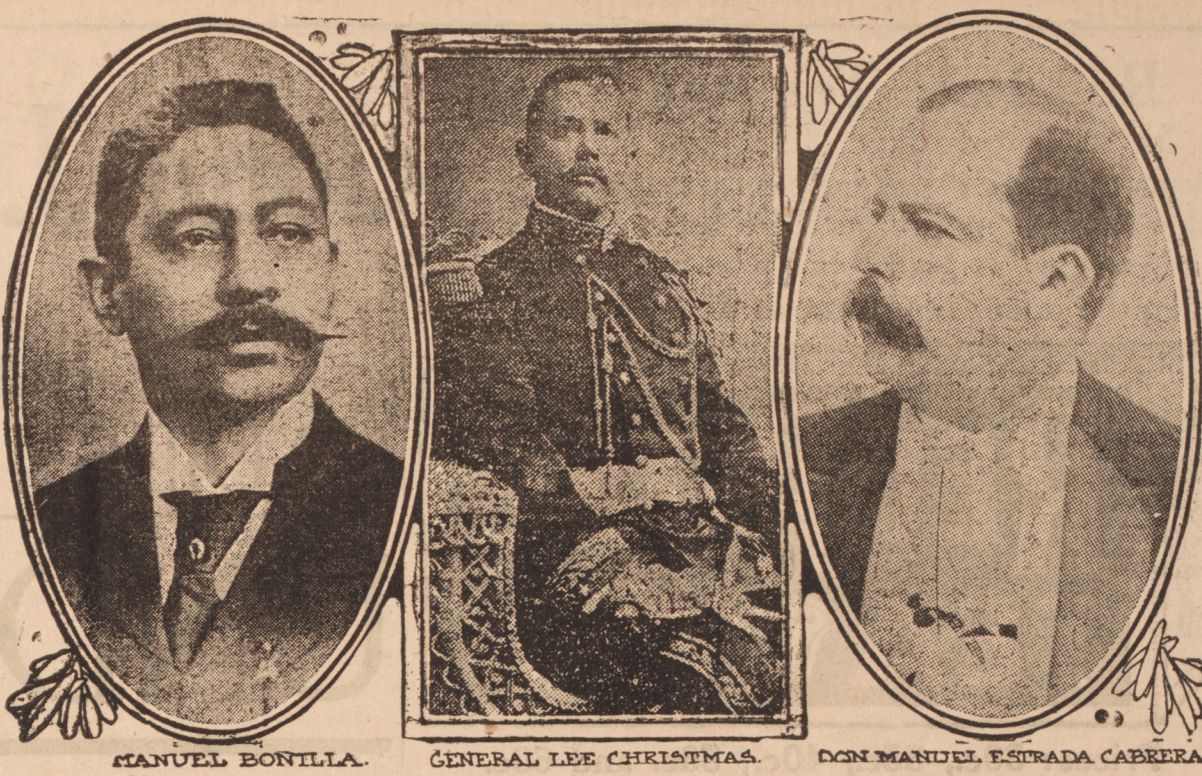

AFTERNOON FROCKS

Do not throw away or give away old evening gowns, no matter how worn out they may be. The woman was making a mistake who said recently: "When I go to Europe I throw my worn-out evening frocks overboard on my way home. The Atlantic must be paved with my old clothes."

Evening dresses are always made of material that is worth saving. Whether it is silk or velvet or one of the pretty silk-and-wool or silk-and-cotton mixture, the fabric or the trimmings can be utilized and thransformed into an afternoon frock.

Here is one example. A gown of light green silk Henrietta had reached the point where last insertion gaped at every movement, where a single wearing was a succession of mortifications, and where ruffles and furbelows were things to inspire shame instead of pride. Then the clever owner had an inspiration.

With a sharp penknife she ripped out all the lace and removed the worn tunic and draperies, leaving the fresh, bright goods beneath. It was very pretty, it had been much admired and she determined it was worth saving. So she fashioned her a yoke and undersleeves of dotted net worked dots over in green to match the Henrietta, and bought, by chance a remnant of green silk that happened just to match also. "I'd have got that or panne velvet in the same shade anyway," she said, "but I just happened upon this."

Of the silk she made pipings, buttons and lapels, effectually covering all the parts of the fabric that still showed wear. On the skirt, where the part covered by the tunic still showed brighter than that beneath, she placed a soft fold of silk, that hid the unpleasant contrast. At the bottom of the yoke reverse and a double row of silk-covered buttons concealed the drapery. The collar, the oversleeves and the girdle were piped with silk to give a unified appearance.

Still all was not complete. The sleeves were distinctly dingy by the side of the rejuvenated waist and bodice, and she felt she must in some way hide the difference. This she did by embroidering down them two rows of silk dots like those in the net yoke, but just a shade darker. By contrast, they made the worn Henrietta seem lighter, and yet they themselves appeared the same shade as the yoke dots, which were too far away for close comparison.

Here, at a trifling cost, was anew dress which her most critical acquaintance would never recognize. "The most I ever had said to me," she laughed, "was when someone remarked that I must be very fond of green silk Henrietta to have two dresses of it in two successive seasons. I am fond of it, my dear," I answered. Besides, the frocks are used for such different occasions, and then I'm afraid my last year's one is getting a bit played out."

Temporary Heat Quickly

The gown itself will suggest its own changes. Always there will be a yoke and undersleeves to consider, but apart from this, there is infinite variety of choice and treatment. Fortunately last year's styles were draped and voluminous; this year's are narrow and simple. Much can be done, as in the green Henrietta, by the simple removal of superfluities. Some times veiling with chiffon or tulle will redeem a faded material or embroidery hide a spotted one. And do not forget the dye and the stencil brush. If it is the fabric that is passed use the trimmings on another dress, but never thrown away or discard anything capable of such charming and economical transformation.
