### OATHS OF ALLEGIANCE ADMINISTERED TODAY

Lieutenant Governor Took Oath at 3 p. m. and Afterward Administered to Members of Executive Council.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor Tweedie took the oath of allegiance to His Majesty King George the Fifth at three o'clock this afternoon and immediately afterward administered the oath to the members of the executive council. The ceremony was witnessed by a large number of spectators.

The oath was taken by His Honor and by the members of the Government in the Legislative Chamber at the Parliament Building. Hon. F.E. Barker, Chief Justice, administered the oath to Governor Tweedie. The chamber was draped for the occasion. The throne and canopy were covered with black, with a few relieving touches of purple. The pillars supporting the galleries and the front of the galleries were also draped with black and purple.

The Chief Justice, while administering the oath, stood in front of the throne. The Lieutenant Governor stood in the same position. The ceremony occupied but a few minutes.

The Lieutenant Governor, Premier Hazen and Hon. J. K. Flemming reached the city last night. Hon. Robert Maxwell and Hon. D. V. Landry arrived this morning and other members of the government at noon.

### LT. GOV. TWEEDIE SAYS DRIVING PROSPECTS POOR

(Telegraph)

Lieut.-Governor Tweedie reached the city from Chatham yesterday afternoon on the Pacific express and went on to Fredericton by the Montreal train to attend the swearing in consequent upon the accession of the king. Premier Hazen and Chief Justice Barker went from here for the same ceremony.

In conversation with the Telegraph the lieutenant governor said that the reports as to the North Shore lumber drives had not correctly gauged the nature of the situation, being too optimistic as to the probability of getting the cut out in its entirety. At present the prospects of bringing the logs out to the mills in any number proportionate to the size of the cut were very poor, and the outlook had taken on a rather melancholy cast.

The streams were now all very low and there seemed little prospect of a rise of water which would be of any value. Cold weather had been drying the streams rapidly and there was nothing now back of them in the way of snow to indicate any substantial rise.

### INTERESTING LECTURE ON PLANT DISTRIBUTION

Mr. James Vroom of St. Stephen Delivers Address Before Natural History Society.

Mr. James Vroom M.A. of St. Stephen lectured before the National History Society last evening on "Some Problems Relating to the Distribution of Plants in New Brunswick." He pointed out the need of a new catalogue of the plants of the Province. In the many years since this had been done many new plants had been reported, and new localities for old ones. But before any list could be complete much work was necessary in all parts of the Province. Since the publication of Grey's new Manual the need of this work was emphasized. Notwithstanding the large amount of work already done, there were still many doubtful species and varieties—140 at least and probably 439.

As to the practical value of this work, Mr. Vroom pointed out that not only were the agricultural capabilities of the soil indicated by the indigenous growth; but that many interesting problems were dependent regarding the climatic and geologic history of the Province. He pointed out that evidence seemed to exist in plant life that since the glacial period, there had been a recurrence of periods of extended variations of temperature; and that the present tendency seemed to be toward increasing warmth. The lecturer divided the Province into sections, in which distinctive plant groups existed, which should be studied separately and comparisons made.

Mr. Vroom's address was a scholarly one, and ended with an eloquent description of the central basin of Canada where even into the McKenzie river valley we had climate and other conditions as favorable as those of New Brunswick. An interesting and extended discussion followed the lecture.

At the suggestion of Dr. Bailey, the President appointed a committee consisting of Dr. Bailey, Messrs Foster and Hagerman, to arrange for field excursions during the summer months.

### JOHNSON BEGINS REGULAR TRAINING

San Francisco, Calif., May 9—Jack Johnson took an automobile to San Jose to witness an aviation meet yesterday afternoon and a punctured tire which delayed the negro's return here started a rumor that he had been killed in a smashup. He professed great indignation at the report. "It was funny they are trying to kill me off," he said. "It was the same way in Chicago, but I'm still on the job and I'll be on at July 4th too." Johnson began regular training for the fight today. He announced that he intended to drop all discussion of the referee question for a while. It is said the fighter weighs about 230 pounds and he has taken off about 20 pounds during training operations. He will try to reduce his weight very gradually. The negro seems to be apprehensive of the possibility of going stale before the battle and he is mapping out a plan of work to which he declares he will faithfully adhere throughout his training. He says that for the first few days, he will devote himself entirely to training every day and road work along the beach.
