body of the infant child of
Mr. George Burden, of Montreal, the
well-known baseball player, formerly
of this city, will arrive here from
Brewer, Me., by C. P. R. tonight. Mr.
Burden will accompany the body. It
is expected that the funeral will take
place tomorrow. The child died at
Brewer.

GERMAN SPORTSMEN GOT THEIR GAME IN MIRAMICHI WOODS

One Missed Good Chance For Caribou--
American Lady Very Successful--
Game Plentiful.

Major Von Estorff and Mr. Oscar
Widekind, both of Germany, returned
last evening from the Miramichi
woods, where they had been hunting
with George R. Jonah and Willis
White as guides. Major Von Estorff
got his moose, but Mr. Widekind was
able to kill only a deer. The two
German gentlemen were brought to
Fredericton by one of the Fredericton
Garage autos and left for New York
by C. P. R. last evening. They sail
from New York for Germany tomor-
row. Both were very well satisfied
with their first hunting trip to New
Brunswick.

The district in which the two Ger-
mans hunted was in the vicinity of
Miramichi Lake. Game was plentiful
but the two sportsmen had very hard
luck in their shooting. Major von
Estorff missed a very fine moose, but
succeeded in getting one a short time
afterward. Mr. Widekind had a
chance to kill a first-class caribou,
but although he fired six shots at the
animal failed to bring it down. Later
he tried a shot at two deer which
were standing near one another and
succeeded in bringing down the poorer
of the two.

making his seventh hunting trip to
New Brunswick, came out of the
woods this morning. He was hunt-
ing with Guide Wm. Griffin in the
vicinity of McKell Lake, and was
successful in getting his moose.

the Miramichi woods today, having
been in company with Mr. Brodhead.
Mr. Snyder, who is vice-president of
the Bethlehem Steel Company, shot a
caribou and a deer. Mrs. Snyder was
successful in getting a caribou.
