### PROFESSIONALS AND AMATEURS MUST NOT MINGLE

M. P. A. A. Turns Down Semi-Professional Hockey and Baseball—  
Make Changes in Registration Rules

The Acadia Recorder has the following on the M. P. A. A. A. special meeting at which the amateur pro question was thrashed out:

"The M. P. A. A. A. gave their ultimatum at their annual meeting at the Queen Hotel last evening, that they would not permit amateurs and professionals to play together at either baseball or hockey. So that the pro hockey players might just as well get busy at once and arrange their series, and the amateurs can do likewise, and the baseballists will have ample time through the winter to arrange for professional teams if there is anybody willing to take hold of the project to form a professional league.

"The question was thoroughly discussed last evening, and a motion was made that it was not desirable for the M. P. A. A. A. to ask the A. U. of C. to permit semi-professional hockey and baseball. The motion was carried 16 to 11, the delegates from New Glasgow, Westville, Stellarton, Cape Breton and Crescents, Halifax, voting against it.

"An amendment was offered but it was not accepted, as it was diametrically opposed to the motion, to the effect that the M. P. A. A. A. ask the A. U. of C. to permit semi-professional hockey for two years, from January 1st, 1911, in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and semi-professional baseball in Nova Scotia for two years from May 1st, 1911.

"With this decision it now behooves the M. P. A. A. A. to use their utmost endeavor to prevent veiled professionalism, and there will be no trouble if all the clubs holding membership in that body will be true to their principles and carry out the laws under which they are bound.

"In regard to registration, Clauses 4 and 5 of article 11 were struck out and it is provided in the amendment, which carried unanimously, that applications for registration in future must be made personally, and endorsed by the sub-committee of the district. If no sub-committee exists, the application is to be signed by three responsible persons. Athletes belonging to clubs must have their applications signed by the secretary. All cards will expire annually on April 30th. King's College A. A. was elected a member. President Johnson presented a most interesting report, showing that 2,200 registration cards were issued during the year; 11 clubs had affiliated, the membership now being 37.

The association has a balance of \$64.63.

### BARON ABERDEEN WON AT BROCKTON

The only other event on the card was the 2.35 trot which was won by Gracious Peter after four heats. In the third heat of this race the winner made the circuit in 2.20½ while the slowest time for the event was 2.24½.

### COLORADO E LOST AT LEXINGTON, KY., TO McDEVITT'S GRACE

Young Mare Raced in Magnificent Style—Macey's Driving of Loser Criticized.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 5.—Grace, the beautiful daughter of Peter the Great and Orianna, yesterday afternoon accomplished a task that her sister, Czarevna, so splendidly attempted a year ago, that of placing her name on the honor roll of the Kentucky futurity.

Bolorado E., 2:05½, holder of the record for 3-year-old trotters, was forced to bow before this grand racing miss from Cleveland. The champion went down to defeat with colors flying and today has more admirers because of the race he trotted than his wonderful speed flights have ever made for him.

Not in the 18 years that the futurity has had a place on the Lexington program has there been a more pleasing contest for the large crowd which gathers to see the famous event.

The race today was fast and even the most outspoken deriders of the three-in-five system admit it was a credit to the sport. The time, 2:08½, 2:09½, 2:08, 2:10, 2:09½, may seem a trifle slow, but the wind was blowing a gale, so that 2:03 pacers could not touch 2:04.

Grace fairly outraced the Denver speed marvel, but many friends of Colorado E. say that Macey handled his prize pupil poorly. No one, however, says the great colt was not himself, so to the daughter of Peter the Great belongs all the glory that justly goes to the conqueror of a champion.

The race was a happy disappointment, as it was figured that Colorado E. and Native Belle would race themselves to death. The Moko filly, who 12 months ago in the junior division of the futurity trotted in 2:07½ and made a show of Colorado E., was not a dangerous factor. In two heats she broke and in the other two died away on a trot.

### JUSTICE BROOKS MADE NEW 2-YEAR-OLD RECORD

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 5.—Justice Brooks, a brown colt, by Baron Gale out of Expectation owned by Droma Farm, at St. Clair, Mich., won the two-year-old division of the Kentucky Futurity in straight heats and broke the world's record for two-year-old stallions in the second heat in 2:09½. In the first heat Justice Brooks in second position got a good start and led to the wire. In the second heat he was easily the victor over Meain Left after he raced Silent Brigade into submission by trotting to the half in 1:03½.

The two heats by Justice Brooks also beat the record for a two-year-old by two-year-old trotters. Native Belle took the record by her two heats in 2:13½ and 2:07½ last fall in the Futurity.

Her heats averaged 2:10½, while Justice Brooks in 2:11½ and 2:09½, averaged 2:10¼ or quarter second better than the filly's mark. Miss Stokes, which had been a strong favorite for the race, was drawn on account of sickness, and Justice Brooks, became favorite.

The 2.08 pace, postponed from yesterday, was won by Independence Boy his time in the heat run today being 2:09 flat.

The association announced a 2.09 pace for a \$800 purse on Friday, Oct. 7, in place of the 2.02 pace declared Annabel Lee, owned by Geo. Smith and raced last year by Geers, dropped dead of an intestinal hemorrhage near return into the stretch in the last heat of the 2.11 pace. Her driver, McCoy, was unhurt.

party; the party had deserted him. Mr. Balfour, when he succeeded Lord Salisbury as leader, had pledged himself to maintain unchanged the policy of the party; yet, at Sheffield, only one year later, he had declared for a fundamental reversal of the policy of the last fifty years. However driven from Oldham, Mr. Churchill found a seat in the General Election of 1906 in N. W. Manchester, a division which had been so consistently Conservative that the Liberals declined a contest in 1892 and 1900. This strong hold was carried by a majority of 1,241, but, in the by-election caused by his elevation to the Cabinet two years later, Mr. Churchill was defeated. A seat was found for him at Dundee, which town he is likely to represent for a long period, since he has gained a firm hold on the admiration and affections of his constituents.

#### A BRILLIANT SPEAKER.

Mr. Churchill's principal achievements, as President of the Board of Trade, were the establishment of Labor Exchanges and the settlement of the Cotton Dispute. It was a hard task to follow so successful a peacemaker as Mr. Lloyd George, but the Welshman's mantle could hardly have fallen on better shoulders. His elevation to the Home Secretaryship is so recent, that it would be premature to judge Mr. Churchill in that capacity. What we can safely say is that his services to Liberalism at the last election merited the reward. His great week of propagandist speeches in Lancashire recalled the glories of Gladstone's Midlothian campaign. As a physical effort it was wonderful, for he sometimes addressed six meetings in one day. But, more wonderful still, he broke new ground in every speech. Each audience was presented with precisely that aspect of the Free Trade question, which concerns it most, and the various points were driven home with every art known to oratory. It is not too much to claim that the unshaken allegiance of Lancashire and Yorkshire to the cause of Liberalism was due in no small measure to Mr. Churchill's advocacy. Lord Randolph Churchill gave promise of brilliant things. His son has achieved them before reaching middle age.

#### PUNTS AND DROPS

"Sam" Howard, formerly of St. John, but now of Sydney, has been elected captain of the Sydney Rugby team. "Sammy" is well-known here as he used to play on the half-line of the old Marathon XV and also played on the Algonquin and Portland basketball ball teams.

A. W. Doe, generally known as "Tiny," will coach the Mt. Allison football team. He is already in Sackville.

Frank McGibbon was out with the Fredericton City team yesterday and showed up well. His punting was strong.

Binney did some nice dodging in yesterday's work out.

### TOWN OF GLACE BAY, SEIZED BY THE SHERIFF

Sydney, N. S., Oct. 5.—The property of the town of Glace Bay was levied upon tonight by G. B. Ingraham, high sheriff of the county at the instance of the municipality of Cape Breton.

The warrant issued claims an amount of \$16,000 due the county for the town's share of joint expenditure. The county, when the case was heard before County Court Judge Finlayson in June last, got judgment against the town of Glace Bay in the amount of \$16,000. This amount has been three months overdue, and today the sheriff served the warrant on the town clerk.

Mayor Douglas claims that it is undue haste on the part of the county authorities and requested that action be stayed until a meeting of the financial committee.

The county solicitor replies that Glace Bay has had three months in which to arrange for payment of this amount, but made no effort to do so. Sheriff Ingraham went to Glace Bay this afternoon and served the official notice on the mayor and clerk. He took a memorandum of all the town's personal property and remains in charge awaiting the action of the town authorities. The seizure of the town is the talk of the whole community.
