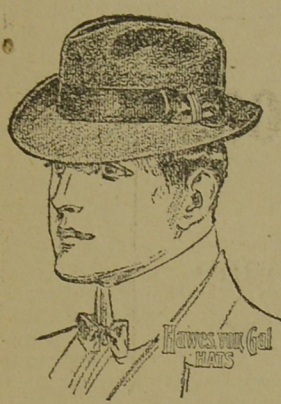

DARING YANKEE COUNTERFIETERS

United States Secret Service Men Round Up a Gang in the Heart of Boston.

Boston, Mass., March 8.—A counterfeiting plant in the heart of the city of Boston, within a stone's throw of the federal building and the sub-treasury of the government, which claims the exclusive privilege of furnishing money for commercial uses, which has been turning out counterfeit dimes to the consternation of the municipal and government officials, for a year or more past, was uncovered last today by Paters and three men were placed under arrest charged with counterfeiting.

Dimes of the date of 1908, which bore a fine resemblance to the real article except in the sharpness of the detail, have been flooded on Boston merchants and street car conductors for nearly a year. Secret service men have worked on the case for many months and finally within a few days. Secret Service Agent Joseph A. Murphy of South Boston, was able to lodge a complaint with the federal officers which led to today's disclosures.

The United States officers went to 185 Franklin street during the afternoon and found there a complete counterfeiting plant, a big press, rolling machine, gas forge and much raw silver and copper.

At the automobile show, Frederick Hartung, aged 30 years, was taken into custody and later Robert D. Semple, aged 27, of 57 Spencer St., Dorchester, and his brother, William Semple, aged 41 years, of 6 Perry St., Brookline,

The inspectors claim that a partial confession was made by Frederick Hartung, in which it was shown that the men had formerly occupied rooms, supposed to be occupied by inventors, at 185 Franklin street last February. On the door at Franklin street was the name of "Semple and Hartung, manufacturing jewelers."

The plant was disclosed in part through the tracing of quantities of silver shipped from dealers in Providence, R. I., to the Boston men.

NAVAL SERVICE DEBATE NEARLY THROUGH

Ottawa, March 8.—The debate on the naval service bill which to everybody's relief is now drawing to a close, was enlivened today by several brisk speeches and heated exchanges.

Mr. Clare (South Waterloo) opened the day's talk with a speech in which as the son of German parents, he ridiculed the idea that Germany meant to go to war with Britain. Then he proceeded to condemn the navy, and wound up by adding still another to the many opposition policies in the shape of a proposal to build dry docks on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

Mr. McLean (South Huron) asked Mr. Clare whether he favored the contribution of Dreadnoughts, but Mr. Clare declined to answer, and Mr. McLean was howled down by the opposition.

Dr. Neely (Humboldt) followed with an excellent defence of the government's proposals and a scathing criticism of the opposition.

There was another lively exchange later when Mr. Gladu (Yamaska), attacked Mr. Foster, and declared that the member for North Toronto had never cleared himself from the accusations made by the minister of justice two years ago in the house, in connection with the Union Trust.

Glen Campbell and Mr. Lennox excitedly protested against Mr. Gladu's remarks as unwarranted. Mr. Lennox claiming that Judge Magee had vindicated Mr. Foster.

Mr. Emmerson adjourned the debate which is expected to finish tomorrow.

LIQUOR CONSIGNED TO A CLERGYMAN

Toronto, March 8.—Seizures of whiskey going into Northern Ontario are becoming very frequent. A big box consigned to a clergyman at Cochrane was seized at Matheson by Constable Rowell and found to contain a lot of whiskey, though it was marked dry goods. The clergyman will probably be prosecuted. Several other seizures of whiskey disguised as legitimate merchandise are reported.

A THIEVING ARTIST

London, March 9.—Carew Martin, the art critic, was today convicted of misappropriating the funds of the Royal Society of British Artists of which organization he was secretary, and was sentenced to nine months imprisonment.

IT IS APPENDICULAR GASTALGIA

(Special to The Mail.)

New York, March 9.—London cable despatches received here today say that a fresh series of indictments has been brought against the appendix as a cause of human suffering by the Royal Society of Medicine here.

Twenty-four operation cases, in which the chief symptoms were stomach pains due to an unrecognized disease of the appendix, were described.

In fifteen cases the operation was undertaken, for a supposed ulcer either in the stomach or in the adjoining intestines only to find that these parts were normal, while the appendix was diseased.

Dr. Herbert J. Paterson, who read a paper on the subject, suggested the name appendicular gastalgia for the new disease, on account of its most prominent symptom, stomach pain due to the disease of the appendix.

THINK STREET RAILWAY BILL TOO SWEEPING

The municipalities committee met this morning. Mr. Dickson in the chair, and took up the bill relating to the qualification of electors in Moncton. The bill was explained by Mr. Robinson and advocated by Mr. McKinnon, representing the Trades and Labor Council.

Mr. Sumner said the bill would make it so that men with no interest in the city could come in a few months before election and get their names on the voters' list. A bill had passed the legislature a few years ago exempting incomes up to \$600 from taxation and a large number of mechanics and others had thus escaped taxation and now when they asked for votes, they should be willing to pay taxes.

Mr. Delahunt said enactment of the bill would add about six hundred names to the voters' list.

Ald. Jones objected to giving votes without real estate qualification, as real estate was the only security the city had for taxes and the population was largely a floating one.

Mayor Riley said Moncton ought to have an assessment act and voters list made to meet its peculiar conditions. The object of the bill was to get back the franchises from men who did not have to pay taxes. Mr. Sumner favored giving every man paying a poll tax a vote in civic elections, but if the granting of exemptions and enlargement of the franchise continued there would soon be nobody left to pay any taxes.

Ald. Charters and Ald. Bourque spoke in favor of an amendment proposed by the city council.

Hon. Mr. Maxwell suggested that the city council and the Trades and Labor council get together and arrange a compromise agreement, and at the suggestion of the chairman, the bill stood over for further consideration.

The bill to authorize the city of Moncton to issue \$18,000 debentures, \$10,000 for permanent streets and \$8,000 for sewers was agreed to, and the section of the bill restricting expropriation in public places was struck out as the provincial Board of Health wishes to secure the enactment of a general law.

The section providing for a plebiscite on the question of leasing the electric and gas light plant to the street railway company was agreed to without opposition after being spoken to by Mayor Riley, Ald. Jones and Ald. Charters.

LOCOMOTIVE IN MOTION BLOWS UP.
