## W.C.T.U. IN ANNUAL CONVENTION AT HARTLAND

The report from the superintendent of medal contests, brought out helpful suggestions from Mrs. McWha, Mrs. Sprague and Mrs. Rutherford, up on this method of educating the young people in temperance sentiments. After singing and a prayer by Mrs. Hart, the convention adjourned to gather again at 8 p. m. for the public meeting.

The chair was taken on this occasion by Mrs. A. Plummer, President of the local union. Rev. Mr. Dow, who was first introduced, extended on behalf of the churches after which Mr. Rice the principal offered greetings in the name of the schools. His remarks on the cigarette evil and Boys Scout movement were heard with interest. Graceful replies were made to these addresses by Mrs. Sprague and Mrs. Gray, to which Mrs. Rutherford added a few remarks on the vote which women do not have, which evoked warm applause.

The programme was pleasantly interspersed by music from the choir and a charming reading by Miss Laura Curtis. At its close the visitors and their hosts and hostesses were treated to delicious refreshments and spent a delightful social hour.

On Wednesday morning the convention was opened by devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. Burt, and followed by roll call, and the reading of the minutes. The reports of superintendents was again taken up and the reports of the Department of Militia were read, followed by a discussion regarding the arranging for special service for the men in barracks at Fredericton. The report sent by Mrs. Seymour of the evangelistic and prisons department was received with many words of appreciation of her long and faithful services, with regret because of the cause of her absence. All joined in special prayer for her restoration to health and to the work she loves. Mrs. Shaw of Hartland gave a splendid account of the work done this past winter among the lumbermen and raftsmen, of the Upper St. John and Tobique rivers by Rev. D. Fiske, the missionary engaged in this service by the W.C.T.U. The accounts of his labors and services among the fifty-nine camps which formed his circuit warmed all hearts. He had the loyal support of all the men, and a letter from a foreman was read, warmly thanking the women who had sent him for the good he had accomplished.

## HINTS FOR THE LADIES

Many of last year's or early this year's dresses will need no further remodelling—for fall—if they were built originally on rather tight and straight lines—than the making over of the sleeves. The great point in these is the undersleeve, appearing in all sorts of forms and guises.

Sometimes it is the simple puffed undersleeve of dotted net or lace, gathered under a shoulder cap of the dress material, and with a quilled or ruffled cuff of lace or lace-edged lawn or batiste. In this as it is frequently short, even for autumn wear, sometimes ending above the elbow so that 16-button-length glove must be worn with it. In even more simple form, it is gathered to a narrow, straight cuff. Usually the shoulder cap above it is braided in a Persian design, forming a border, which is continued to the front and back of the blouse.

The undersleeve again appears as a puffing at the elbow, or covers almost the entire arm, with an oversleeve appearing as a deep cuff and a shoulder cap halfway down the upper arm. In the former case the oversleeve, usually of cloth—for this style is favored for one-piece tailored dresses—is cut in leg-of-mutton shape, slightly puffed at the shoulder and gathered at the inside of the elbow. Then for about six inches around the elbow the cloth is cut and braid bordered and the silk undersleeve appears, gathered in from the cloth. In a gown of this sort the silk will reappear as the chemisette, or the cloth will be used merely in a bolero effect on the blouse.

In the second style of undersleeve mentioned above the cuff and shoulder

cap are perfectly plain, and the undersleeve of silk or chiffon is tucked diagonally in two opposite directions that meet at the outer arm, interlapping all the way down. This is rather difficult to describe, but the effect is seen in baskets woven of broad straw.

There are two extremes in undersleeves, too; one, where it appears simply as a tight sleeve showing under the kimono sleeve of the dress for about three inches above the lace cuff; the other where the oversleeve itself, on the other hand, is shown only in epaulettes and a straight cuff five or six inches deep. The entire oversleeve in this case is of tucked dotted net, the tucks being so deep that only about ten are needed from shoulder to waist.

Two other undersleeve effects easily copied by the home dressmaker are also popular. One shows a full undersleeve gathered at the wrist of silk, and a braided cloth oversleeve that is sewed over in on the bias, so to speak, so that it is caught in front at a single point, and is cut away in diamond shape above and below this meeting point. The other consists of a full shirred net undersleeve with the oversleeve showing as a sort of elongated shoulder cap, fastened across the inner arm by means of strips and bows of narrow velvet.

As for sleeve not showing the undersleeve idea, they nearly all have exaggerated military cuffs, turned back in some cases almost to the elbow. Usually these are ornamented with a row of big buttons, and the sleeve otherwise is perfectly straight and rather tight. The only sleeves which are cut absolutely plain are elaborately braided.

## MAKE GOOD CANADIANS

Dr. Bryce Speaks of New Settlers in the West.

Ottawa, Sept. 29—In his Presidential address tonight to the Royal Society of Canada, which convened here today in annual meeting, Rev. Dr. George Bryce of Winnipeg gave an historical and critical study of the problem of "The Canadianization of Western Canada." After sketching the history of settlement in the prairie provinces. Dr. Bryce noted that from the earliest days the pro-British sentiment of western Canada had always been predominant. The influx of immigrants of the foreign races has so far shown no danger of any anti-Imperial or non-British tendency. The foreign-born were being Canadianized as rapidly as they came and in Winnipeg he believed there was more real British sentiment than in the loyalist city of Toronto.

Dealing particularly with the American invasion of western Canada, Dr. Bryce declared that an analysis of the statistics showed only twenty per cent. of the arrivals from the United States were of pure American stock. Eighty per cent were either native-born Canadians returning from the States, or else the immediate descendants of people of European birth.

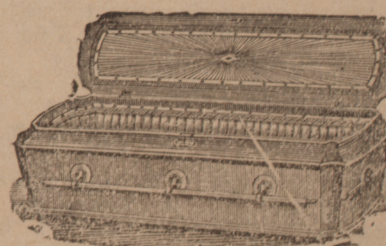
