LOCAL GOVERNMENT MEETING AT ST. JOHN

(Telegraph)

A meeting of the provincial govern-
ment was held here last evening. Be-
yond receiving a report from the au-
ditor general on the conditions at
Campbellton, only business of a rou-
tine nature was transacted. Besides
the premier, who presided over the
meeting, Hon. J. K. Fleming, provin-
cial secretary; Hon. D. V. Landry,
commissioner of agriculture; Hon. W.
H. Grimmer, surveyor general; Hon.
H. F. McLeod, solicitor general; Hon.
John Morrissey, commissioner of pub-
lic works, and the Hon. Robert Max-
well were also present.

The report received from the audit-
or general was to the effect that a
careful investigation into the affairs
at Campbellton had been made and
everything found to be in excellent
condition. The money received there
in aid of the sufferers was being judi-
ciously spent.

Incorporation was granted to the
Fleming-Gibson Company, in Carle-
ton county, and several minor ap-
pointments were made.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said last night
that the matter of the city record-
ship, the appointment of which rests
formally in the hands of the provin-
cial government was not dealt with.

The provincial secretary and the
Hon. Mr. Landry had a conference
with Wm. Downie, superintendent for
the eastern division of the C.P.R.,
yesterday afternoon regarding in-
creased facilities in the way of an
extension of the frost proof ware-
house on the west side for the hand-
ling of potatoes. Mr. Downie prom-
ised the government officials that
steps would be taken at once to have
a warehouse fitted up adjoining the
one used last year.

Mr. Fleming said last evening that
the potato shipments to Havana
this year would be large. He expect-
ed they would be as large as last
year when conditions were exception-
al.

TOOK PART IN BYE ELECTION IN YORK AND QUEENS COUNTIES

The Political Contest of 1901 Recalled by Gov-
ernor Fraser's Death--The Guysboro Giant
Spoke at Joint Meeting at Opera House with Rev.
Dr. McLeod--Stumped for Mr. Blair in Queens in
1896.

The death of Hon. Duncan C. Fraser,
Lieutenant Governor of Nova
Scotia, recalls the active part he
took in a bye-election for the House
of Commons in York county during
the winter of 1901. The candidates on
that occasion were, Mr. Alex Gibson
jr. for the Liberals and Rev. Dr. Mc-
Leod for the Conservatives. Mr. Gib-
son the seat at the general election
held the year previous and resigned
as the result of a protest filed again
st him by his opponent. It is due to
the Rev. doctor to say that he put
up a great fight in the general elec-
tion and had he not acted on bad ad-
vice he would have remained out of
the protest business and reserved his
ammunition for the next dissolution
of parliament when his chances of win-
ning would have been much better
than they were in the bye-election.
Mr. O. S. Crockett was his legal ad-
viser and Mr. Crockett of course had
an eye to the future. He wanted to
lead Dr. McLeod to the edge of the
wharf and kick him overboard, the
bye-election for which he was respon-
sible, gave him the opportunity and
he took full advantage of it.

When the election was called on Mr.
Fraser then M. P. for Guysboro, came
to York upon the invitation of
local Liberals, and remained in the
county for ten days. He addressed
meetings at Fredericton, Marysville,
Stanley, Williamsburg, Gibson, Nash-
waak Village and Keswick Ridge.

His reputation as a hustings ora-
tor secured for him large audiences
and he handed out good sound Liber-
al doctrine, which made votes right
and left for the party standard bear-
er.

A JOINT MEETING

The greatest meeting of all was at
the opera house in this city when he
met the Conservative candidate.
Mr. Gibson spoke first and was fol-
lowed by Dr. McLeod who held the
floor for nearly an hour. The doctor
seemed full of confidence and actually
told the audience that he expected to
make some converts to his side be-
fore he concluded his remarks. For
once he seems to have misjudged the
situation for the Guysboro giant had
a monopoly of the convert making busi-
ness on that day.

Dr. McLeod is no mean opponent on
the public platform but he was as a

mere child in the hands of Mr.
Fraser. The latter was in his best
form and spoke for over an hour.
His address was singularly free from
bitterness, but he was none the less
effective on that account. His speech
was one of the greatest hustings deliv-
erances ever heard in Fredericton
and the Grits in the audience, who
had been accustomed to taking hard
knocks, in political contests nearly
went wild with joy. On the other
hand a feeling of sympathy for their
standard bearer was plainly depicted
on the faces of many Conservatives
in the audience.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, armed with blue
books and newspaper clippings, had
a seat on the platform as Dr. Mc-
Leod's second and was to have fol-
lowed Mr. Fraser, but he never got a
chance to open his mouth. Dr. Mc-
Leod filled in the gap himself but did
not help matters much. It was
market day and three hundred stal-
wart farmers heard Mr. Fraser
through, and then skiddooed for home.
When the doctor rose to reply all was
confusion and he did not get a very
satisfactory hearing.

Mr. Fraser closed the meeting with
a few witty passages which seemed to
put everybody in good humor.

Before he returned home, the Liber-
als of the County in appreciation of
his valuable services presented Mr.
Fraser with a beautiful silver can-
dleabra.

MR. BLAIR'S ELECTION

Mr. Fraser also took an active part
in the bye election in Queens and
Sunbury in 1896, when the late Hon.
A. G. Blair was offering for election
as Minister of Railways. He spoke at
several places and won many votes
for the Liberal candidate. On one oc-
casion he ran up against Mr. J. D.
Hazen in a joint meeting and divid-
ed the time with him. Those who
saw Mr. Hazen the next day, say
that he was suffering from "that tired
feeling" and it is not much wonder.

During this campaign Mr. Fraser
spoke at Gagetown on nomination
day along with Hon. George E. Foster
and Mr. Blair. A Nova Scotia
member of Parliament who was pres-
ent described it as "the hottest polit-
ical meeting he had ever seen in
his life."

CHOLERA SITUATION SAID TO BE IMPROVING

St. Petersburg Sept. 30.—The cholera
epidemic has taken a strong hold in
Azur province, Siberia, 26 cases with
12 deaths being reported from that
section during the week ending Sep-
tember 23. On the whole however, the
situation is improving. The totals
made up by the Sanitary Bureau
show 198,246 cases and 92,329 deaths
since the outbreak.

HON. CLIFFORD SIFTON'S SON SERIOUSLY HURT

Montreal, Sept. 30.—Lieut. Sifton,
son of Hon. Clifford Sifton, was in-
jured tonight at the horse show while
riding Flying Dutchman in the high
jumping competition. He was thrown
violently forward and is thought to
have sustained severe internal inju-
ries. He was taken to the Royal
Victoria Hospital.

ITALIAN BOMB THROWER CREATES A PANIC

New York, Sept. 28.—His friendship
for several members Italian Squad
of the detective bureau which the late
Lieut. Petrosin commanded, is be-
lieved to have incited Black Handers
to attempt the assassination today of
Agnatini Rini by hurling a bomb at
him from a house top on First Street.
The missile struck him and he was
hocked into unconsciousness, but es-
caped fatal injury. The explosion
created a panic in the neighborhood.
A similar attempt on Rini's life was
made three weeks ago.

A BOLD ATTEMPT AT COUNTERFEITING

Washington, Sept. 30.—The U. S.
Secret Service has unearthed what
appears to be a bold and extensive
attempt at counterfeiting National
